MUCH INTEREST IN CORN GROWING AS RESULT OF SHOW

Display Held This Week at Armory Expected to Be of Much Future Benefit.

The corn and fruit show held in the armory for the past three days, came to a close yesterday evening, there being a large crowd in attendance each of the three days. One of the results of the show was a revival of interest in corn growing in this county and without doubt there will be a great deal of good result from this effort.

There were 93 entries in corn, and the displays were pronounced to be the finest ever gathered in the state. In fact, corn identical with that taking first prize at the state fair was shown and this corn dropped into second place.

C. R. Briggs, county agent of Benton county, was judge of the corn exhibit, and he was greatly pleased with the fine showing. In judging the ears he gave first consideration to maturity, holding this to be the most important item in judging. Uniformity, shape and deep kernels were also items considered. For this reason some of the prize winning ears were smaller in size than some fine large ears that presented an excellent appearance but were ruled out because of some of the other points. 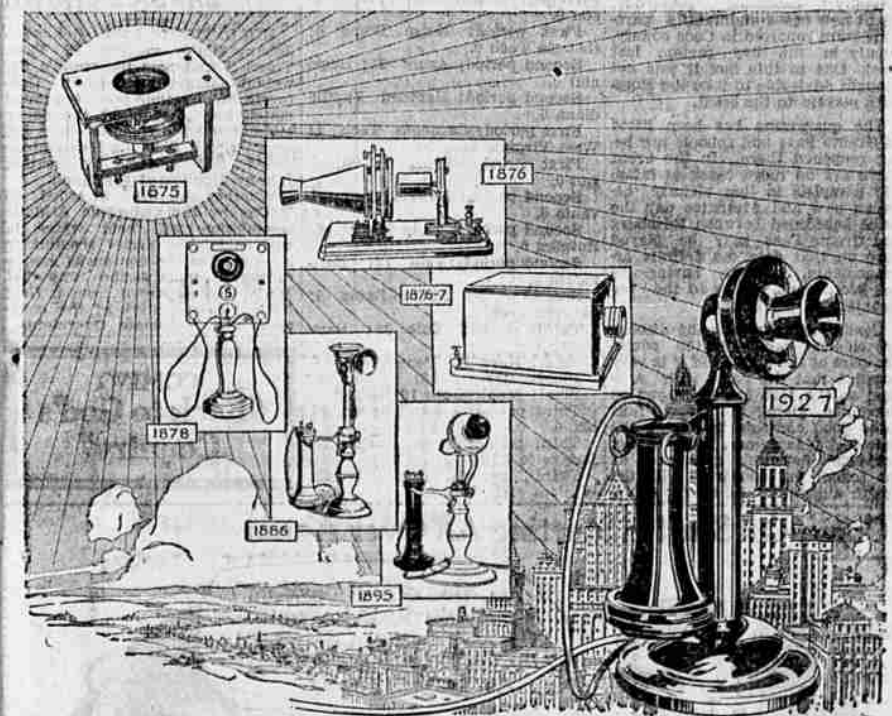

MANY CHANGES IN DESIGN MARK STEPS IN EVOLUTION OF MODERN TELEPHONE



The design of telephone instruments has undergone an interesting change since Alexander Graham Bell started experimenting over fifty years ago, according to J. R. Hartington, speaking with regard to the 30th anniversary observance of Roseburg telephone system, to be celebrated on November 1, 1927. Each advance, however, has embodied the same vital principle discovered by its inventor and each has marked a progressive step toward greater utility in telephony.

Since the first telephone was made half a century ago, there have been in use sixty-four different types and styles of receivers and ninety-six types and styles of transmitters. Bell's first telephone was a crude affair compared with the instruments of today
