FINE ROMNEY RAMS ADDED BOGARD FARM AT ROUND PRAIRIE

Two fine Romney rams, one a 2-year-old that last year took first prize at the Oregon state fair and also at the Pacific International Livestock exposition in the yearling class, have been purchased by W. A. Bogard, who recently acquired the Round Prairie stock ranch and is stocking it with pure bred sheep. The sheep were purchased from registered stock at Monmouth and are classed as two of the finest in the state.

The Romney breed is rapidly becoming very popular in Oregon, largely because of the fact that the animals are so hardy and are exceptionally good wool producers.

The Romney is a very ancient breed of sheep native to southern England and found especially in Kent and the wild pastures of the drained marshes of Romney from which the name is derived. The breed is noted for hardiness and an ability to fatten on grass alone. They are very adaptable to cold, chilly, damp climates, and in many sections of the world they outnumber all other breeds, and are noted for their fine quality of wool and superior excellence of mutton.

Romney fleeces, it is claimed, shear on the average of twelve to thirteen pounds to the fleece. Yearlings shear from fifteen to twenty-two pounds to the fleece.

The wool is fine and of medium length.

The Romney breed proves particularly adaptable to the Oregon climate and consequently is becoming very popular.

Mc. Bogard is adding the two rams to his stock at his Round Prairie ranch, which he is stocking as rapidly as possible.

Another fine Romney ram, a winner of the first prize at the state fair this year, was brought to Roseburg last week by J. H. Short, who resides near Dixonville.

ELIMINATION OF FARM FIRES URGED BY SEC. JARDINE

Emphasizing the seriousness of the fire losses on American farms, Secretary of Agriculture Jardine today seconded President Coolidge's proclamation designating the week of October 9 to 15 as Fire Prevention Week, and urged the farmers of the country to give attention to fire prevention not only for the single week but during the entire year.

Last year, Secretary Jardine pointed out, fires on farms and in rural communities took a toll of approximately 3,500 lives, and damaged or destroyed property to a value estimated at \$150,000,000. The loss, however, was more serious than the figures indicate, because, in addition to the loss of life and property, food supplies were spoiled or lost, gainful production operations were curtailed and even suspended, families were rendered homeless, and potential manufactured products of increased value were lost.

This annual farm fire loss is all the more deplorable, Secretary Jardine continued, when it is realized that such waste is essentially needless and could be prevented to a very large extent by the elimination of carelessness and the adoption of effective and recommended equipment and methods which have been proved effective. In the order of their importance, the principal causes of farm fires are: (1) lightning; (2) defective chimneys and flues; (3) carelessness; (4) use of matches and smoking; (5) combustible roofs; (6) spontaneous combustion; (7) careless use and storage of gasoline and kerosene; and (8) faulty wiring installations and improper use of electrical appliances.

Every farmer is urged strongly to give attention to fire prevention, not only for one week, but also during the entire year. It is his responsibility and duty to himself, his family, his neighbor, and his country to do his utmost in reducing the enormous annual fire waste. The problem calls for concerted action, and this work can be furthered greatly by the cooperation of rural school teachers, county agents and others. Furthermore, it is recommended that serious attention be given to the establishment of organized rural fire protection.

The United States Department of Agriculture, which is conducting investigations relating to the causes and prevention of farm fires, and is represented on important national farm fire prevention committees, asks for the united and continuous cooperation of each farmer in the country in putting forth every effort toward reducing the national fire waste. Only by such cooperation can this needless loss of life and national wealth and resources be decreased.

FRENCHMEN START FLIGHT TO BRAZIL

LE BOURGET, France, Oct. 10.—Prevented by bad weather from attempting the Paris-New York flight this late in the season, Dienne Costes and Lieutenant Le Brix turned the nose of their plane, the "Nemesis-Coll," to the south today with Duquesne Aires at their ultimate destination.

They took off at 9:43 a.m., heading to make St. Louis, Senegal, 2700 miles away, on the first leg, then cross the South Atlantic to Natal on the Brazilian coast, and proceed to the Argentine capital with one more stop at Rio Janeiro.

