BOY MET DEATH
IN AN ACCIDENT

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 27.—Opinion that accidental discharge of his own gun killed Earl Pierce, 13-year-old Eugene boy, was expressed today by Inspector Robert Craddock, ballistic expert of the Portland police department. Craddock made the deduction after microscopic examination of the shell in the boy's rifle, saying that the impression made by the hammer indicated it was caused by more than ordinary pressure.

That the boy was dragging the gun by the barrel or dropped it and the trigger came in contact with some object, causing the explosion, was the view voiced by Craddock. He said the shell was punctured by the impact of the hammer, which indicated that unusual force accompanied the discharge of the shot. Ordinarily such a puncture would not be caused by pulling a trigger by hand, said Craddock.

The shell and fragments of the bullet taken from the boy's body were brought here by Sheriff Frank E. Taylor of Lane county, who started an investigation to clear up the mystery surrounding the death of the boy.

Earl Pierce's body was found in a wooded section of the Cascade range, near Swishmore Tuesday after a six-day search had been made for him. The body was not far from the spot where the boy was last seen alive last Thursday, when he was left by his father with instructions to wait until the father returned.

The fragments of the bullet brought by Sheriff Taylor were a trifle short of the normal weight of a 30-20 rifle bullet, said Craddock. He based his opinion entirely on the study of the condition of the shell.

Sheriff Taylor told newspaper men after his conference with Craddock that he was convinced that the boy met accidental death.

PARALYSIS VICTIM

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 27.—Infantile paralysis, combined with spinal meningitis, caused the death of DeLore O'Hern, 8, within 48 hours of contraction, the city health office was advised today.

HEART ATTACK FATAL

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 27.—Miss Gertrude Oberg, 21, clerk in the stationery department at Olds, Wortman and Kline, was taken ill while at work today and died before medical attention could be given. She was apparently in good health when she went to work, her associates said.

Death is believed to have been caused by a heart attack.

BLOODED STOCK
ARRIVES FOR SHOW

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 27.—Bearing the elite of the livestockdom a thirty-car stock train arrived here today from the east with horses, cattle, swine and a large retinue of caretakers.

They came to participate in the Pacific International Livestock Exposition which opens Saturday. Two Pullman cars attached to the train carried prominent exhibitors and breeders.

Seventeen horseshow exhibitors, with 90 steeds from eastern states and Canada, were on board.

Stables and pens have been filling during the past week with other entries from Pacific and other western states.

WINNER IN MATCH

OWNERS OF PUNCH
BOARDS ARE GIVEN
WARNING BY SHERIFF

A warning is being issued today to pool hall, confectionary and cigar store owners, and other places where punch boards, gun machines and other devices banned by the state laws are in operation that arrests will be made if these devices are continued. District Attorney Craddock has received numerous complaints that punch boards and "hickey" machines are being operated in violation of the law, and he has given instructions to Sheriff Webb and his deputies to see that these are no longer operated. Rather than make wholesale arrests the officers are advising the persons operating such devices that the law is to be made operative and arrests will follow if violations continue. In Roseburg the law has been kept fairly well enforced and very few of these devices are in use, but it is reported that in many of the other towns the same conditions do not exist.

On a double step-over toe-hold, O'Dale came back strong, picking Warner up two times and hurling him back to the mat. Warner was unable to continue for the third fall. The second fall was made by O'Dale in 14 minutes, 43 seconds.

A Ford car belonging to Sam Campbell was stolen last night from in front of the Liberty theatre, but was recovered this morning near the Benson school, where it had been abandoned. The machine had been stripped of its battery, coils, gasoline and accessories.

OLD ORCHARD, Maine, Oct. 27.—While reports were in circulation this afternoon that the Grayson plane, the Dawn, had been wrecked near Saco river four miles below Biddeford, she was in the air off the beach here, having a three-hour test of her new engine.

An erroneous report had stated that she had fallen near Perry Lane.

MEDFORD HOSTILE
OVER FALSE REPORT

MEDFORD, Ore., Oct. 27.—The public health department today authorized a statement denying newspaper reports in other cities on the coast that Medford is suffering from a typhoid epidemic. According to the statement there is some typhoid in Medford, from which two deaths have resulted, but it is not in epidemic form and no new cases have been reported since the first of the week. The cause has been traced to a milk supply, and the contamination corrected.

Medford's new water supply is declared 100 per cent pure. The infantile paralysis quarantine has been raised and the department declares health conditions in general are good.

