Other historical characters marched across the stage, Emperor Nicholas II of Russia, Field Marshal Foch and Haig, the Czarina Alexandra and the peasant monk Rasputin, whose career during the war was depicted. The corruption and disaster brought about by the hypnotic influence of Rasputin on the Russian imperial family, who first exposed, then came his ignominious end when a small group of influential Russians invited him to dinner and murdered him. PRINCETON AND YALE TO DECIDE CHAMPIONSHIP

Outstanding Competitors
for Eastern Title to
Meet Tomorrow.

BIG GAMES IN SIGHT

Loss of Regulars From
Many of Teams Gives
Air of Uncertainty
to Contests.

(Associated Press Special Wire)

Here are the high spots of tomorrow's college gridiron slate in the country's various sections and the prospects as they bear on championship hopes.

East: Yale and Princeton, the latter neither beaten nor tied, meet with the eastern title claims of each at stake and unusual interest aroused by the case of Bruce Caldwell, ineligible Yale half back; Army and Notre Dame meet at New York, in the day's big instructional game; Penn State plays New York University, both being in the running for the title; Pittsburgh meets Nebraska, in another big east-west tilt.

Western Conference.
Illinois, only team neither beaten nor tied, battles Chicago in most important conference tussle; Minnesota plays Drake and Michigan meets naval academy in intercollegiate fray.

Southern Conference.
Georgia, with clean slate, expected to beat Clemson; Tennessee, also neither beaten nor tied, faces strong opposition from another title contender, Vanderbilt; Georgia Tech encounters Louisiana State.

South Western Conference.
Texas Aggies, pace-setters, today tackle Rice Institute, which has yet to win a conference game; in Saturday's game Southern Methodist meets Baylor, another tail-end; Arkansas, also in running, plays Oklahoma Aggies of the Missouri Valley conference.

Pacific Coast Conference.
Washington and California in feature game while present conference leaders, Stanford and Southern California, take on Colorado University and Santa Clara, respectively, in non-conference tilts.

Little Claim Involved.
NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—Interest in tomorrow's football game at New Haven between Yale and Princeton has seldom been so great in the half century of their colorful rivalry. Their performances have shown them to be among outstanding competitors for the mythical eastern championship and the ineligibility of Bruce Caldwell, Yale star, has intensified excitement over the game.

Critics today were inclined to regard the game as an even thing, the loss of Caldwell being offset by greater Yale determination. John Carvey, who has been installed at Caldwell's post, distinguished himself in the game against Dartmouth and his play was considered even more brilliant than that of the departed star. Hammersley will serve as Garvey's relief man.

On a basis of smartness, speed and experience, Notre Dame is given the edge over the army but this year has been anything but impressive. Five regulars are on the injured list.

Regulars Are Out—

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—On the eve of important college football games in the east, three star football players have been lost to their teams.

Bruce Caldwell was barred from the Yale squad for having played on a Brown freshman team in 1923. Yale opposes Princeton tomorrow.

Lynn Warren, star fullback at Amherst, was debarrred for having been a member of Lafayette's swimming team three years ago. Amherst meets Williams tomorrow.

Captain Harold Cothran of Lafayette forfeited his berth on the squad but gained a bride in Miss Peggy Hackett of Washington, D. C.

Cothran met Miss Hackett at the Georgetown game last Saturday and a whirlwind courtship resulted in a wedding. He was banished for infraction of the rules. Lafayette faces Susquehanna tomorrow.
