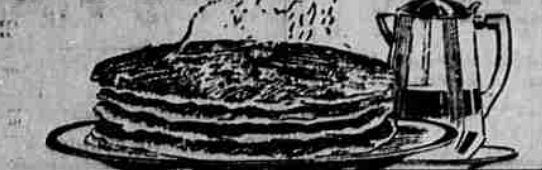

WORK OF MOVING DEER CREEK BRIDGE STARTS THURSDAY

Will Require Week or Ten Days to Get Bridge Open at Its New Location.

The work of moving the old Deer Creek bridge to its new location on Fowler street will be commenced Thursday, according to present plans. All of the concrete work at the new bridge site has been completed and arrangements have been made from the actual moving of the structure, which will be placed on dollies and moved over Jackson street and Second avenue to the extension of Fowler street and then placed on the new piers. It is expected that it will be necessary to detour for a week or ten days.

Twenty-five detour signs have been painted to mark the road around by way of the Deer Creek bridge east of town, so that there should be no confusion in following this road. It is hoped to have the road scuffed and dragged before travel starts over it. The county has braced the old Deer Creek bridge and has it in condition to carry the extra traffic that it will be called upon to sustain.

At the present time workmen are engaged in getting in the footing for the new bridge on the highway. One of the footings has been poured and concrete is being placed today for the second one. The footing for the center pier will probably be put in tomorrow.

While the present bridge is being moved to its new location Fire Chief Fletcher will station one of the fire trucks in North Roseburg for the protection of that section of the city, he states. The detour would make it hard to protect the north half of the city unless some such arrangement were made, but the plan Chief Fletcher has in mind will furnish adequate protection.

A driver will be kept with the truck constantly, and in the event of a big fire the pump will be able to get to the scene by the time the hose lines can be laid and the preliminary work done with the apparatus and equipment provided on the small truck.

RIVAL OF GRANGE HOPES FOR RECORD

 NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—With three games to go, "Ten Yards" Briante, line cracking ace of the New York University, is bent on smashing the ground gaining record Red Grange set in 1923.

In seven games this season, statisticians discovered Briante has plowed through opposing forward walls for a total of 1164 yards for an average of 7.59 yards per plunge. He has eluded out 2.25 yards for each minute of play and has yet to be stopped for "no gain."

Back in 1923, when "Galloping Ghost" of the Illinois backfield was performing in wonder fashion, experts set his seasonal gain at 1260 yards. Last Saturday Briante hammered ahead 167 yards in 40 minutes of play, including one dash of 50 yards.

The car fell into the river accidentally from a scow, after having been ordered out of cold storage.
