CORN TESTS MADE TO DETERMINE KIND BEST FOR LOCAL USE

With the idea of determining the best varieties of corn for Douglas county, a series of tests have been conducted by the county agent during the past year. Three of these tests have been in the Yoncalla section on the farms of C. R. Dear, J. H. Kruse and J. B. Wilson. Recent checking of the results in the Dear and Kruse farms, at which E. N. Bressman, farm crops specialist from the Oregon experiment station, was present, brought out the fact that some of the corns which have been grown locally in the county are among the best for this section. Golden Glow and a pink variety locally known as the Wilson corn gave the highest yields of dry corn, and matured sufficiently early to be ahead of earliest frost in an average year. Minnesota No. 13 matured well on both farms but did not yield as heavily as the two first mentioned varieties. McKay Yellow Dent produced the largest yields of silage, but is somewhat later in maturing for dry corn than some of the other varieties.

In the tests to determine the best variety for silage on the J. B. Wilson farm, the McKay Yellow Dent gave the highest yield, followed by Coon White Dent, Golden Glow and Minnesota No. 13.

Although one of the most important corn growing counties of the Northwest, statistics show a rather large annual importation of eastern corn into Douglas county. This corn is used largely in the feeding and fattening of turkeys. However, much money could be kept at home if the acreage of corn were increased to an extent to meet local needs.

That corn is well suited to Douglas County is attested by the fact that the first prize for the best corn at the recent State Fair at Salem, was given to O. C. Brown of Dixonville. Corn does well on the stronger soils of the county such as the black mud and the river bottom lands. It is not so well suited to the upland areas in their present state of fertility.

QUALITY AT LOW COST

"AMERICA IS DRUNK WITH POWER" SAYS COLLEGE PROFESSOR

LA CROSSE, Wis., Oct. 20—"America is drunk with power tottering with wealth and insane with an orgy of self-expression," George Chester Wice, professor of modern languages at Parsons College, Fairfield, Iowa, declared today at the international purity conference.

The lawlessness, unbelief, vice, crime, divorce, unnatural affection, degeneration and anarchy in the country today proves the assertion, he said.

In order to guide youth's way over the roads of life, in an effort to avoid such tremendous pitfalls, Professor Wice suggested that old men and grey haired women be called upon to formulate laws of life.

Charles Sherman Bodwell, Boston, general secretary of the New England Watch and Ward Society, declared that the reformers were "not necessarily natural born trouble makers or disturbers of the peace." Hostility to vice, he said, has naturally arisen in the minds of many people as a result of calamities occurring in their families so that warfare against vice amounts to a justifiable family feud.

Creation of a new department in the national government to deal entirely with problems of the home was suggested by Dr. Emma F. A. Drake, Portland, Oregon.

The conference voted to solicit \$30,000 for the purpose of financing a world purity congress to be held in 1929.
