AIR EXPRESS IS
GREAT SERVICE

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Air express has justified itself, among other ways, by such services, as affording rapid transportation for medical supplies, by saving a St. Louis bank more than \$3,000 in interest, and by saving Mr. Tunney the humiliation of riding from a Chicago hotel to his Soldiers Field conference with Mr. Dempsey in an old suit, the American Express company announced today. The purpose for which the medical supplies were sent and the identity of the bank were not revealed. The company reported that 2,000 shipments were made during the first month of the country-wide service and that after the first day few of these were for publicity purposes.

Other services of the air express were said to be the transport of her costumes from New York to a prima donna in San Francisco, regular shipments of expensive cut flowers, rush delivery of a sample fur coat from New York to a Milwaukee department store, and the relay of fashions from Paris to the West coast.

COLLEGE POLITICS
SAID CORRUPTED

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Oct. 11.—"Political corruption," if charges are true, has found its way into campus elections at Indiana University.

Revelations by the Indiana Daily Student, campus newspaper, of "corruption" in connection with the elections of class officers last week, follow:

"Nine of 12 signatures on a nominating petition filed in sophomore election were forgeries."
"The nominee for sophomore president was expelled from school two days before the election, while the nominee for treasurer never entered the university."
"Check of university credits of all candidates revealed that a nominee for senior treasurer was not a member of the senior class; a nominee for junior president was not a junior and a nominee for sophomore president was not a sophomore."

"Several persons, having obtained 12 signatures to a proposed slate of Freshmen officers, proceeded to erase the names of nominees and substitute a different slate without consulting the signers of the petition."

SHIPS COLLIDE
IN A THICK FOG

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 11. Wireless dispatches to the Federal Telegraph offices here this morning reported the steamers Pomona and Kekeskee in collision at 4:45 a. m. this morning, four miles off Point Arguello, about 140 miles north of San Pedro.

The ships collided in a thick fog. The Pomona was stove in about eight feet above the water line but the wireless operator's report indicated that the vessel was not in danger. The Kekeskee was hit harder, however, and was taking water. The engine and fire rooms were flooded according to the boat's operator. The Pomona was standing by. Neither craft had sent distress signals, nor indicated they were in serious danger of sinking, according to the Federal offices here.

The Pomona is a 9,500-ton steamer, bound out of San Pedro, California, to Everett, Wash. The Kekeskee was southbound.

TRUDY'S CHANNEL
RECORD BETTERED

FOLKSTONE, England, Oct. 11. Gertrude Ederle's record channel swim of 14 hours and 31 minutes was bettered today by Miss Mona McLellan, London's "mystery swimmer" who landed at Folkstone at 8:50 o'clock this morning after swimming from Calais. Girls Neze in 13 hours and 10 minutes.

Miss McLellan, the fourth woman to swim the channel, walked ashore at Folkstone Beach at 8:52 o'clock this morning and collapsed. She was immediately carried to the fishing smack which accompanied her during the swim and was taken to Hythe, where she had been in training. Only the people accompanying Miss McLellan in the fishing smack knew she had started. The channel was calm throughout the night but very cold and a stiff north-west wind sprang up during the early hours.

Miss McLellan, whose real name is Dorothy Cochran Logan, practicing physician of Harley street, London, entered the water at Cape Gris-Nez yesterday at 7:40 p. m.

This was the second woman to conquer the English channel in recent days, making the swim on her fifth attempt only a few days after Mercedes Gleitz, London typist, had succeeded in making the crossing, after repeated failures.

LEVIATHAN SAILS
FOR U. S. LOADED
WITH LEGION MEN

SOUTHAMPTON, England, Oct. 11.—The steamer Leviathan, flagship of the United States lines, sailed for New York today as a doughboy ship—just as she was in the days of the World War. Nearly 2,000 legionnaires, the last of the great pilgrimage to Europe for the American Legion convention, were aboard her.

The official "good will party" of Retiring Commander Howard P. Savage, received its last ceremonial farewells at the Southampton docks from official deputations of the British government,

and from various bodies of British ex-service men.

There were many aboard the Leviathan besides the legionnaires, but the American war veterans dominated the great liner despite such distinguished passengers as Ambassador Alanson B. Houghton, Ronald Amundsen, the explorer, and Sir Thomas Lipton, the yacht enthusiast.

Charles A. Levine, homeward-bound from his trans-Atlantic flight last June with Clarence D. Chamberlain, was expected to board the liner when it touched at Cherbourg.
