COMMUNIST LOBBY AT LABOR SESSION

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 6.—Thirty persons, believed to be connected with a communist "lobby" endeavoring to "move from within" at the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor in session here, have been placed under surveillance by the Los Angeles police following the arrest yesterday of Sid Bush, an asserted communist, in the very doorway of the convention room.

Bush was booked on suspicion of criminal syndicalism and it was telegrams, letters and other documents in his possession which resulted in the police investigation spreading to include the activities of thirty others.

Bush was instructed, the officers said, in a letter found in his pocket from William Z. Foster, secretary of the communist party of America, to obtain the introduction of certain resolutions before the labor convention. He was directed to work in cooperation with Sam Gliberman, an officer of the communist party here, and Al J. Boek, business representative of Los Angeles cleaners and dyers union. Both Gliberman and Boek were detained by the police but later released.

ANTI-AIRCRAFT GUN IS UNIQUE

ABERDEEN PROVING GROUND, Md., Oct. 6.—An anti-aircraft gun which automatically sights targets in the air is a type of weapon members of the army ordnance association will be called upon to manufacture and operate if war should come again.

The gun is controlled by a sensitive instrument which detects the position of a moving airplane by sound waves. At night a huge searchlight which throws its beam

directly upon the airplane simultaneously with the discharge of the gun. This weapon is one of the new developments in fighting equipment on exhibit today to those attending the ninth annual convention of the army ordnance association here.

BIG HAUL OF ALCOHOL
