BRIEF SPORT NEWS

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—It is the 1927 college football campaign, it is the rapidly approaching season when the major events among the major events may have been bowled over.

About this time a year ago the season of the football was opening around the prowess of such crack teams as Navy, Lafayette and Brown in the east, Alabama in the south, Notre Dame in the mid-west, Southern Methodist in the southwest and Stanford on the Pacific coast.

All seven of these outfits were traveling at top speed, seeking national or national honors and all but Notre Dame, which is undefeated, although Lafayette was the only team to avoid so much as a tie.

But it is another story for 1927. These same seven teams, with only one defeat altogether marked against them all last season, have been beaten no less than eight times so far this fall. Eighteen defeats, not to mention four ties, for seven of the biggest eleven in the country, with the campaign not yet completed, is about as big a flop as anything on record.

Brown's "iron men" of 1926 have turned out to be the tin soldiers of 1927, knocked over six successive times. Lafayette has been defeated three times; Notre Dame once, while two setbacks are on each of the records of Alabama, Stanford, Southern Methodist and the Navy.

In place of these teams, regional and sectional laurels for 1927 are being sought by Georgia in the south; Yale in the east; Missouri and Illinois in the middle west; northern California on the Pacific coast and the Texas Aggies in the southwest, to mention a few of the outstanding pace-setters. Alone of the 1927 group, Stanford remains in the Pacific coast conference race but has had its colors lowered twice by

small college rivals, St. Mary's and Santa Clara.

The latest performance of three of the east's greatest individual stars, Glenn Welch of Pittsburgh, Al Marsters of Dartmouth and Bud Charlesworth of Yale, have focused the all-American spotlight on them to a convincing extent.

All three have been conspicuously brilliant right along but they outdid themselves last Saturday. Welch, Pitt captain and half back, ran the opening kickoff 53 yards for a touchdown and otherwise distinguished himself in leading his team to victory over Nebraska.

Charlesworth, 121 lb. center, was all over the gridiron, intercepting Princeton passes, punching on fumbles and furnishing a rocklike kick to the big Blue Line. The sophomore, Marsters, star of Dartmouth, threw the amazing number of 15 yard passes, including a 40 yarder, the longest two dashes for touchdowns, one for 80 and another for 65 yards.

U. OF O. PLAN FOR TEACHER STAFF RATING IS TOLD

Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall
Speaker Before Educa-
tors of Nation.

RAISE STANDARDS

University Engaged in Scientific Study to Secure Accurate Method for Ratings.

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 14.—(Special.)—The scientific program that is now under way at the University of Oregon, by which more accurate method is hoped to be found for rating the teaching staff, and through which new and more efficient teaching methods are expected to be found was given nationwide prominence here today by Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the university, who spoke before the American association of State Universities session on this subject.

Two main objectives are sought by the experiments and research work now being carried on, declared Dr. Hall. The first of these is an accurate method of determining the actual worth to the university of its professors and instructors, so that promotions and advancements can be made strictly according to merit. The second is for definite improvement in actual teaching methods, so that students may be better trained and better instructed.

"Our whole program is an incubate state, of course," Dr. Hall told the session. "But I have a great hope that out of these experiments in which we are engaged, or others that these experiments will uncover, there will come some objective data, some scientific methodology, by which we can take the 'touch out of the administrative prerogative of appointment and promotion, and substitute something of precision and definiteness that is capable of being scientifically applied."

"This will give tremendous encouragement to the faculty members that we want to encourage, and it will close the doors of academic life to those who hope to find it an ideal social existence without much intellectual activity."

"Above all, it will enable the university to provide a personnel for the training of its youth that will be nearly adequate to the tremendous task that it is undertaking."

In outlining the work now being done at the University of Oregon not enough consideration is being given to faculty men who show originality and initiative, and that often men who are not nearly so capable nor efficient are advanced in rank and salary along with others. In order to put this administrative work on a sound basis he suggested three considerations for judging the worth of men. These are teaching ability, research activities and contributions to the educational policy and life of the institution.

The first step in this program is the application of sound business methods in matters of appointment and promotion, Dr. Hall said. He pointed to the personnel work that is being done by business firms and in public service, and asked the question, "Why could it not be done in university administration?"

"I feel that the proper solution of the personnel problem in universities is fraught with more consequence to the public good than is a successful solution of the problem either in public administration or private enterprise," President Hall stated.

Methods now in use at the University of Oregon for personnel work were described to the members present. The first consists of the preparation of a "Who's Who" of the faculty members. This includes the complete educational history of the faculty members and lists of his academic performances, all available information about his family, activities in the university, salary increases and promotions and personal impressions gathered by the president from occasional personal interviews.

The second method, which is a direct check on the efficiency of the faculty member, is a requirement that each instructor and professor send in his examination questions when he sends in the results, or grades of students. The third is that faculty members must send in a statement of their objective in giving the course, at the same time that they submit the examination questions.

"When examination questions sent in by faculty members involve mere memory facts, have no call for originality, or opportunity for original thinking, it is very probable that such a teacher belongs in the lower ranks," Dr. Hall stated. "One useful result of this device already noted was the greatly improved quality of examinations and questions that came in the second quarter after this order had gone into effect at Oregon. That in itself, I believe, justifies the procedure."

The work of the University of Oregon faculty committee on improvement is composed of the strongest such in the university, he stated, and five sub-committees are now working on specific problems. These sub-committees are

on tests and examinations, lecture systems, possible objectives in teaching, case and project methods of study, and controlled experiments in university teaching.

Close cooperation among departments and among the faculty men is already noted for this committee work, it was stated, and the prediction that some startling results will be announced was made. The work of the sub-committees on tests and examinations, and on controlled experiments is already attracting wide attention, it was said.

"We at Oregon have the hope that our efforts will help to emphasize the problems of educational administration and will start new progress towards the solution," Dr. Hall concluded.

Under the leadership of Dr. Lucetta A. Smith, president of the Roseburg club, a large number of Roseburg members are expected to be present, it is stated. Roseburg is one of the very active clubs in the federation, says Miss Hair, and has always been well represented in work of the organization.

Miss Ida A. Powell, of Albany College, president of the Albany club, will have charge of arrangements for the session, while Mrs. Irene Graham, past president of the Albany club, will arrange for the banquet.

Mrs. C. W. Greene, wife of C. W. Greene, president of Albany college, will deliver the principal address of the meeting. One of the features will be a demonstration on health work by the Salem club, under the direction of Dr. Mary E. Berlin, state chairman of the health committee.

An open forum will also be held at which time problems of clubs throughout the state will be discussed. Social reference will be given to the work of committees on programs, publicity and membership.

Officers of the state federation include Miss Hair, president; Dr. Purvise, vice-president; Miss Minna D. Schassen, The Dalles; second vice-president, Miss Vera Caulfield, Oregon City; recording secretary, Miss Lella Hay, Corvallis; corresponding secretary, Miss Emma E. Summerville, Albany; treasurer, District meetings are held at intervals during the year. A session at Roseburg is scheduled in December, and another in Salem in January.

AUTO INDUSTRY REACHES SATURATION POINT

CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—The saturation point has been reached by the American automobile industry, the National Association of Finance companies was told today by Milan V. Ayres, Chicago economist, but he does not regard it as a cause for alarm.

"The saturation point," by the Ayres definition, is the time when 20,000,000 motor cars are in operation at the same time. "Even though this point is reached," he said, "it merely is a situation, in which steady usage replaces expansion. The sewing machine and the boot and shoe industry have passed the saturation point, yet still are thriving."
