to Dr. J. N. Shaw, instructor in veterinary medicine, Oregon Agricultural college, Corvallis, where it is examined and the exact parasite determined. This is essential to proper treatment.

Ban Johnson Clearing Desk for His Successor, Who Will Probably Move in Next Month

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

CHICAGO, Oct. 13.—Ban Johnson is putting his baseball house in order. The doughty old warrior is about ready to step out as president of the American League.

He may hand over the reins to some one else November 1, but no one knows definitely when he will step from the stage to the wings, he says he will retire when he gets everything straightened up.

In the meantime, he has tied up his office here. He and his clerical staff have swept through an accumulation of papers that tell in stray figures and records the fighting career of Ban Johnson. The office is about in shape for his successor, who, it is freely predicted, will be E. S. Barnard, president of the Cleveland American League baseball team.

Technically, the American League magnates are expected to dispose of the very important business of selecting a president at the annual meeting which usually is held about December 1. But they may move swiftly and secretly before then, according to the gossip in major league circles. But, whenever the action is taken, the new president will find the desks cleared for him.

Barnard has been connected with organized baseball for nearly a quarter of a century. He had been a football coach, sporting editor of a newspaper, and secretary of the Columbus, O., builders' exchange before that.

He went to Cleveland in 1903 as secretary of the Cleveland club. In 1910 he became vice president and in 1916 was made manager. He held that post until July, 1922, when he was made president.

Barnard was graduated from Otterbein College at Westerville, O. In 1906 and 1907, he coached the Seventeenth U. S. regiment football team and in 1908 was coach at the Ohio Medical University. He was sports editor of The Columbus Dispatch from 1905 to 1907, helped organize the Columbus baseball club and later was president of the Western Association.

Barnard is a hard worker and many consider him hard-boiled, but the Cleveland players declare the opposite. When he draws a players' contract, they say, he puts in the highest figure he thinks reasonable and possible, and then stands pat. Barnard is married and lives in Cleveland with his wife and aged mother.

Sons of Grid Stars Follow Paths of Famous Fathers

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Oct. 13.—

Three sons of dads famed in football annals are proving real "chips off the old block" this year at Manlius School, a military academy near here.

They are Willson Heston, Jr., son of the famous "Willson" who two decades ago gained distinction as All-American halfback on three successive University of Michigan teams and was named by Walter Camp as the All-time All-American back; Fielding H. Yost, Jr., whose father, "Hurricane" Yost, is still serving the University of Michigan as director of athletics after having guided the destinies of its grid squad for 20 years; and Frank O'Neill, Jr., heir to the fame of the "Buck" O'Neill who starred on one of the greatest Manlius eleven and then at Williams college, and

finally took over the coaching work at Syracuse University. They mean nothing to the Manlius coaches and their fellow players, however, and the three youths are being put through their paces as any other candidates would be.

Yost attended Manlius last year, making a good record in the backfield on the junior team. Young Heston has gained considerable distinction in his own right having served last season as captain of the Northwestern High School of Detroit team and been named as All-State halfback of Michigan high schools for 1926.

O'Neill described by the school athletic officials as having a "good idea of the game and splendid spirit," is not regarded as a finished star, however, was assigned to the Junior squad until he has gained more experience.

Elmer Inman, Oklahoma Bandit, Assumes Mantle of Matt Kimes

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Oct. 13.—By virtue of successful evasion of the law for many months Elmer Inman, in Oklahoma's latest uncrowned and unofficial bandit king.

Inman has been popularly dubbed the successor in public interest to the dapper and youthful Matthew Kimes, who has been condemned to die for murder, but to the unseeing eye of the law he is just another desperado.

Inman's elopement with the daughter of a penitentiary warden, a brief attempt to reform and two subsequent escapes have set him apart from the run of unimaginative outlaws.

Two years ago Inman was a clerk in a jewelry store at Arkansas City, Kans. For embezzlement from the store he was committed to the Kansas penitentiary at Lansing. Because of his excellent behavior he became a trusty and was assigned as chauffeur to Warden J. K. Coddling. The delinquent convict captured the heart of Lavonia Coddling, the warden's daughter, and in the belief he would reform she eloped with him in 1921.

Inman soon became involved again in difficulties with the law, however, and his wife divorced him.

