CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—Mayor Thompson's arch foe, the British lion, has begun to assume the proportions of an octopus.

FINES IMPOSED ON SALESMAN AND NORTH BEND GIRL

C. H. Cooper, washing machine salesman, and Mrs. Nola Wright of North Bend arrested yesterday on a charge of cohabitation, appeared yesterday evening before Judge Hamilton, waiving grand jury indictment, and entered pleas of guilty. Cooper was fined \$100 and Mrs. Wright \$50.

Cooper told the court that Mrs. Wright had been forced to aid her husband in bootlegging operations in the Coos Bay district, her husband now being in jail at Coquille for violation of the liquor law. She desired to get out of that environment and separated from her husband some time ago. Cooper said the woman told him she intended to divorce her husband and that they then planned to be married. In order to get away from the environment she was in Cooper said that he took her to Medford and later brought her to Roseburg, and that they lived separately for a time, but that finances would not permit him to maintain a separate residence for her and so they posed as man and wife. Mrs. Wright concurred in this story. She has a small child at Medford.

Mr. Cooper's employer was present and spoke of the man's previous reputation, stating that he had always been industrious and apparently of good reputation. In view of the facts of the case Judge Hamilton imposed a fine of \$100 upon the man and \$50 upon the woman. The latter, however, was paroled to Agnes Pitchford, county juvenile officer. Cooper is making arrangements today to pay the amount of his fine.

URGING REPEAL OF INHERITANCE TAX

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 1.—Repeal of the federal inheritance tax will be urged upon federal officials at a conference in Washington, D. C., next week. The conference will be attended by selected members of the legislatures of the several states whose argument will be that inheritance taxation should be exclusively a state privilege. The Oregon delegation will leave Portland tonight. John H. Carlan, speaker of the house and one of the members of the delegation was here yesterday gathering data on the subject.

MEDFORD MINE DEVELOPMENT IS HINTED IN NEWS

MEDFORD, Ore., Nov. 1.—According to information obtained here, there have been conferences and correspondence between local interests and the American Smelting and Refining company, and the Southern Pacific railroad, regarding the construction of a railroad to the Blue Ledge copper mine, 33 miles southwest of this city, owned by the Guggenheim. No definite action has resulted. It is said.

A connecting link in the proposed railroad would be the Medford-Jacksonville railroad, which is owned by the city of Medford. The cost of the railroad is estimated at \$500,000. The Guggenheim interests have verbally agreed to operate the mine and the Southern Pacific to operate the road, if it was built, according to the information here.

The proposed road would tap a rich undeveloped timber and mineral region.

GARRISONS GUARDED

BUCHARREST, Oct. 31.—Bucharest dispatches to Politika say that all Rumanian garrisons have been placed on a war basis with a view to any contingency that may result at the meeting of the national peasants party at Alba Julia.

(The national peasants party has shown itself as somewhat favorable toward a possible restoration of Prince Carol to the Rumanian throne.)

Founder of Chain Stores Visits This City for a Short Time.

J. C. Penney, founder of the J. C. Penney company, was in Roseburg yesterday for a short visit with W. B. Strawn and J. A. Caraway of the local Penney store. Mr. Penney came out to Oregon with his prize herd of Guernseys from Emmadine Farms at Hopewell Junction, New York, the prize cattle being on exhibition at the Pacific International at Portland. This prize herd was brought overland a few days ago in a special train of 20 cars.

Unusual interest was exhibited in these finely blooded animals along the entire route from the coast more than a half dozen stops being made to give hundreds an opportunity to inspect the cattle.

The Foremost herd was brought to the Pacific coast direct from Memphis, Tennessee, where it was awarded the Peer challenge cup offered to the Premier Guernsey Breeder at the National Dairy Show. At the same time the "get of sire" premier award was won by the three daughters and one son of Langwater Foremost, also owned by J. C. Penney.

This group has been undefeated in the eight fairs where it has been shown this year, including the Eastern States Exposition at Springfield, Massachusetts, and the Southeastern States Exposition at Atlanta, Georgia.

The Guernsey classes at the National Dairy Show in Memphis were the finest ever, according to Carl Musser, secretary of the National Guernsey association, and competition was close and tightly contested.

Emmadine Farms was awarded Junior Champion Bull ribbon and Foremost's Babbette was awarded special trophy for the best two year old heifer in milk.

FIVE YEAR TERM MARRIAGES WOULD BE NOVEL STUNT

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Nov. 1.—Five-year term marriages with option of renewal were advocated in a statement to newspapers today by Judge Charles S. Burnell, presiding judge of the Los Angeles superior court, in order to adjust "book law to current usage."

Charging that "divorce laws are making hars out of thousands of persons who want nothing more than to be allowed to continue their lives alone," Judge Burnell suggested that couples be permitted to enter into marriage contracts for periods of five years, renewable by mutual consent for additional periods. Divorces under the term marriage plan would be granted on two grounds only—inconstancy and extreme cruelty.

Division of property and custody of children of a couple desiring to separate at the end of a five-year period would be settled by court decision. The abolition of the present interlocutory divorce decrees is one of the provisions of the "term marriage plan."

"Our divorce courts are jammed with litigants who are more victims of an outworn legal procedure than of guilty actions," Judge Burnell declared.

"When a young man and woman, totally unacquainted with the future and what it will bring, take an oath to 'love, honor and cherish' each other for the rest of their lives, they are making promises

that may be impossible to keep. Present laws often force them in seeking a divorce to accuse each other of moral crimes, often obviously mere subterfuges to comply with the law."

TWO COUNTIES TO CELEBRATE R. R. DAY

ALBUQUERQUE, Cal., Nov. 1.—The entire populace of Modoc county, Cal., aided by the citizens of Lake county, Oregon, will unite in celebrating "railroad day" here on November 11 marking the completion of the work of changing the Nevada, California and Oregon railroad from narrow to broad gauge rails.

The road will be broad gauge from Lakeview, Oregon, through Altruss to Wendell, Nevada, where it will connect with the Western Pacific railroad.

More than two thousand guests, including representatives of the governors of Oregon, Nevada and California, are expected at the celebration. The railroad taps a large area of virgin timber as well as hunting and scenic attractions.

A pageant depicting the history of Modoc county together with an immense barbecue will feature the gathering after the ceremonies have been concluded.
