RESTORING OUR FAITH

Little deeds of selfishness, seen day after day in the news columns, almost lead us to believe that the nobility of man has indeed decayed. There are so many stories, it seems, of banditry, divorce, murder, embezzlement that we become nearly convinced that man hasn't many qualities above the animals that prey upon one another. Then comes a story like that of Lloyd Squire, whose manhood stood out clear and fine above the panic and horror of the flood that ravaged the Winooski valley in Vermont. It restores that flagging faith, and makes us again take stock in man's bravery under fire. Lloyd Squire was assistant editor of the Waterbury Record. When the river went on its rampage, Lloyd Squire went on rampage, too. Maybe he had been writing editorials about heroism, such as this one, for so long, and despairing of finding it, had gone out to prove personally that such qualities had not vanished from the world. Driving a team of swimming horses through the flooded areas of the city, for twenty hours he toiled, effecting rescue after rescue, swimming himself after the horses. Swinging hand over hand on a steel cable across the Winooski river he brought quinine and relief to stricken residents of Duxbury and North Duxbury. Without sleep or rest, he worked wherever help was needed, until he dropped exhausted. It took a catastrophe for the people of Waterbury, Vermont, to learn that the man whose pen dug into their weaknesses and praised their goodness, himself is a hero. We hope they won't forget it.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—De termined to force the issue against unswerving witnesses in the case of the government, the United States marshal at the courts directing H. M. Blackmer to show cause why he should not be held in contempt and at the same time ordering Blackmer's property to the limit of \$100,000 to be seized.

Blackmer, who is in France, has refused to respond to subpoenas and the counsel indicated, when the full-scale trial was in progress, that he considered the Walsh law, under which seizure may be made, was unconstitutional. The procedure now would be for the United States marshal to locate the property while the case is fought out in the courts.

FARMERS' RELIEF A BIG PROBLEM

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—With the convening of congress only three weeks away the administration is bending its efforts to meet the four-year-old farm relief problem but as yet there are no indications that President Coolidge is committed to any particular plan. Two facts have emerged from a conflict of generalities, namely, that the president is unalterably opposed to an equalization fee of the type embodied in the vetoed McNary-Haugen bill and that the administration is prepared to resist any attempt to revise the tariff structure by those who contend that this would bring relief to the farmer.

From views expressed at the White House it has been learned that Mr. Coolidge has not completed the study of the farm question which he undertook early this fall. The president is keeping in touch with leaders of congress who are trying to work out a bill and his attention recently has been attracted to the report of a business men's commission headed by Charles Nagel, former assistant secretary of the commerce department. While this report suggests the advisability of downward revision of the tariff as a factor in helping the farmer—a policy which Mr. Coolidge opposes—the president does believe the facts which the commission developed are worthy of careful study in that they may throw new light on the problem.

Leaving no doubt of the president's opposition to changing tariff schedules, it has been disclosed at the White House that Mr. Coolidge regards the free trade barrier one of the farmer's principal bulwarks. Without it, he believes, business and labor could not prosper and the country's ability to purchase the farmer's products

COLORADO MAY HAVE WET PLANK

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 16.—The election of S. Harrison White, Democrat, yesterday, to represent the first congressional district is an indication that a "wet" plank will be included in the Democratic state platform next year along with an instructed delegation for Al Smith, in the Democratic national convention, was the belief expressed in political circles here today.

Complete returns, today, showed White, an avowed "wet" had defeated Francis J. Knauss, Republican, who died last June. The total of 82,562 set a record for off-year elections in Denver. The vote not polled by White and Knauss was given to George Kuebel, Independent and H. M. Morris, farmer-labor candidate.

Another remarkable phase of yesterday's election was the large number of women voters who turned out because of the "wet" and "dry" issue. They were estimated by election officials to have cast sixty per cent of the vote.

MORE COMMENT ON "BELLWOS BOULEVARD"

Roseburg, Ore., Nov. 15, 1927. EDITOR OF NEWS-REVIEW:

In your last issue, Mr. Good-bourn severely arraigned the city officers for neglecting to pave the street in West Roseburg which he calls "Bellwos Boulevard." As usual in such cases, this letter was written without making any investigation of the facts. The City Council, of course, is representative of the people and can only expend money which is provided by the people and this money must be spent for the purpose for which it is levied.

