with his real estate business but on account of property interests in California was compelled to dispose of same and is moving to Los Angeles.

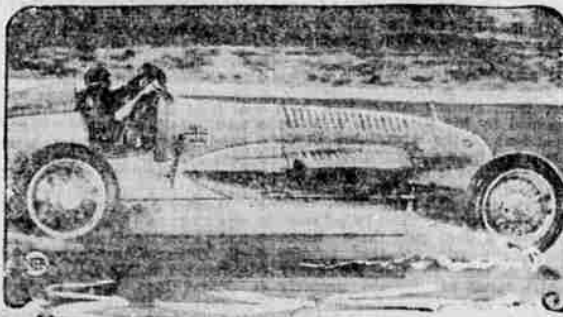
