cell. The superintendents named were: evangelistic, Mrs. R. L. Eddy; Christian citizenship, Mrs. L. N. Tuttle; Sunday school, Mrs. E. E. Woodcock; S. F. L., Mrs. V. J. Mitchell; flower mission, Mrs. R. A. Busenbark; farm home, Mrs. G. W. Young; anti-narcotics, Mrs. Olive Beltes; press, Mrs. Helen R. Ferguson; motion pictures, Mrs. Fred Fisher; medal contests, Mrs. Edith S. Ackert.

Nonette prayer was conducted by Rev. Trites after which a luncheon was served to the convention visitors at the church parlors.

The afternoon session opened with the memorial service and thank offering, conducted by Mrs. B. L. Eddy of Roseburg. She quoted several appropriate texts from the Bible for her talk. A loving tribute to the union to the memory of Mrs. Seranton of Camas Valley was given by Mrs. Lillian B. Davis of Roseburg. Mrs. W. W. Ashcraft of Roseburg, accompanied by Mrs. E. A. Boning, gave a pleasing vocal solo.

Department work, taken up by the superintendents, was one of the afternoon's features. Anti-narcotics was the subject discussed on by Mrs. Olive Beltes, who pointed out the need of the suppression of the cigarette habit, especially among minors, and told of plans to have the narcotics law posted in the stores. In her talk on the Children's Farm Home, Mrs. G. W. Young of Roseburg told of generous help given to that institution and suggested that more fresh fruit be donated by those interested in the home.

"The Importance of the Flower Mission" was the subject Mrs. R. A. Busenbark had and she urged all unions to take special interest in that work.

The feature of the entire convention was the talk by Miss Maud M. Aldrich, the national speaker. Miss Aldrich told of the importance of organizing the young people into the L. T. L. and the Y. P. B. auxiliaries to the W. C. T. U. and gave some especially interesting points.

Mrs. Edith S. Ackert of Roseburg reported of several medal contests which have been in the county and urged the union to carry on this educational work. The press, the importance of advertising the W. C. T. U. meetings and the reporting of the meetings in the local papers, for which she expressed appreciation for the union to the editor of the News-Review, was the theme of the talk given by Mrs. R. Ferguson of Roseburg. Mrs. E. E. Woodcock spoke on Sunday school work, stating that she believed there was never a time that there was more need of consecrated work in the country's Sunday schools than at the present time. An interesting report of the number of essays written in the schools and posters made by the pupils and S. T. U. work was given by Mrs. V. J. Mitchell. Mrs. W. E. Boise, delegate to the National W. C. T. U. convention in Minneapolis, in her "Glimpses of the National Convention," told a part of the great work that was done there, stating that there were 57,000 new members added to the union and that the slogan adopted is "Prohibition is the Best Method."

At the evening session there was special music. The singing of "America" by the audience was followed by the American Creed and salute to the flag. Rev. Lamb conducted the devotionals. Merle Clark of Roseburg sang a pleasing religious number and was enthusiastically applauded, to which he responded with an encore.

Miss Maud M. Aldrich was the speaker on the evening program and she talked on the open saloon of the past, with its allurements being far more dangerous in comparison with the bootlegging of today. She also deplored the spread of propaganda concerning drinking among college students, stating that many false statements had been made on the subject. In speaking on motion pictures, she earnestly urged that federal censorship be secured, that the pictures presented be clean and educational, especially for the young people. Her address was ably delivered and was thoroughly enjoyed by the convention delegates. A song by Mrs. Charles Hartley

of Sutherlin was greatly enjoyed and was followed by the benediction pronounced by Rev. Trites, closing the convention.

The following resolutions have been adopted by the convention: Be it resolved that, We, the members of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, in convention assembled, continue to stand for all the principles of the organization; and protest against the illicit manufacture of intoxicants; and plead for better obedience to law.

Resolved that we protest against the use of narcotics in any form and against the use of women's pictures on cigarette advertisements displayed in magazines, newspapers and on bill boards.

Resolved that we extend a hearty vote of thanks to the Sutherlin union for their generous hospitality, to Rev. Trites and his wife for their untiring efforts to make us welcome and comfortable, to Miss Maud M. Aldrich, national director of motion pictures for her able assistance so graciously given, and to all those who assisted in any way to make the convention a success.

FLIER JUMPS 20 FEET AS PLANE CRASHES TO EARTH

ELKO, Nevada, Oct. 17.—The bi-plane Wanda, piloted by Captain Frederick A. Giles of Detroit, crashed here today shortly after resuming its flight from Detroit to New Zealand. Giles was only slightly injured.

Giles jumped twenty feet to the ground as the accident occurred, but the plane, traveling fast, headed into a deep ditch. The flier declared his only injury was a bruise in the left arm.

The aviator declared the plane was not damaged except the lower left wing, left wheel and propeller. The motor, he said, was not damaged.

Giles said he would make further announcements as to his immediate plans late today.

Delays and mishaps have been encountered by Captain Giles ever since he started preparations for his flight to Wellington, New Zealand. Originally he had planned to leave Detroit early last August and reach the Antipodes in five hops. He made several false starts from Detroit in August and finally flew to Chicago September 22 after making a forced landing in Indiana. His trip westward from Chicago has been punctuated with mishaps.

DISCUSS SAFETY CODE

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 17.—A code of safety standards will be discussed and possibly adopted at a conference in Portland tonight at the branch offices state industrial accident commission.

Members of the commission, the state department of labor, representatives of the employers of the state and of labor will attend. The code applies to power transmission apparatus and the standards are designed to safeguard the recognized hazards of industry. The code as it will be presented tonight was prepared by a sub-committee of a general committee appointed by the accident commission. The members of the sub-committee were: E. E. 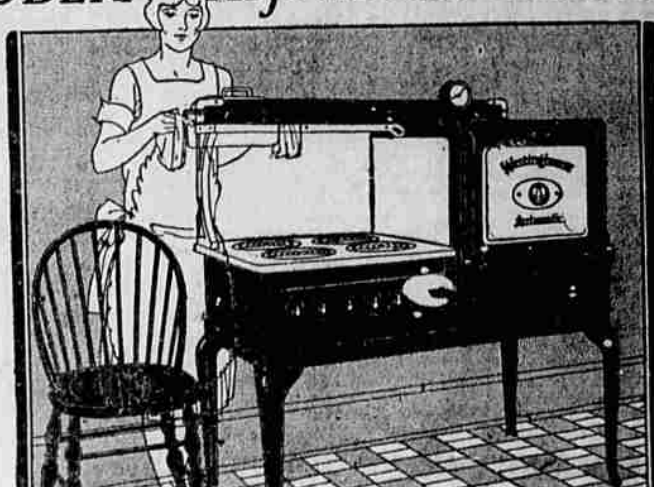
Enroute South—
