sincere and entirely legitimate, for he stoops to no tricks to gain the approval of his audience. When a better vocalism been heard than that attained by Mr. Johnson in his rendition of Hageman's "When We Were Parted?"

His concert this season will take to many cities including Beilington (for three concerts), Spokane, Vancouver, B. C., Portland, The Dalles, Salem, Astoria, Roseburg and many others.

In an article which he has recently written for "Music and Musicians" and which will appear in that publication at an early date, the tenor states his belief in the value of the relationship between singer and accompanist. Mr. Johnson has found that many people, including a surprising number of singers, seem to feel an accompanist is of minor importance. That this is not the case, he refutes by pointing out how helpless singers are without the aid of their accompanists, that accompanists are usually better musicians than singers, that many songs give a decidedly secondary place to the voice part, that some of the world's finest musicians are pianist-accompanists, and that a much wider education and experience is required of an accompanist than of either a pianist or singer.

In his own concert the singer demonstrates that his theories are sound because he and his accompanist, May Van Dyke, are able, though the recognition of the principle of interdependence of singer and pianist, to give a perfection of ensemble very rarely attained. Both perform entirely from memory. There is no reason, says Mr. Johnson, why the accompanist should not learn to play songs from memory. Although this is so, Miss Van Dyke is one of less than a half dozen prominent accompanists that memorizes all songs.

RUMOR SAYS JAR. DINE WILL QUIT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—Reports that Secretary Jardine would resign his cabinet post were persistent today that a date for his departure—December 1—entered into the discussion.

The reports emanated from administration sources which understood that President Coolidge was looking around for a successor to the secretary.

Recently Florida citrus interests broached to Secretary Jardine a proposal that he accept an administrative post in their marketing organization. Mr. Jardine at the time declined, but he contemplated resigning immediately.

Several names are understood to have been suggested for the agricultural post should the present secretary retire. Among these are Robert D. Carey, former governor of Wyoming and chairman of President Coolidge's farm commission of 1924 and J. M. Dixon, former governor of Montana.

When the reports finally reached Secretary Jardine this afternoon, he again said he intended to remain in the cabinet.

WESTERLY GALE HITS ENGLAND; NINE ARE KILLED

LONDON, Oct. 29.—A total of nine deaths and considerable damage to property had been recorded today in a great westerly gale which struck the British Isles last night.

Reports from every part of the country say that houses were damaged, roofs torn off and hundreds of telephone wires swept down. Trains were stalled and roads blocked by fallen trees.

Steamers and boats were torn apart and the Beam wireless service to Australia was discontinued. Lancashire appeared to have felt the full force of the gale, a tidal wave swept the river banks at Lancaster and cut off a portion of a hospital. Sixteen patients were rescued in boats but three were drowned.

The Spanish tanker Arnaus, in distress, was towed in safely to Weymouth.

GIRL COMMITS SUICIDE

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—A young woman who committed suicide here today by leaping from the eighth floor of the Hotel Knickerbocker was identified by William Martin of this city as his wife. She was formerly Rita Nash, whose family was reported as residing in Milford, Mass.
