IMPROVEMENTS ARE NOW BEING MADE AT STEPHENS GARAGE

AUTO LICENSE CHANGE WOULD INCREASE TAX

Reduction in Motor Fees
Would Hit Real
Property.

STOP ROAD PROGRAM

Road Bonds Voted With
Definite Retirement Plan
in Mind—Change
Would Disrupt.

(By Oregon Motor Association)
Should the proposed initiative petition calling for a decrease in the automobile license fee from the present rate of \$1.00 to \$0.75 be approved, by the people and become a law, not only would the state highway program be stopped instantly, but the obligation of some thirty-four million dollars in highway bonds would fall as a direct tax upon general property and would be apportioned to each county as shown by the accompanying table.

The burden of highway financing as originally voted rests entirely upon the motorist so long as the present system is adhered to. But if the proposed initiative measure should pass the outstanding bonds both interest and principal would become a direct obligation of the state, and general property would be compelled to take up this obligation by paying interest and principal on the bonds as retired. This would mean the payment by a general property tax of a total of \$2,241,115.50 as shown by the accompanying table, and the last payment would not be made until 1940.

Not only would this huge sum have to be raised by general taxation but the state highway construction would stop immediately and all future work on the highway program would be abandoned.

This would mean that sections of the state who voted for the issuing of millions of dollars worth of highway bonds with the understanding that the highway program continued would be carried to completion, will not be given the roads promised them.

Citizens of Oregon voted for the highway system and the assurance of homes under the proposed financing plan. Bond companies and investors bought the authorized bonds after investigations based on the existing financial plan of license fee and gas tax, which were said to be, and have since proved to be, a safe and economic method for raising sufficient funds for paying interest and retiring bonds.

There is an obligation on the part of the citizens of this state to continue the existing method of financing under which investments were made until such time as the retirement of bonds has made that provision one of minor importance. There is also a direct obligation on the part of the state to see that those sections of the state where promised construction has not taken place receive roads due them.

When these obligations have been met or at least brought to a point of completion where road improvement would not endanger the existing highway program, suggestions for tax reduction will be more opportune than at present.

According to the present plan, the pole is to be between 75 and 100 feet in height and the size of the flag is to be determined, so that it will be appropriate to the height of the pole.

The contemplated cost to be borne by the American Legion is estimated at \$100.

JAS. FARRELL MAY TAKE PLACE OF ELBERT GARY

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Choice of James A. Farrell, president of the United States Steel Corporation, as chairman of the board in succession to Elbert H. Gary is predicted by B. C. Forbes in the current issue of Forbes' magazine.

This statement, which came on the eve of the first quarterly meeting today of the corporation's directors since Mr. Gary's death, was considered in well informed steel quarters to be in line with Wall Street reports widely circulated since August 15, from which time Mr. Farrell has presided at the weekly meetings of the steel corporations finance committee.

Formal selection of Mr. Farrell was not expected at today's meeting, however, in view of statements by him and by Percival Roberts, Jr., director and member of the finance committee.

Mr. Farrell, at his home in South Norfolk, Conn., said he understood there would be no action as to the selection of a successor to Mr. Gary until the November meeting of the board of directors. Mr. Roberts was quoted as declaring no change had been made in the executive personnel of the corporation.

The determination of the directors to take no present action is associated in some quarters with the fact that J. E. Moran, a member of the board, is still abroad. His return to New York is set for next month.