COPCO TO ISSUE STOCK

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 27.—The California-Oregon Power company has been granted authority by the state railroad commission to issue and sell on or before June 30, 1928, at not less than \$96 per share 15,000 shares of its six percent preferred stock of an aggregate par value of \$1,500,000 and \$1,000,000 of its 15 year 5 percent debentures at not less than \$4 and one-half per cent of face value, plus accrued interest. The proceeds will be used to pay in debentures to the Standard Gas and Electric company and to finance additions and betterments.

As Miss Elder stepped aboard the plane, a Junkers passenger machine, dozens of cameras clicked.

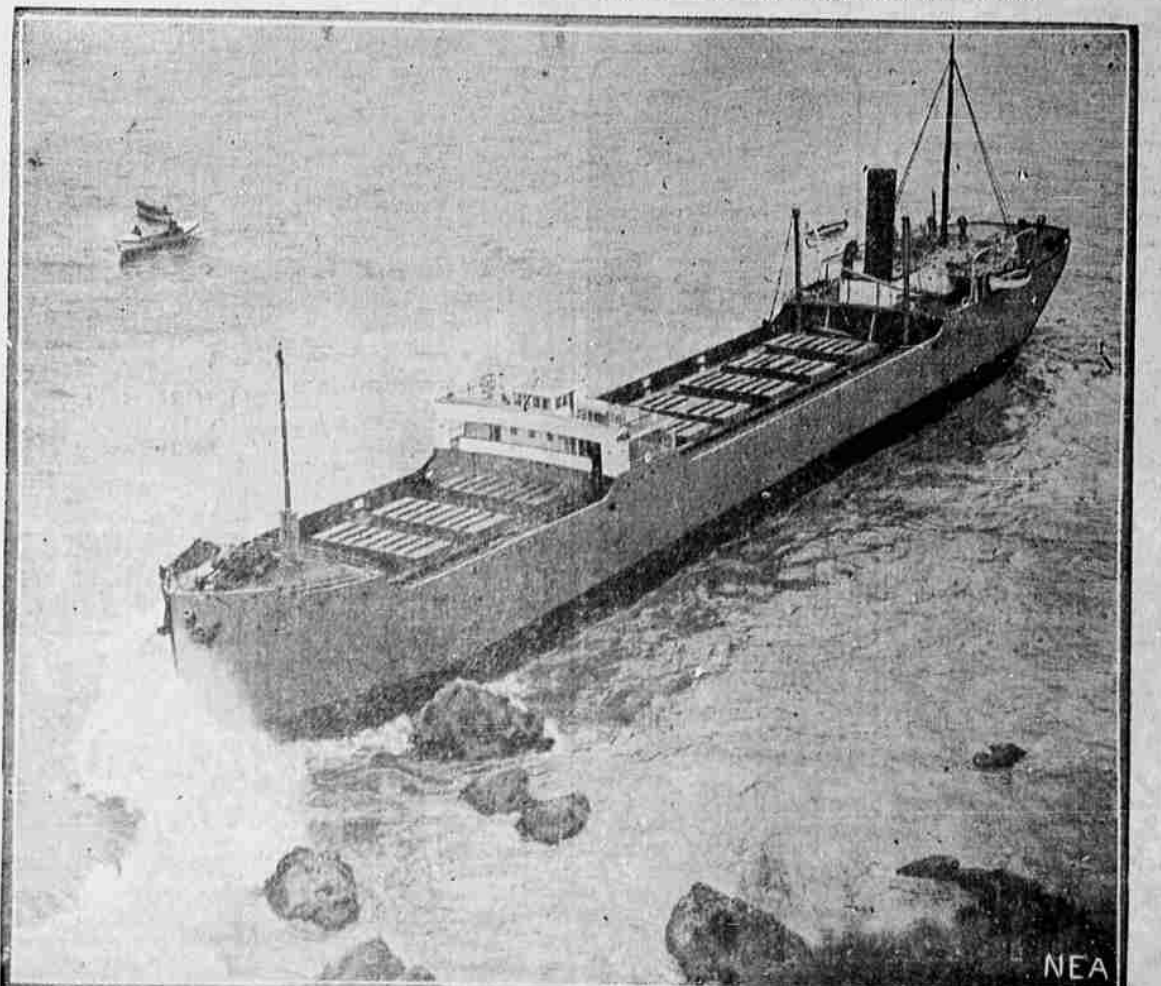

Rocks of Lands End Claim Steamer Cools Bay, Former American Naval Collier



The steamer Cools Bay, formerly the naval collier Vulcan, is breaking up fast on the rocks of Lands End, San Francisco, where she crashed in a heavy fog. Thirty-three crew members and the captain were taken off safely. The vessel was the largest lumber carrier on the Pacific coast, and was outward bound at the time of the accident.