For a number of years the city has pursued the policy of assessing the cost of street improvements to the abutting property. Under the provisions of the charter, the proceeding to pave a street may be defeated by a negative vote of the owners of the owners of property owning more than one-half of the front footage. Some time ago, the City Council instituted a proceeding for the paving of the street in question but such proceeding was defeated by a remonstrance signed by the representatives of the negative amount of front footage of property. Further, the City Council has endeavored to procure the use of road machinery for the purpose of smoothing the street, but as yet has been unable to do so. The City Council is as much interested in improving this street as the people who are obliged to use it, but is prohibited by lack of funds and attitude of the abutting property owner. This letter is written for the purpose of placing the matter before the people in its true light and in placing the blame where it belongs.

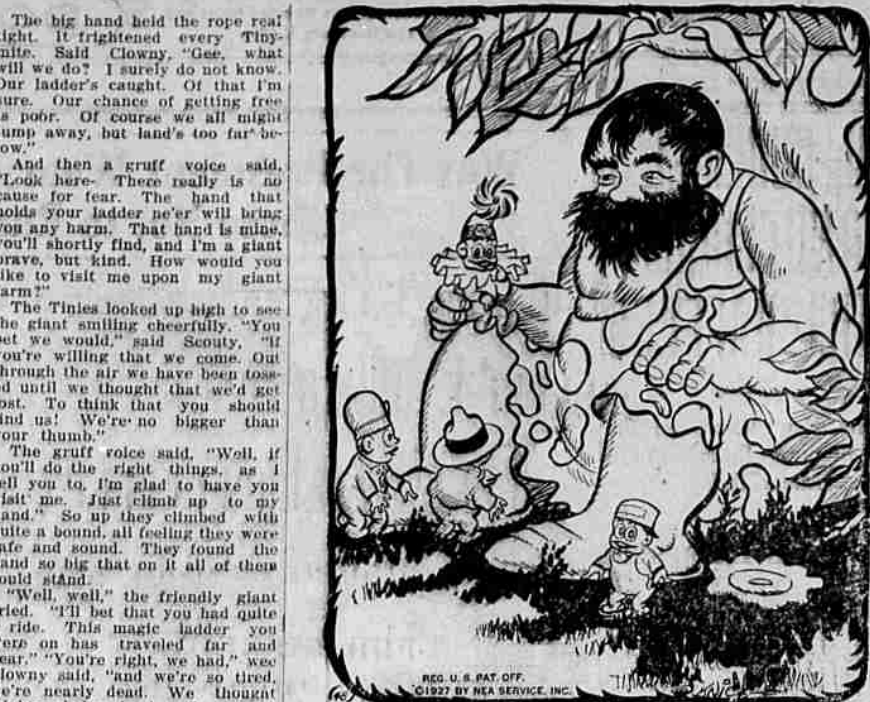

ROY STEARNS HELD ON DRIVING CHA

Grand jury recently returned an indictment charging driving while under the influence of liquor, was arraigned through his attorney, Carl Wimberly, late yesterday afternoon and entered a plea of not guilty. A secret indictment was brought against Stearns as a result of an accident which occurred recently when he struck a car belonging to L. L. Spencer. (Owing to the fact that he has been ill he was not taken into custody. He is now out on bail and the case has been set for trial Friday.)

Owing to the fact that District Attorney Cordon has been in charge of Mr. Stearns' legal work in the past, he has disqualifed for the investigation and trial of this case and the court appointed Attorney Ray B. Compton as special prosecutor.

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PRES. DEFUNCT BANK GOES ON TRIAL TODAY

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 16.—J. V. Burke, president of the defunct Bank of Kenton, which failed last December, went on trial today on the first of 10 indictments against him.

The specific charge was accepting a check for \$5,000 from the United Meat Company of Portland, when that company had a large overdraft at the bank. Burke also was vice president of the meat company.

The state contended he covered up the United Meat company overdraft by juggling the bank's books, and defense indicated it would show Burke knew nothing of the meat company check until after his indictment.

R. B. Thacher, cashier of the bank, yesterday pleaded guilty to an indictment identical with the one on which Burke is being tried.
