This time Mrs. Levine went aboard the Leviathan.

The Maroon was preceded to the battery by two police launches and Levine was cheered by a crowd of several hundred when he stepped ashore. Because of the early hour there was no parade to city hall, Levine proceeding with his wife and daughter to a hotel under police escort. The formal reception at city hall was scheduled for noon.

Among the crowd at the battery was a process server waiting to give Levine summons in a suit brought against him as president of the Columbia Aircraft Corporation by the Aeronautical Digest Publishing Corporation.

The process server announced he had heard that he was going to be "arrested by Levine," but as he tried to push his way up the Maroon's gang plank he was brushed aside by police and became lost in the crowd.

As Levine climbed into an automobile the process server caught up and tapped him on the shoulder. Levine's attorney accepted summons in his behalf.

Before he left the Maroon, Levine was asked by a reporter for a Jewish paper if it was true he had denied being a Jew in Warsaw.

"Why should I do that?" Levine countered. "I was asked if I was a Jew and my reply naturally was that I am an American. I was born 37 years ago in North Adams, Massachusetts, on St. Patrick's day."

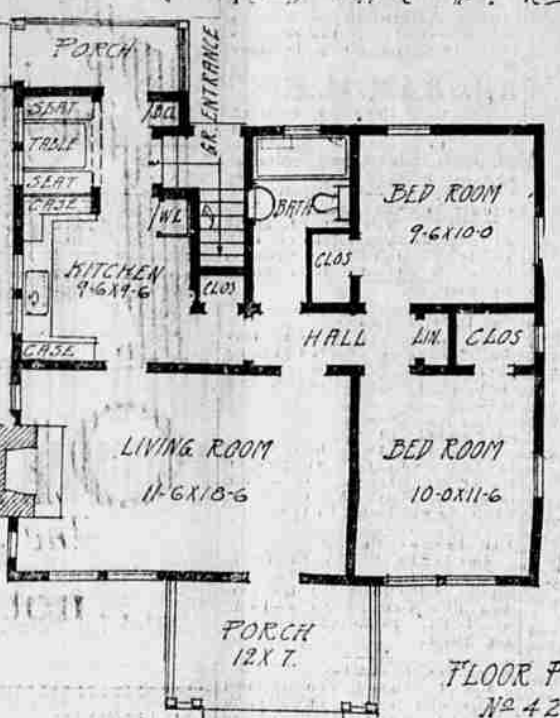
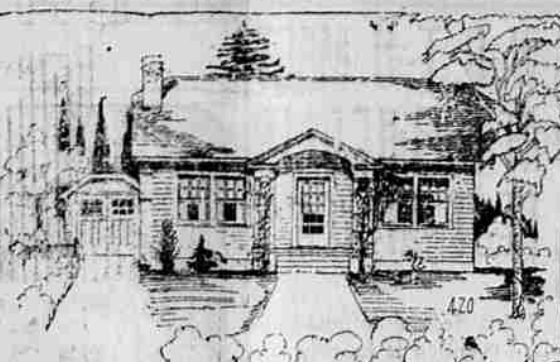
RICH JADE FOUND NEAR WEDDERBURN

Pittsburgh, Princeton, Dartmouth, New York University, Washington and Jefferson, Syracuse, Cornell and Army have clear slates and Pittsburgh and Princeton have kept their goal lines inviolate.

Still further reductions in the charmed circle are in prospect for next Saturday. Princeton invades Ithaca for its clash with Cornell. Syracuse plays host to Penn State at Syracuse. Yale tackles Army at New Haven. Dartmouth plays in the Harvard Stadium against an improving crimson team.

Washington and Jefferson will go to Easton, Pa., to test its strength against Lafayette, still unbeaten, but lost last Saturday by West Virginia. Pittsburgh entertains Carnegie Tech, a victim of W. and J. by a 20-0 score. New York University, the eighth member of the select group, is not expected to have much difficulty with Rutgers in the metropolitan.

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STATE-WIDE TEST BEING CONDUCTED BY U. OF O. BUREAU

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 17.—A statewide movement in education, centering on diagnostic testing in elementary and high schools, is now on. It was brought out at the session on diagnostic testing which was held at the public library Friday and Saturday under the auspices of the University of Oregon educational bureau.

At the session, which was attended by more than 150 principals and teachers from all parts of the state, it was learned that diagnostic tests are already being used in 17 school districts outside of Portland and Eugene, and that pupils are actually being taught according to test results. This was shown by statistics presented by J. O. McLaughlin, superintendent of schools of Corvallis.

Much of the work is expected to center around the Educational Service Bureau of the University of Oregon. This bureau and the work it has planned was explained in detail by Dr. C. L. Huffaker, of the school of education.

The university bureau has a threefold purpose, it was stated. It will assist with diagnostic tests and furnish material, it will assist and train teachers to give tests and use results, and it will also offer material on school finances.

Work in the Portland schools along diagnostic lines was described today by C. A. Rice, superintendent of schools of Portland. At present an experiment in arithmetic tests is being carried out very successfully, he stated, and with this data, students are so helped that they can make rapid progress.

Diagnostic testing, a form of controlled experiment in education, was hailed as one of the most foremost steps of this age by Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the University of Oregon, who delivered one of the most interesting addresses of the session. This testing represents a definite move toward more scientific methods of education and science in this field was held absolutely essential for the progress of work civilization.

Definite data on testing was given to those present by Worin McClure, assistant superintendent of schools of Seattle. Mr. McClure, who is one of the outstanding authorities in this field, urged that only proven tests be used, and these be given with care, and that results actually be used. Tests to determine progress should always follow the initial effort, he pointed out, and the individual pupil should be urged to better his own marks, and not enter the test on a competitive basis with others.

Methods of testing according to the diagnostic system differ greatly from the old form of "examinations." Under the new method students are given examinations first, their weaknesses and strong points ascertained, and then taught accordingly. Mr. McClure stated. Repeated tests not only show the progress but also places where students are weak, it was pointed out.

Enthusiastic discussions were held on all phases of the subjects, following each lecture, and a great deal of interest in specific projects was shown. It is expected that

MOOSE A MENACE TO LOWER UMPQUA

Residents of the Fiddle creek section, Ada and Lake Takeren districts and Smith River from Reedport are signing a petition asking the Oregon State Game Commission to remove the moose herd from this section of the state, says the Port Umpqua Courier. The petitions have been circulating during the past few days and several hundred names have been signed to them.

The petitions declare that the animals are a menace to the unprotected person and destroy property and crops. Since the animals have been placed there a number of years ago, the commission hoped that they would develop into game animals, but reports have come from there telling about the depredations of the animals. Considerable publicity was given them by the press last year when one bull moose went on a rampage in the Smith River country.

A report is to the effect that one of the animals had been found dead in an orchard on Fiddle creek, and that one of the animals was knocked from an embankment by a railroad train and that one of the older ones was blinded by a shot some time ago.