Soon after the start Le Brix was heard signaling on the radio that all was going well. The start was delayed for more than an hour awaiting the clearing of a haze which hung over the field. Then Costes discovered he had forgotten his favorite leather helmet and it was brought over from Villa Coublay by another plane.

WORLD STATISTICS ON WOOL SOUGHT BY PRODUCERS

Plans for the collection of international wool statistics were unanimously endorsed and promised the active support of the United States wool trade at conferences at Boston, Philadelphia, and New York last week between members of the trade and George T. Willingmyre, wool standardization expert of the Department of Agriculture, L. C. Connor of the U. S. Tariff Commission, and Frank E. Fitzpatrick of the Department of Commerce.

Similar endorsement has been received by mail from the Arizona Wool Growers Association, California Wool Growers Association, National Wool Growers Association, and Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers Association. Organizations represented at the conferences included the Boston Wool Trade, National Association of Wool Manufacturers, American Association of Woolen and Worsted Manufacturers, Philadelphia Wool Trade and Textile Association, and National Association of Worsted and Woolen Spinners.

The conferences agreed upon a classification schedule which provides for the gathering of international figures on quality, condition, weight, and value of wool passing in international trade. The schedule calls for the collection of information on the volume of world wool stocks semi-annually as of April 1 and October 1, monthly reports on imports, exports, and re-exports of wool, and a monthly survey of wool consumption by mills.

The reports would contain three divisions covering the diameter or quality of fiber: (1) 55's and finer, (2) 46's to 55's inclusive, and (3) 44's and coarser. Carpet wool would be reported separately. In each division would be shown separately the figures on grease and washed wool; scoured, alpine or pulled wool, and "on skin" wool. It was recommended that the reports be issued showing the quantities and conditions as reported by each country, and also in clean content equivalent. The reports on exports, imports, and re-exports would contain values in addition to quantities.

The conference laid especial stress upon the necessity of issuing the international figures promptly they are made available. They declared that unless this were done, the report would prove valueless in enabling the industry as a whole to coordinate production and consumption requirements and help place the industry on the stabilized basis which is sought through the collection of the world figures.

The next step in the move for

comparable world wool figures. Mr. Willingmyre announced, will be to hold an interdepartmental meeting of representatives of the Department of Agriculture, Department of Commerce, Treasury Department, and U. S. Tariff Commission, which group will submit a final report of the recommendations of the wool trade, producers, and the Government departments, to the State Department for transmission to the British Ambassador at Washington.

Action at this time in the preparation of a proposed classification schedule for use in collecting the world wool figures is the result of a request by British wool interests through the British Ambassador at Washington, for American views on the subject. Mr. Willingmyre expressed the hope that this proposed schedule will be acceptable to the wool industry abroad, and that steps will be taken soon for setting up the machinery for collecting the world wool figures.

REVILLE, Mass., Oct. 10.—Seventeen amusement establishments were in ruins today and police were investigating the possibility of connection between the spectacular \$200,000 blaze which swept two blocks of attractions and a reported large rum landing on another part of the shore at the same time.

Residents of the beachfront section said that shortly before the blaze was discovered, motorboats had been heard offshore and loaded trucks were numerous on the infrequent shore roads.

The theory on which police were proceeding was that the fire might have been started three miles away to divert attention from the rum landing. Fire department investigators, however, were inclined to attribute the origin to a carelessly tossed cigarette butt.

WEST PROFITS THROUGH "EATING OF THE GREEN"

Western lettuce has wrought a change in the eating habits of the nation, according to Allan Pollok, manager of Southern Pacific's commissary department, who says there has been a tremendous increase in popularity of all kinds of salads during the last decade.

"Salads, in slight demand ten years ago, have become an indispensable item in evening and mid-day meals served on dining cars," Pollok said. "Where a dozen heads of lettuce was ample provision for the average dining car a few years ago, more than a hundred heads will now be demanded for the same number of meals."

"This does not mean that popular-

ity of meats has declined but rather that Americans now desire a better balanced diet. It is also due to the improved quality of lettuce developed and produced by Pacific coast growers.

"Last year we used more than half a million heads of lettuce, and the demand for all sorts of salads, most of which have lettuce as a foundation, is growing. Let me add that today most people eat the 'foundation'."
