POOR SISTER OF
ACTRESS WEALTHY

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—An aged and poor sister of Clara Morris—famous emotional actress of the '30 and '40's, whom the tragedienne never saw since their parents, a serving maid and a cabman, parted when the children were babies, is now sole heir to the actress' \$15,000 estate.

Had it not been, however, for an apparently trivial entry in a diary of Clara Morris, speaking of a lost sister, Mrs. Eli A. Burtis, 78 years old, crippled with rheumatism and threatened with blindness might have lived out her life in her tenement, in the Hell's Kitchen district suffering privations of poverty alleviated only by \$30 a month pension paid for her dead husband's Civil war service.

Surrogate Slater visited Mrs. Burtis and took her testimony, considered documentary evidence and at the end of the hearing signed an order declaring her the sister of Clara Morris and sole legatee.

Identification of Mrs. Burtis, who said she had an intuition she and the stage star were sisters, was made thru researches of George MacAdam, Clara Morris' biographer. His search led him from a diary entry to an unclaimed bank account at Buffalo, cemetery and pension records, old city directories, newspaper files, policemen, expressmen and a janitress.

HEROIC RESCUE
OF FOUR SEAMEN

PENZANCE, England, Oct. 28.—Heroic efforts by life savers after a perilous all-night vigil to rescue eleven seamen left clinging to the rigging of the Italian steamer Isabella which went ashore on the Scilly Islands yesterday, were only partially successful, four of the men being saved at dawn.

These four had jumped into the turbulent waters just as soon as daylight broke and were picked up by a lifeboat which had been standing by all night in a raging sea, waiting for daylight and for an opportunity to approach the vessel.

One man was found dead of exposure when the rescue boat was able to reach the stranded ship, which still clung to the jagged rocks upon which she had foundered. There was no trace of the six other men.

The remainder of the crew of 28 landed in a lifeboat last night.

ALBERT CHAMPION
DIES IN FRANCE

DETROIT, Oct. 28.—Albert Champion, who rose from errand boy in Paris, France, to millionaire automobile accessories manufacturer in America, died yesterday in Paris, where he had been looking over branch factories.

His death closed a career as brilliant as that of any Horatio Alger hero.

Born in Paris of a family in moderate circumstances, he became an errand boy in a Paris bicycle shop when 12 years old. His interest turned to bicycle racing and he won the championship of his native country in that sport.

He came to the United States in 1904, becoming a motorcycle and later an automobile racer.

During a race at the old Brighton beach track in 1906 his car crashed and he was seriously injured. He returned to France to recuperate but came back to the United States in 1907. It was then that he became associated with William C. Durant, then president of the Buick Motor Car company.

In 1908 Champion organized at Flint, Michigan, the automobile accessories company which began operations with only 32 employees.

Ten years later the concern had increased its personnel to 3,500 and now has branches and distributing agencies throughout the world.

CHICAGO NOT A
"WINDY CITY" NOW

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—Chicago is known as the "windy city", but is Professor Henry J. Cox, chief United States meteorologist here, says Chicago may once have been the "windy city" but that it is no longer—speaking meteorologically, of course.

Chicago used to have winds that went "who-o-o-o-o", just like the poem says; winds that whistled and howled; winds that lifted top hats—howling down Michigan avenue; winds that made walking for women with flirty skirts a science and an art.

On such winds as these Chicago rode to the nickname "windy city".

Back in 1893 the average wind velocity, Mr. Cox said, was 18.4 miles an hour. Since then, how-

ever, Chicago has tumbled upward and her skyscrapers and tall apartment buildings have formed an aerial breakwater.

In 1900 the velocity averaged 16.6. Five years later it was 15.4. In 1910 it dropped to 13.2; in 1922 to 11.7, and in 1925 to comparative calm of 10.4.

Even without the skyscrapers, Mr. Cox said, Chicago is no windier than any other lake city, and not a bit windier than New York, still speaking meteorologically.

Mr. Cox was careful to point out.

The suggestion was made, however, the designation "windy city" was not based on meteorological considerations at all. Some old timers said that the nickname became popular shortly after the fire of 1871 because those engaged in rebuilding "were plainly bragging about the city of the future."
