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FALL'S POLICY ON OIL LEASES ONE OF SECRECY

ing the three minutes' her aged husband was on his feet.

Defense counsel had been seeking over objections by special government counsel to obtain from Finney an interpretation of the placer mining and general leasing laws. Justice Silldons had repeatedly ruled on their questions, largely on the ground that they were not proper cross-examination. He said these matters might go in later when the defense presented its case, although he frequently said that the laws spoke for themselves unless some regulations were promulgated under them.

Following Fall's remarks to the court, Justice Silldons and George P. Hoover of defense counsel had a spirited inter-chance in which the court insisted that he considered the so-called policy letter, offered yesterday by the government, as perfectly clear and as speaking for itself.

This letter was written by Edwin Denby, as secretary of the navy, to Fall, outlining the policy as to leasing naval reserves.

Hoover repeatedly told the court he was not asking Finney "what he thought was under that letter, but what they did under this policy letter."

"I am not myself able to see any obscenity in this letter," Justice Silldons said, "so the objection is sustained. You may have your exception."

As the cross-examination of Finney proceeded, Hoover and Owen J. Roberts, government counsel, renewed their spat of yesterday, at one point Roberts objected to a question but as Hoover started to argue he said: "I withdraw the objection."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—Introducing testimony designed to show that Albert B. McFall's desire for secrecy as to his negotiations with Harry F. Sinclair for the lease of Teapot Dome went to the extent of misleading other applicants for the naval oil reserve, special government oil counsel continued their assaults today at the trial of the two men on charges of criminal conspiracy.

Recalling E. C. Finney, assistant secretary of the interior under Fall, who testified yesterday, Owen J. Roberts, of government counsel, introduced letters written by interior officials to inquirers about the lease. An early as February 25, 1922, C. B. Aipland of Minneapolis inquired whether the lease of Teapot Dome was in prospect. Finney replied that no lease had been granted and that no orders had been issued for opening up the reserve to leasing.

"Did you have knowledge that Fall was negotiating a lease with Sinclair at that time?" inquired

Roberts. "Yes, I did," Finney replied. "Then, why did you make such a reply to Mr. Aipland?"

"Because the policy was not to give out any information on the subject,"

"From whom did you get that?" "I understood that was the secretary's desire."

"I was advised by the secretary himself and also by the contents of one or two letters I saw."

Fall followed this line of examination very closely. He appeared in better physical shape than heretofore and said he felt much better. Mrs. Fall, who has

been indisposed for two days, also was able to be back in the court room.

Before court convened, the former interior secretary told newspaper men that his "exultant" letter to Edward L. Doherty, as associate Justice Butler of the supreme court has denominated it, would be explained to the jury "even if I have to go on the stand."

He added, however, that whether he would take the stand had not yet been determined. In the better to Doherty, written in the middle of 1921, Fall said he had obtained control of the administration of the naval reserves and would handle them as he saw fit without consulting with naval authorities except possibly on matters of policy.
