World Series Sidelights

Before the game started it was Yankee home run prowess and Pirate speed that was much talked about, but in two games the Yankees haven't hit a home nor have the Pirates stolen a single base.

Nevertheless it is the sprinting ability of Lloyd Waner that has helped him score two thirds of the Pirate's runs—four out of a total of six. The Yankees are apt to see Young Waner for "Sprout" as the players call him, on the bases any time they look around. The experts figure there is no way for the Yankees to shut out the Pirates unless they devise

a system to keep "Sprout" off the bases.

Even though they have had a few lapses in the field, the Waner brothers have done enough at bat to convince observers that they are born all-around stars. Paul, the elder, is leading both teams at bat for two games with an average of .571, compiled by four hits in several official times at bat. Lloyd is leading run scorer and shares what little extra base hitting honors there are so far with Lou Gehrig. Lloyd and Lou have two hits each, a double and triple apiece.

Mark Koenig, a world's series "goat" a year ago is bidding for more heroic honors this far. He is leading the Yankees at bat. Garnering four hits in nine times at bat for an average of .444, and has scored the most runs, three. Babe Ruth has an average of .429 and Gehrig .400. Lazzeri, with .375 is

the fourth Yankee in the select batting circle. The Pirates have only two hitting over .300. Paul Waner is one and Clyde Barnhart is the other with a mark of .375. Only one club has ever lost a world series after winning the first two games. Strangely enough that club was the Yankees, now in the same position as they were in 1921 when they shut out the Giants in the first two games. The series

then was a best five out of nine game proposition and the Giants won five of the last six games to win the championship.

"Sixty dollars," said the speculator. "Stop clowning," was the answer. "I'm a comic myself."

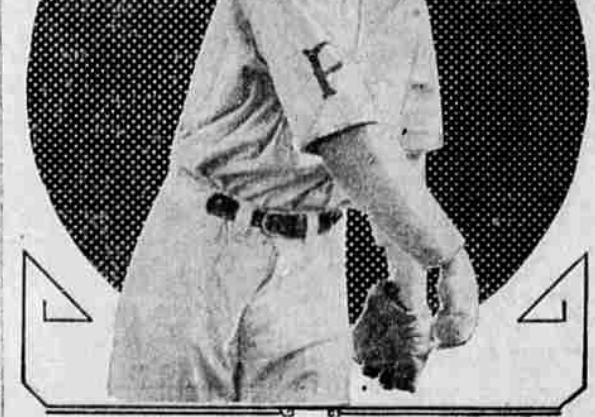
