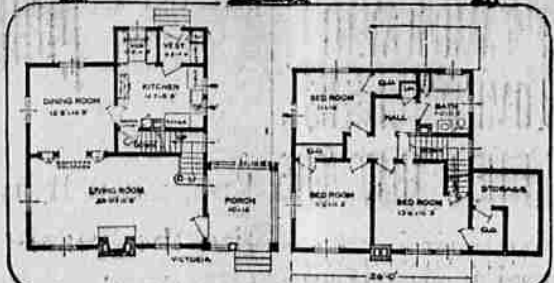

PICKETS ACTIVE IN I. W. W. STRIKE

WALSHEBURG, Colo., Oct. 31.—Pickets were active in the Southern Colorado coal strike zone today despite the warning to strike leaders yesterday by national guard officers sent by Governor W. H. Adams that picketing must stop.

After 52 automobile loads of pickets had been sent from here to the Tobacco mine of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company in Las Animas county, a meeting was held at I. W. W. headquarters here and it was voted, 64 to 1, to stop picketing.

The strike leaders were notified late last night by Adjutant General Paul P. Newton of Governor Adams' request that the picketing cease. A short time later, Roger Francisco, head of the I. W. W. organization, asked that any action be withheld for 30 hours until the governor's message could be submitted to the strikers for a vote. Governor Adams replied that thirty hours grace would be given if picketing was stopped.

Byron Kitta, publicity director of the I. W. W., who attended the conference with the national guard officers here last night, head of the strikers' delegation today, and at a mass meeting at the Tobacco mine said:

"We will picket. We will talk to them to quit work regardless of the men and try to prevail upon the picketing laws of Colorado. They cannot set aside the constitutional rights of free speech."

At the Tobacco mine the miners who desired to work, barricaded themselves in the wash house until the strike demonstration was over. It was announced at the meeting that the pickets would attempt to visit every mine in Southern Colorado today.

Before entering the mine property today, Sheriff Marty and his deputies tried to stop the strikers' demonstration, but they were ignored. The sheriff arrested eight of the men on picketing charges.

All the mines in Huerfano county resumed operations today but with reduced forces.

Aside from the C. F. and I. mine, the Tobacco mine, that were visited by the strikers today, all other mines in Las Animas county reported an increase of miners today.

The strike situation appeared worse in Fremont county, where miners decided last night to suspend work until they were granted the Jacksonville wage scale. They denied, however, that they had accepted I. W. W. leadership.

COURT REFUSES TO REVIEW CASE OF BRITISH SHIP

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—The supreme court today refused to review a case involving the right of the coast guard to board and search a British ship outside the 12 mile limit after it had been observed cruising within that zone. Jacob Voitte and several others convicted in the federal district court of Oregon on the charge of violating the federal prohibition law aboard the "Pescawha" brought the case.

Early in 1925 the "Pescawha" picked up nine members of the crew of the "Caledonia" which had been wrecked in the Pacific during a storm. The revenue cutter "Albatross" was cruising, looking for the shipwrecked crew when it sighted the "Pescawha" about six miles off the Washington coast.

The "Pescawha" was finally intercepted 16 miles off the coast and notwithstanding the protests of her captain and officers she was searched and towed into Astoria after a quantity of liquor had been found aboard.

Her captain and crew were prosecuted for conspiracy to violate the federal prohibition law and for other offenses under that act and convicted.

They protested that the seizure outside the limits in the British run treaty was illegal and that the government had no right to use as evidence papers and liquor found by the search.

PANAMA CANAL IS AN ACTIVE ROUTE

(Associated Press Leased Wire) PANAMA, Oct. 31.—Unofficial data showed that the commercial transit of the Panama Canal for the first thirty days of October established a new high record for a month's period. With one more day to go, 551 vessels have passed through, exceeding the August, 1927, high record by eight merchantmen.

DODGE-PRESIDENT EXPECTS FLOOD OF CAR ORDERS

BETHLEHEM, Oct. 31.—G. W. Wilmer, president of Dodge Brothers, Inc., returned on the Aquitania last week from Europe convinced that the American automotive industry will continue to dominate the world for many years to come.

