### SOFTWOOD LUMBER BUYING IS LESS

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—Soft wood lumber buying was slightly less active this week, compared with the week before, and hardwood orders were about the same, reports from 168 mills to the National Lumber Manufacturers association show. A small increase in production, shipments about the same, and some decrease in new business, were reported by 325 soft wood mills for the week ended October 8 and operations of 128 hardwood mills showed an increase in production, with shipments and new business about the same as the preceding week. Unfilled orders of 220 southern pine and west coast mills at the end of last week were 231,841,942 feet, against 555,911,212 feet the week before.

### ROSEBURG FAILS TO GET MENTION IN AIR DIRECTORY

Roseburg's apathy concerning an airplane landing field has resulted in the city being dropped entirely from the directory of landing fields compiled by the Standard Oil company, and the local field is not even mentioned as an emergency field.

Recently an aviator suggested that Roseburg take some action to have the field listed in the new directory, but nothing was done and as a result the booklet, which is eagerly sought by aviators as a guide, does not even contain a mention of Roseburg and on the map attention is called only to the sign guide on the Standard Oil building.

Failure of this city to take notice of the great forward advance of aviation and to make preparations to benefit from this development, is apt to prove costly in the future when the city is left off the air route, merely because of neglect to supply an up-to-date landing field.

### MAN STRUCK BY TWO CARS DIES
