WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—President Coolidge favors repeal of the federal inheritance tax, it was said today at the White House.

The president's position was made clear even while a heated controversy over the inheritance tax was going on before the house ways and means committee where lobbying accusations have flown thick and fast.

He believes, as the treasury recommended, that the United States government should, with a view to this field of taxation to permit the states to have this revenue which the president believes is needed to care for the increased cost of state government.

With the provision allowing the states 50 per cent. of this tax the president believes that it becomes a minor revenue measure and that the states should have the entire benefit of this form of taxation.

The White House today denied that any person outside of government officials had discussed the tax with the president. Reports had been circulated in Washington that lobbyists had called at the White House in an effort to influence the president.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—The charge that advocates of the repeal of the federal inheritance tax had "packed" the house ways and means committee room was made today by Chairman Garner during testimony of witnesses on tax revision.

A burst of applause had greeted a statement by John H. Kirby, Houston, Texas, president of the National Council of State Legislators, in favor of elimination of the tax when Green leaned forward in his seat and declared: "This room has been packed by your organization."

Before the witness could reply, he continued: "We know how they are gathered. 'I don't think you do,' Kirby answered. 'But we come back to the merits of this legislation,' adding those present like himself all ways were ready to applaud patriotic statements.

Kirby, in his assault on the inheritance tax appealed to Representative Garner of Texas, ranking minority committee member. "John Garner," he said, "how can you support a law that would take away part of the estate my wife and I have built? The history of the world, John, is the right of children to take the property of their fathers."

The witness said he had always gone along with Garner on good Democratic principles until recently when Kirby began to wobble a little.

Kirby was questioned closely by Representative Rainey of Illinois, Democratic committee member, concerning financing of the national council of state legislators, but the witness could add little to previous testimony by William M. Blodgett, tax commissioner for Connecticut, who said the funds of the organization were raised by \$10 subscriptions.

Representative Rainey intends to ask for a congressional investigation into charges that a tax being maintained here in behalf of repeal of the inheritance tax.

Blodgett said he could not give any information about the number of council of state legislators delegates here, and the dinners, breakfasts and sightseeing excursions arranged for them and declined to agree with Rainey when he suggested that the expense must be around \$50,000.

"Well," Rainey pursued, "it cost me \$100 to make a round trip to Illinois; it must cost \$20,000 to bring this delegation here."

Rainey then asked Blodgett if he had not received a letter saying his expenses would be paid.

"I did not."

"Perhaps you overlooked it in your mail."

"I frequently overlook much of my mail," was the rejoinder.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Nearly 6,000 homeless victims of the New England flood are under the care of the American Red Cross, it was shown in a summary today of reports from disaster workers. Of this number 4,620 are in Vermont and 1,320 in Massachusetts.

Rutland county, Vermont, had the largest number of refugees, with 1,200 while 400 are at Proctor, 300 at East Wallingford and 600 in isolated districts of the county. Of the Massachusetts homeless, 1,220 are being cared for at Springfield, 200 at Pittsfield, 150 at North Adams, 150 at Peckett and 200 at Northampton.

G. P. DISTRICT IS NEAR DEFAULT

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 8.—Although the Grants Pass Irrigation district is not yet in default, it is in danger of default by January 1 next, and for that reason the state reclamation commission has called a conference of its bondholders to be held at Grants Pass November 19. This is made known by State Engineer Luper, who says that the organization of a bondholders committee may be necessary. Under an act of the 1927 legislature creating the commission this state body has authority to investigate any irrigation district for the purpose of bringing together all interests for the formulation of definite plans and policies under which the district affairs may be successfully worked out.

The commission believes the Grants Pass district should have a longer time in which to refund its debt. To refund under the present arrangement it is said a prohibitive tax levy will be required. If the present settlers are to be kept on the project, and others are to be brought in to complete colonization, the commission declares that annual assessments must be kept within the ability of the land owners to pay.

The total debt is \$1,940,860. About \$250,000 will be necessary to repair damage caused by flood waters from Rogue River last winter.

The commission's action is based on a request from the board of directors of the district.

SPLASH WALL BE BUILT AT OAK STREET BRIDGE

Construction of a splash wall along the sidewalk on Oak street bridge is to be commenced within the next few days, according to an announcement made today by County Judge Quinn. At the time the bridge was rededed recently no provision was made for drainage and as a result a great deal of water stands on the floor of the bridge during wet weather. Passing automobiles splash pedestrians and a great deal of complaint has been heard, particularly from parents of high school students who are forced to cross the bridge to and from school. The county court has ordered the purchase of lumber for the construction of a three-foot wall between the road and the sidewalk, and this, it is believed, will furnish protection to the pedestrians and will save them from being splashed by the passing automobiles.

PILOT BUTTE TO BE SCENIC SPOT

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 8.—For state park purposes, Pilot Butte, a famous peak of eastern Oregon, located on The Dalles-California highway in Deschutes county, has been given to the state highway commission by Charles Brown of Chicago, F. R. Wells of France and Kemper B. Miller of Pasadena, Calif. It will be accepted at the next meeting of the commission. Robert W. Sawyer of Bend, member of the highway commission, was mainly instrumental in securing the gift to the state.
