FOOTBALL GAME WITH GRANTS PASS IS NOW PLANNED

Arrangements are being made today to provide for a football game next Saturday between Roseburg and Grants Pass high schools. While these two teams have made an Armistice Day game an annual event, it was feared that it would not be possible to play this year because of the infantile paralysis situation, but as there have been no new cases in Grants Pass for nearly a month, and as schools have been in progress for the incubation period of two weeks with no new cases developing during that period, it was decided that there would be no danger in permitting the team to come and they will play Saturday. The team, however, will be requested to bring no rooters. Only one case of infantile paralysis now exists in Josephine county, so far as is known, and this is in a rural community several miles from Grants Pass so that there is no danger of spread from the visit of the high school team.

The Grants Pass school has always furnished Roseburg a hard fight and this year's game is expected to be no exception as the team from Grants Pass is composed largely of experienced players. The Roseburg team has been severely handicapped this year by the paralysis situation and as a result has suffered some financial loss. It is hoped that the attendance at Saturday's game will be sufficient to restore the athletic fund.

A new offering of clean and solid Brussels sprouts, grown on a r. Gresham, was quoted at \$1.25 per 10 pound flat.

Sweet potatoes were getting increasingly good action and sold slightly higher, 2 1/2 cents per pound in many instances.

Butter and egg prices remain unchanged over the week-end, but market tone is viewed as easier for the beginning of the new week.

All lines of country dressed meats and poultry opened the week steady with Saturday's quietness but dealers were faced with cleaning up a sizeable Sunday carry over of veal. Besides veal receipts were the heaviest in the meat line but dealers were optimistic for the price to hold up.

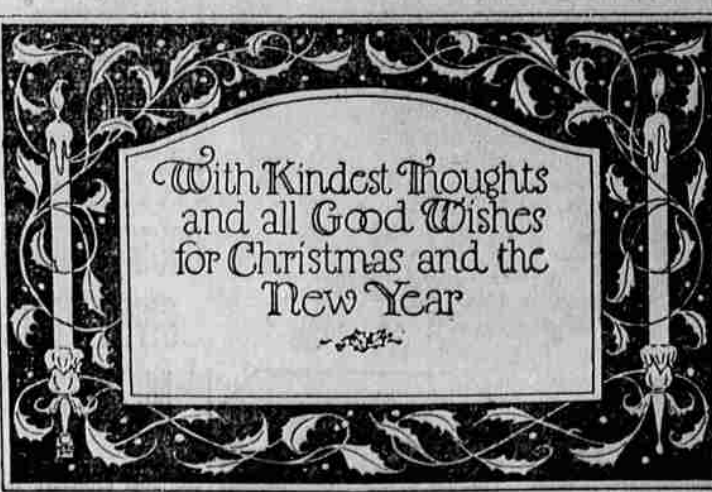

FIVE U. S. OIL COMPANIES IN BIG PROJECT

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

NEW YORK, Nov. 7—Five leading American oil companies today held a 25 per cent interest in a four nation project to develop the vast petroleum deposits in the Mosul region of the kingdom of Iraq.

After months of negotiations during which difficulties threatened to eliminate participation of American interests in the project, the Standard Oil company of New Jersey, the Pan-American Petroleum and Transport company, the Atlanta Refining company and the Gulf Oil Corporation have agreed to work with groups in England, France and Holland under the direction of the Turkish Petroleum company in development of the area. Final legal details are being arranged.

Twenty-five per cent interest developments, by the agreement, were given a Dutch group represented by the Royal Dutch-Shell interests, a British group, represented by the Anglo-Persian Oil company, and a French group represented by a separate company. A company will be formed soon to hold the 25 percent stock interest of the five participating American concerns.

The plan to develop the oil resources of the Mosul area, said by geologists to have the largest undeveloped petroleum deposits of any known district in the world, has been described as the greatest gamble for oil in history. Developments contemplate a heavy outlay of money, some of which will be spent for the construction of a pipeline 400 or 500 miles long and running from the producing fields through Syria to the Mediterranean Sea to furnish an outlet for such oil as may be produced.

FORMING MATCH COMBINE

NEW YORK, Nov. 7—The formation of a huge international combine was revealed here today in the announcement that the French government will retire its entire issue of 8 per cent bonds outstanding in this country through the sale of a new issue of \$75,000,000 French government fifty year five per cent bonds to the Swedish Match company and the International Match Corporation, an American corporation.
