HIGHWAY BODY IS IN SESSION TODAY

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 25.—Work on the Springfield bridge on the McKenzie Highway will be started soon.

County Judge Bernard, of Eugene, urged the state highway commission today to hasten this work, saying that the present bridge was greatly overtaxed. The structure will cost about \$175,000.

It has been delayed because the Southern Pacific railroad objected to cooperation and failed to accept plans to eliminate a dangerous grade crossing. It was said. This matter will be presented to the state police service commission soon. But no matter what the Southern Pacific decision is, the bridge will be hurried.

A large delegation appeared from Marshfield to urge a bridge over Coos Bay to East Side. This structure, with approaches, and a realignment of the Roosevelt highway to join it would cost about \$1,000,000.

Coos county has \$300,000 to give for cooperation. The highway commission, after listening to arguments presented by County Judge Mast and Attorney A. K. Beck, decided to hold a public hearing on the proposal at the November meeting of the commission.

North Bend folk and shipping interests are objecting to this bridge. It was stated that the ferry now being used will have to be replaced soon. No action will be taken by the highway commission until all factions in Coos county are heard.

The commission ordered cooperation by the state in making two large fills that do away with bridges at Larsen and Haines sloughs on the Roosevelt highway between North Bend and Haines.

P. H. Chambers, representing Eugene Chamber of Commerce, needed for the state to keep the McKenzie Pass open for traffic throughout the winter.

C. E. Gates of Medford, member of the highway commission, was unable to be present today, owing to illness. It is the first meeting he has missed since his appointment.

There was lively bidding on road and bridge projects this morning.

Bids were opened on the following projects:

Surfacing 14.5 miles of the Umpqua section of the Baker-Unity highway in Baker county.

Furnishing crushed rock for maintenance materials for the Arlington-Pendleton section of the Old Oregon Trail.

Furnishing crushed rock for Kono-Klamath Falls section of the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway.

Grading 3.5 miles of the east unit of Lowell-Goodman Creek section of the Willamette Highway in Lane county.

Bridge over Parrott Creek at New Era.

Bridge over Yamhill River on McMinnville-Tillamook highway six miles west of Willamina.

Construction of buildings for storage of equipment at Primeville and Bend.

LEEPER DOME OIL LEASES ARE SOLD AT SHERIFF'S SALE

P. M. Morgan Invests More Heavily Following Report Made by Prominent Geologist.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

P. M. Morgan today purchased at sheriff's sale, the leases of W. C. Currier in the Leeper Dome district. Mr. Morgan, who was interested with Sparks and Currier in the Leeper Dome operations, has now purchased the interests of both of his former partners in the leases held by them, and consequently is heavily concerned in the future operations in that district.

Mr. Morgan upon his return to Roseburg recently was accompanied by C. C. Fristow, one of the most noted geologists of the country, who made an examination of the Leeper Dome formation. Mr. Fristow has been connected with some of the largest oil fields and is an accepted authority in oil circles. He was engaged privately by Mr. Morgan to whom his report was made, and the fact that Mr. Morgan immediately invested more heavily in the properties is given as cause to believe that the geologist's report was of a favorable nature.

The leases were bid in by Stearns and Chenoweth, who brought suit against Mr. Currier and foreclosed on his holdings, but through agreement made by the purchasers with Mr. Morgan the latter purchased the leases and the sheriff's certificate was issued to him.

The drilling at Leeper Dome, that has been held up because of litigation, will be resumed within the next few days, according to Mr. Cobb, manager of the Oakland Oil company.

WOMAN SUING FOR \$60,000 DENIES SHE WAS DRUNK

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 25.—Mrs. Adaline M. Gates, plaintiff in a \$60,000 breach of promise suit against R. Russell Smith, former northwest golf champion, after hearing witnesses say she frequently was drunk, declared on the stand today "it's a lie!"

H. C. Spicer and John S. Napier, testified she often was so drunk that she was unable to stand, and often had to be carried to bed.

Neither witness could remember ever having heard her refuse a cocktail or highball.

Smith, under cross-examination, declared he could recall very distinctly never having asked Mrs. Gates to become his wife. On the night of May 10, 1922, when he was alleged by the plaintiff to have proposed he remembered that he had gone with Mrs. Gates to the apartment of a friend.

He could not remember anything about a dinner in her room at a hotel preceding the apartment visit, but he recalled drinks he had taken in her room. He could not recall details of conversation.