Two years ago he was arrested for robbery of a jewelry store at Ardmore, Okla. With Ray Terrill, an alleged member of the Kimes gang of bank robbers, he broke jail and escaped.

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KENTUCKY SEEKS FUNDS FOR NATIONAL PARK

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 11.—(A. P.)—Mammoth Cave and a score of lesser known caverns in central Kentucky will be included in the Mammoth Cave national park which is to be presented to the government.

Congress already has approved acceptance of the park, which will be improved and maintained by the government. Its opening will mark the establishment of the fourth large national park east of the Mississippi river. The park already is a national park in Maine, and recently the government accepted the Shenandoah national

park in Virginia and the Great Smoky Mountain national park in Tennessee and North Carolina.

Kentucky now is engaged in a campaign to raise \$2,000,000 to purchase the land for the park. The section around Mammoth Cave abounds in beautiful scenery and lies within easy reach of residents of the central eastern part of the country.

IMPORTS AT PORT OF PORTLAND SHOW INCREASE IN SEPT.

PORTLAND, Oct. 13.—Septem-

ber imports received at Portland amounted to 14,567 tons as against 12,981 tons in September, 1926. 5,316 tons entered during September, 1926, says the Traffic Department, the Port of Portland Commission, Portland, Oregon, U. S. A. Included among the larger items were, from Europe, 2,064 tons iron and steel, 140 tons coke, 790 tons cement, 335 tons molder's sand and 112 tons wood pulp; from Argentina, 1,674 tons linseed, 2,930 tons corn; from Philippines, 3,360 tons copra; from Brazil, 200 tons coffee; from the Orient 100 tons tea.

Barbed wire shipments received from European countries amounted to 330 tons, sufficient to build a three wire fence extending from Portland to San Francisco. Numerous small shipments were received during the first eight months, with the September movement consisting of six separate lots ranging from 500 to 2,500 reels each.

The export movement of fresh apples for the 1927-28 season began with the clearance of the motorship Drechttyk, October 6th, which cleared with 2,874 boxes of fresh apples valued at \$7,950, for European markets. "Although the movement this year has been somewhat late in starting, indications are that several hundred thousand boxes will move during the next few weeks. Many cars of fresh apples and pears are now being stored by the Commission of Public Docks at municipal terminal No. 4, where the cold storage capacity is sufficient for the storage of 100,000 boxes of apples or pears with additional air-cooled space for upwards of 350,000 boxes. Private companies are also able to care for the amount usually handled in previous years.

Wheat exports during the first seven days of October have amounted to 1,263,222 bushels, with a value of \$1,620,223, including clearances up to Friday evening, shipments being destined to United Kingdom, Holland, Italy, Sweden, France and Japan. With the number of vessels now loading in the harbor and those due to arrive and load during the month, it has been estimated that the total export movement of wheat during October will probably exceed 6 million bushels.

FAIR NEWS

Clean Up Lice on Livestock Before Winter

The fall months are a highly desirable time for cleaning up lice on farm animals. This timely reminder is made by specialists of the Bureau of Animal Industry, United States Department of Agriculture.

They point out that lice on horses, cattle, and other farm animals are generally most troublesome in winter, but at that time effective treatment is very difficult. Hence it is important to free livestock of lice before cold weather sets in.

All persons in charge of the United States winter months are generally too cold for safe dipping or spraying, which are the two most effective methods of freeing animals of lice. Dipping powders are of some value, during cold weather, in holding parasites in check, but such powders are not recommended for domestic animals. Consequently, it is advisable to utilize a period of mild weather during the fall to delouse farm animals.

The effect of both the biting and the sucking varieties of lice is to annoy livestock, thus interfering with their feeding, rest and comfort. Sucking lice also cause some loss of blood. For cattle and horses Government specialists recommend arsenical dips, coal-tar creosote dips, or nicotine solutions. For dipping hogs, crude petroleum and coal-tar creosote dips are effective.

It is important to treat all the animals in a flock or herd, though some animals appear to be free of lice. If only a part of the herd is treated the parasites may spread by contact from one animal to another. Even a few lice on an unsuspected animal may reinfest the entire herd. Accordingly, thoroughness is essential. Full directions for treating and using dips are contained in bulletins on the subject. The following may be obtained on application to the Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.: Farmers' Bulletin 909-P, "Cattle Lice and How to Eradicate Them"; 1086-P, "Hog Lice"; and 1087-P, "Horse Lice".
