Of the three hundred members, around sixty per cent are girls and they have been working faithfully in various divisions. TEAPOT DOME LEASED BECAUSE OF DRAINAGE

(Continued from page 1.)

The high spots in the lease signed by Sinclair.

It was after receipt of this letter that Senator LaFollette set in motion machinery of the senate, the operation of which resulted in the sensational investigation of 1923-24.

As the correspondence was read and as Smith continued his testimony, Fall appeared calmer than he did on yesterday when he startled attorneys and spectators by suddenly rising from his seat and addressing the court in an effort to have admitted testimony he said was vital to his defense.

He was watched closely by spectators who apparently were waiting some other dramatic move on his part. Smith told the court that he sent geologist, K. C. Heald, to Teapot Dome at the suggestion of Fall to investigate reported danger of drainage.

"Heald told Secretary Fall in my presence," said Dr. Smith, "that there was no imminent danger of drainage in Teapot Dome. I do not remember that I did more at that time than to vouch for Heald."

"Three days later I went to Fall's office transcript of Heald's oral statement, which I gave the secretary. After that I was not consulted by Fall about Teapot Dome at any time."

Questioned by the court, Dr. Smith said Heald was sent to Teapot Dome because of a report made in September, 1921, by Carl H. Waggerman, a government geologist, that there was danger of drainage in Teapot Dome.

Heald who now is staff geologist of the Gulf Oil company, identified his report which recommended against leasing the entire Teapot Dome reserve but said there was some danger of drainage in the northern part, adjacent to the Salt Creek field.

Martin W. Littleton of New York, of counsel for Sinclair, took up the cross-examination for the first time in the trial. He developed that

Waggerman was the geologist who "laid out" Teapot Dome before his withdrawal in 1915 by President Wilson.

"Were you asked to do any particular thing when you were sent to Teapot Dome?" Littleton inquired.

"I was asked to prove or disprove Waggerman's map and report as to the danger of drainage," Heald replied. The witness disclosed that the Waggerman report telling of drainage danger was in fact prepared by another geologist. He had no recollection that he saw that report in Washington but he did see it in Denver.

"As a matter of fact you found that Waggerman's allocation of the 'saddle' in Teapot Dome was correct?" Littleton pursued.

"Yes," Heald replied. "The 'saddle' was presumed to protect the whole reserve from drainage to the north. It was found to be little more than a mile from the northern edge of the reserve."

The defense attorney developed that Heald was on Teapot Dome only an hour, but that he failed to advise Fall of that fact or any circumstances on which he based his report.

DEPARTMENT HEADS REDUCING EXPENSES (Associated Press Leased Wire)

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 21.—That state department heads are cooperating with Governor Patterson in his determination to reduce operating expenses to show by departmental reports just compiled by the governor.

For the six months period from January to June inclusive the governor finds that six of the major state departments operating on a fee or license basis have increased their revenues from \$1,001,922.52 to \$1,063,093.98, an increase of \$61,171.46 for the period, while operating expenses have been reduced by the same departments from \$128,591.33 to \$124,644.89, a reduction of \$3,946.44 for the period.

The departments covered in the survey are the prohibition department, insurance commission, state fire marshal, real estate division, state market agent, and the corporation department.

Governor Patterson is working out a plan that contemplates quarterly reports of all incomes and expenditures from all the state departments, and says he intends to keep a close check upon all disbursements with the object of securing full cooperation in the lessening of expenses.

PRUNES WILL GET PROMINENT DISPLAY

Prunes, the major crop of Douglas county, are coming in for much attention at the Horticultural and Corn Show next week, when displays from growers all over the county will be exhibited. The displays will be especially fine this year owing to the fact that the fruit in this county runs to large sizes and is of excellent quality, making possible superior exhibits.

While growers will exhibit the best of their crop, a packing plant, the Drager Fruit company will have a prime booth at the fair and they promise the largest and best display of dried prunes ever seen in the county. A special booth is being arranged and over one hundred boxes of prunes will be on display.

As a special educational feature the Drager Fruit company is bringing two hundred pounds of prunes from Washington and other sections of Oregon to be used in comparison with the local fruit, showing the superiority of the Douglas

prunes this year, in point of size, quality and flavor.

E. A. Busenbark, chairman of the prunes division of the fair, reports much interest among the growers, and expects a large display of the fruit that is now the chief crop of the county.
