GRANTS PASS, Ore., Oct. 28.—Only 62 acres of forests within the boundaries of the Sixtyfour National forest, despite the use of these forests by 71,440 persons. TRAIN HITS CAR NEAR RICKREALL AND 2 ARE DEAD

Woman Not Expected to Live as Result of Crash.

GRANTS PASS FOLKS

No Explanation of Wreck Given as Visibility of Crossing Said to Be Good at Point.

(Associated Press Local Wire)

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 28.—Sylvester Decker of Hugo, Oregon, near Grants Pass, and Allen Decker, of McCoy, Polk county, were killed and Mrs. Sylvester Decker possibly fatally injured about 8:35 o'clock this morning when their automobile was struck at Nesmith station crossing by a Southern Pacific gasoline car. Nesmith station is in Polk county on the west side of the Pacific highway about three-fourths of a mile south of Rickreall.

The two men died within 25 minutes after the accident. Mrs. Decker was taken to a hospital at Dallas, where she lies unconscious. Her recovery is doubtful. Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester lived on a homestead at Hugo, Josephine county. For two days they had been visiting at the home of Decker's father, P. M. Decker of McCoy, Polk county, and Allen Decker, was accompanying them back to their home. Mrs. Decker, before her marriage, was Miss Effie Reed of Grants Pass.

The grade crossing where the accident happened is an open one with visibility in both directions, but has been the scene of several serious accidents. About two years ago, Miss Dorothy Kyle of Corvallis was killed at the crossing while motoring with Austin Reed, an Oregon Agricultural College student.

FIRST GAME OF SCHOOL FOOTBALL TOURNAMENT PLAYED

Football fans missed the treat of the season when they failed to see the opening game of the football tournament now in progress. The 7th A and 7th B teams clashed last night in the first contest, the game being won by the 7th B.

The 7th A, however, put up a good fight and might have won if the head line man hadn't discovered they were using 12 players instead of the usual 11. Only three men played in the backfield for the 7th A, the extra one or two being on the line, but an only one man carried the ball. It didn't really make any difference.

The only reason the 7th B won was because they had a big lanky backfield who could outrun all the players on both teams and so when he could get ahead of his interference he didn't have much trouble for a touchdown.

The 7th A also played against a serious handicap in the way of uniforms. Some of the linemen had borrowed helmets from the bigger boys and by the time they made their initial charge they had to stop and untangle themselves from their headgear before they could see which direction the play had taken. It is planned, before they play again, to have them coached in a trick play in which one of the players will squat down when the play starts and his helmet will hide him until he gets an opening to go through and receive a pass. If they use the same size helmets as they had last night the play will work every time.

Anyhow on the next play the same desperate linemen smeared the opposing backfield, which was all he knew about the game and which he did well.

The game moved quite rapidly, in view of the fact that it required considerable time to halt the arguments and get the teams to line up again after each scrimmage.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 28.—Listings on the Portland Dairy Exchange today showed irregular shifting of egg values. Extra grade eggs were bid up a cent to 51 cents per dozen, but firsts were a cent lower at 45 cents and pullets 2 cents down to 35 cents. Underhauled were unchanged.

The butter market was generally firm with dairy exchange quotations unchanged except for standard cubes, listed 1 cent lower at 43 cents.

Most lines of country dressed meats and live poultry are holding steady with trade demand normal, by active and receipts sufficiently

strong to fill needs. Dressed hogs, however, were selling mostly half cent lower than yesterday's decline at around 14 cents for top stuff.

Prices tended lower in several lines of fresh fruits and vegetables while certain varieties of California grapes were quoted at season's high levels on account of curtailed supplies.

California seedless grapes at the Thompson variety are up to \$1.80 to \$1.75 per box. California Tokays are held very firm at \$1.75 per box while Oregon Tokays are quoted at the same figure. Sudden searclies are laid to crop injuries by recent rains.

Red Emperor grapes, a late season variety, are expected to take the place of Tokays from new on, these selling around \$1.75 per box this morning. White Malaga were quoted at \$1.50.

New black walnuts from The Dalles were offered at 12 cents per pound.

SON-IN-LAW OF FALL REFUSES TO GIVE TESTIMONY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—Balked today in its efforts to force testimony from the son-in-law of Albert B. Fall, the government turned to a meticulous tracing of the \$230,500 in Liberty bonds Fall is accused of having received for leasing the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve to Harry F. Sinclair.

M. T. Everhart, an unwilling witness, was upheld by Justice Siddons in refusing to answer the question of where he obtained the securities on the ground that it would tend to incriminate him. Thereafter his testimony, consisted mainly of a succession of answers consisting for the most part of "I decline to reply," and he finally was excused without cross-examination.

Owen J. Roberts, special oil counsel, thru a dozen witnesses then traced movements of bonds to Pueblo, Colorado, Denver, El Paso, Texas, where Fall had an account, and finally brought into the picture the Continental Trading company, Ltd., of Canada, with which the government contends Sinclair was identified, and gained testimony that \$230,500 in Liberty bonds had been obtained in New York in the name of that company, and taken away by H. S. Osler, one of its officers, in a brown paper package.

The government charges that a part of these bonds finally found their way to Fall thru Everhart after the latter had made a trip to New York after the Teapot Dome lease was signed.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—The government was stopped today by Justice Siddons from forcing M. T. Everhart, son-in-law of Albert B. Fall, to disclose the source of \$230,500 in Liberty bonds figuring in the Teapot Dome oil conspiracy trial.

Everhart had declined to answer a question regarding the source of the bonds on the ground that such testimony would tend to incriminate him and that the constitu-
