WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Mrs. Coolidge has started a vogue for red which promises to grow as the season advances. She has for several months shown her fancy for a red hat and red shoes, and carrying a red bag of fancy design, made by veterans at Walter Reed hospital.

But it was at the wedding of Miss Barbara High and Mr. David Charles Hays on Wednesday that she appeared in an all-red ensemble. The gown of claret red satin showed several ultra features such as a cluster of close shirtings at the lower edge of the blouse which was cut in surprise effect, and just below it another cluster of shirtings which gave quite a full effect to the front of the skirt.

A rose plating several inches deep crossed the hemline of the skirt at the front and the tightly fitted sleeves showed draped cuffs. Her hat was red and wide of brim, and her shoes, showing several straps, were of black satin. A handsome black fox and a hooded bag mounted in silver furnished her costume.
