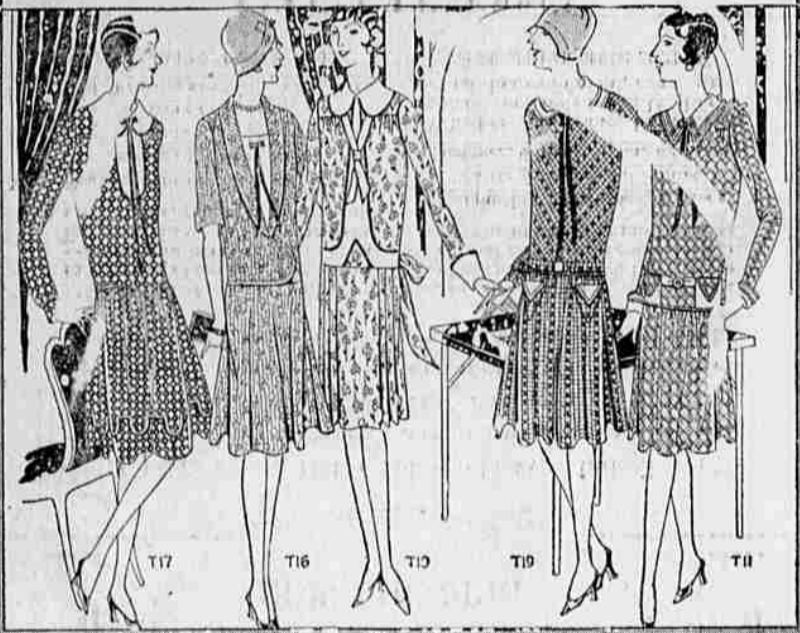

PETITION FOR REMOVAL OF MOOSE HERD RECEIVED

PORTLAND, Oct. 13.—Moose are menacing human lives and destroying property and they ought to be removed from Douglas and Lane counties, says a petition signed by 18 Reedport residents, and now in the hands of Harold Clifford, state game warden. The moose in those counties are those brought from Alaska a few years ago and the offspring from the original herd. They are not beneficial to Douglas and Lane counties and would not be beneficial to any other district in which they might be put, the petition asserts. It is said it is impossible to fence property against the moose. What will be done about the petition Mr. Clifford could not say yesterday. It will be taken to the game commission for action.

"But I would say, offhand," Mr. Clifford commented, "that I think these people hardly realize what an attraction they have in those moose. I understand that the offspring of the original herd are not giving any trouble; I mean, those moose which haven't been handled by man don't get near men or property. Photographers who have gone down there this year to get pictures of those moose have come back saying they couldn't find them, so it doesn't seem that they are very handy to the haunts of men."
