non-partisan inquiry into the milk scandal. "He pretends to believe in a non-partisan judiciary, but refused to interfere in behalf of upright republican municipal court judges, endorsed by the bar associations who are running this year in New York City."

"He has investigated every suspicion of improper actions on the part of republicans, but he has not investigated either the counties of the greater city or Albany, which all know were subject to investigation."

"In speaking of conditions in Albany, Colonel Roosevelt charged that gambling was protected by democratic politicians 'up to and into the very portals of the state"

capitol." He referred to alleged sales of tickets in the so-called Albany baseball pool in the document room of the state house.

"Defending himself against 'vituperative' attacks of the opposition press, Col. Roosevelt said the papers had endeavored to yoke him in an improper relationship with the oil trials in Washington."

"These papers know," he said, "that it was the testimony volunteered by my brother at my suggestion, given within forty-eight hours of the time he received the information, that gave the first great impetus to the investigation. They know that Senator Walsh, the man who deserves the credit for exposing the oil deals, said in his final report that I had no part whatever in the negotiations resulting in the execution of the leases."

MUSIC TEACHERS OF CITY MEET AT NOON LUNCHEON

The Roseburg chapter of the Oregon State Music Teachers association met yesterday noon at the Rose hotel in the regular business meeting and luncheon. Following a delicious repast the music teachers, of which twelve were present, conducted the routine business of the organization, following which Mrs. Charles A. Brand presented a topic discussion of Sigmund Spaeth's recent book "Common Sense in Music". A report on proposed revisions of the constitution was presented by Mrs. Charles G. Stanton, chairman of the committee in charge of that work. Suggestions regarding raising of teaching standards and uniform prices were discussed at length.

FARMER DOESN'T WANT LOAN BILL

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 1.—Presidential politics cropped out in the corn belt and southern conference on farm problems here today when Governor Adam McMillen of Nebraska, the first speaker, attacked Senator Borah of Idaho for his attempt to "stimulate the movement toward Governor Lowden."

Speaking of what he termed Borah's plan to gain control of the western delegates to the Republican national convention, Governor McMillen charged Borah had "no other purpose than to divide western farmers in the interest of eastern reactionaries."

"No net in Mr. Borah's record," McMillen continued, "entitles him to consideration as a leader of farm opinion."

Governor McMillen devoted the greater part of his speech to advocating that the McNary-Haugen bill, vetoed by President Coolidge at the last session, be reintroduced and again put up to the president. Or in any event, he said, the measure which is introduced should contain the principle of equalization, thru caring for the surplus crops.

"We don't want a loan bill," he declared. "The farmer does not want to borrow any more money. He wants a chance to get out of debt. The farmer has to ask the buyer of his products what he will give; he has to ask the man who sells him things what he will take and he pays the freight on the stuff he sells and the stuff he buys."

"Today the farmer has to sell his home products at the world price. With the surplus set aside, the part of the farmers' crops sold at home will have the benefit of tariff protection. The same national policies that upbraid the industrial east are necessary for the saving of agriculture."

"We should challenge the right of any administration or any party to proceed further in industrialization of the nation at the expense of agriculture. The millions on our farms cannot and will not be submerged. Their cause is just. They have been patient and long suffering."

The conference, which is non-partisan, was attended by 300 dirt farmers, farm bureau heads, agricultural teachers and leaders, and public officials.

HEAVY GALES REPORTED ALONG THE COAST OF OREGON

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 1.—With a gale swinging southward from the Gulf of Alaska storm warnings were displayed today along the Washington and Oregon coasts.

The weather bureau here predicted rains and southeasterly winds reaching easterly proportions along the Washington and Oregon coast within the 36 hour period starting at 5 a. m. today.

By "gale proportion" it was meant that the wind would probably reach a velocity of sixty miles an hour.

BOYS ARRESTED AS RESULT OF HALLOWE'EN JOKE

A hallowe'en prank by a group of local high school boys last night is apt to go hard with the youngsters if the government desires to press the charge of tearing down government mail boxes for which the boys were arrested and taken into custody by Officer George Dietrich, serving as a deputy sheriff after the boys tore down several mail boxes on a rural route out of Roseburg, according to the allegations. Parents of the youngsters appeared this morning and secured the release of the boys, guaranteeing their appearance in court whenever they may be called. An investigation is being made by postal authorities. It is not known whether or not the government will press the case.

MRS. T. S. RIDDLE DIES AT HOME IN CODY, WYOMING

Mrs. T. S. Riddle, aged 75 years, for many years a resident of Douglas county, died at her home in Cody, Wyoming, Saturday, October 29, according to word received here today. The body is being brought to Roseburg. Mrs. Riddle was born in Taylor county, Iowa, Feb. 24, 1852, and when but a child crossed the plains with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Chapman, pioneer settlers in the Glade district. She was married in 1892 to T. S. Riddle, the youngest son of that particular family, another brother, Judge G. W. Riddle, having passed away only a short time ago. For many years Mr. and Mrs. Riddle made their home in Wyoming, where her death occurred.

She is survived by her husband, who is reported to be in very poor health. She was a sister of Mrs. S. J. Shrum of Glade and also of Mrs. Will Singleton and Douglas Chapman. Other members of the family also survive here.

The body is being brought to Roseburg and is expected to arrive tomorrow afternoon. Services will be at the Roseburg Undertaking parlors Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock and the body will be taken to the Winbury cemetery at Glade. Rev. Frank B. Matthews, pastor of the local Baptist church, will officiate.

STRIKING MINERS HEED ULTIMATUM

DENVER, Nov. 1.—Striking miners in the Colorado coal fields today heeded the ultimatum of Governor W. H. Adams that "picketing must stop." In Huerfano and Las Animas counties, where pickets have been active since the strike was called by the Industrial Workers of the World two weeks ago, not a picket was on duty today.

Coal mines in the two counties were operating with a slight increase in the number of men who reported for work but the working force still was far below normal. I. W. W. leaders who are directing the strike, said at Walsenburg today that they contemplated hiring a band and entertainers to hold meetings in the principal centers of the strikers would have something to do with their time. Operators were hopeful that with the cessation of picketing their working forces would soon be back to normal.