"Through the use of electric power, automatic machinery and mass sales methods," said Mr. Wilmer, "American motor car manufacturers have placed their products far ahead of the Europeans both in quality and price. As a result, American workmen receive high wages, while the American manufacturers give the greatest dollar value to their customers. Our company's export business is steadily increasing and Dodge Brothers' export business this fall has run 20 per cent. ahead of last autumn."

Mr. Wilmer believes that 1928 will be a big year for the automotive industry and for general business.

"Due largely to the transition at the Ford plant," he said, "automobile production for the entire industry in the United States has fallen off more than \$30,000 cars for the first nine months of 1927, as compared with the same period last year. This represents a very substantial accumulation of orders. Perhaps 1,000,000 persons who normally would have purchased new and used cars this year have been deferring their purchases. These people will soon be ready to buy. Every automobile dealer in the country should receive a share of the business which has been dammed up for months."

"Dodge Brothers, which last year was third in the production of cars and trucks," said Mr. Wilmer, "has, like the Ford company, been undergoing an extensive transition. We have been getting our dealers in position to offer their customers a complete line of four and sixes in passenger cars and trucks. It has been our endeavor to effect this transition without shutting down the factory."

"Dodge Brothers will be prepared to enjoy in 1928 the biggest business in its history. For a period of 18 months we have been engaged almost exclusively in this readjustment of manufacturing facilities which will permit us to give the public the greatest dollar value ever offered in motor cars. During this period of readjustment of facilities passenger car output and sales have necessarily been curtailed. California, while the women were "slumming" in San Francisco Sunday afternoon.

Miss Trainor was returned to her home today after spending the night in a San Francisco hospital, suffering from the shock of her experience. The police rescued her from a Pacific street "soft drink" parlor, where she said she was dragged by several men and attacked.

Patrolmen Ben Harris and Andrew Scully were started when Mrs. Mason ran screaming into the office at the resort yesterday afternoon. As the officers entered the place she pointed to a group of men, ten of whom escaped thru the rear door of the establishment. Louis de Ferrari, proprietor of the place, and Antonio Doranco were arrested. The latter escaped while Miss Trainor was being placed in an ambulance, but was recaptured today.

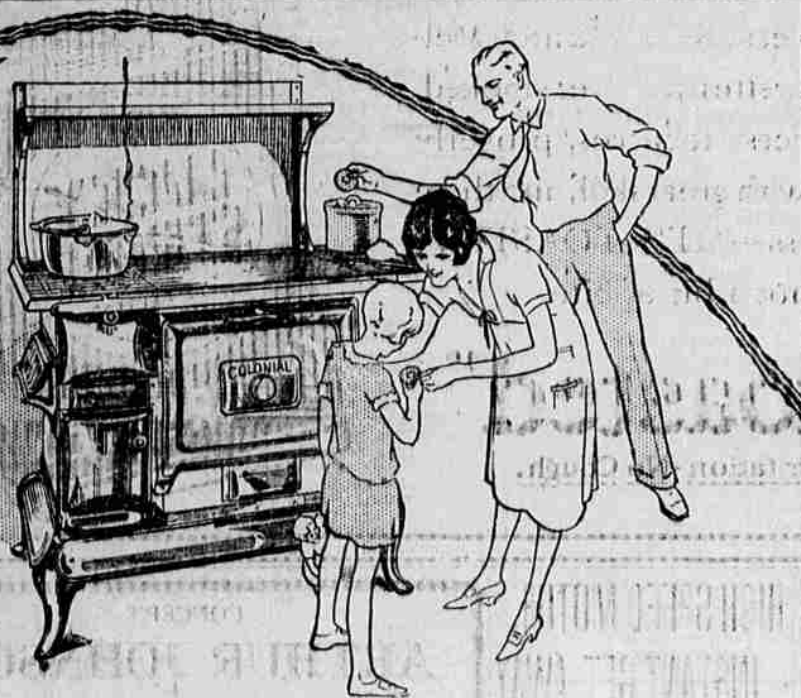
