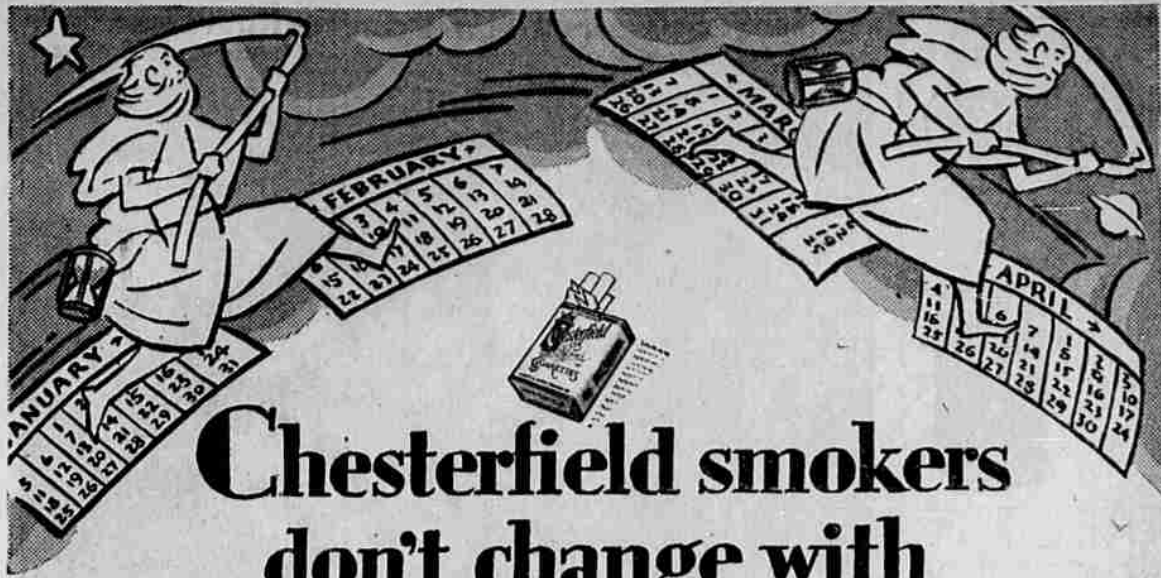

CHICAGO, Nov. 16.—America's first national auction bridge champion will be selected from a field of more than 1,000 of the country's best players at a tournament here December 1, 2 and 3, under the direction of the American auction bridge league. It is planned to make the tournament an annual affair.

WOMEN NOT FOR ARCTIC JOURNEYS

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 16.—Women don't like exploration—it's a man's job, Lieutenant Commander Richard E. Byrd declared in an interview here last night.

"The women don't mind taking chances," Captain Byrd said, "but they dread the cold and ice. When I went to the Arctic only four or five women wanted to go. When I proposed to span the Atlantic 20 women for one man wanted to take the risk."

Commander Byrd characterized the Antarctic as "the last great challenge both to man and aviation." Three fourths of the area of unexplored land twice the size of the United States has never been seen by a human, he said.

"My eyes are on the future," Commander Byrd declared in discussing his proposed Antarctic flight. "I plan to leave in September and proceed to New Zealand. Then I shall go to the great ice barrier 2,000 miles away with a party of fifty men aboard an oil burning steamer."

"We shall establish a little city in the ice and maintain liaison through the radio. Three planes will be used in the flight to the pole."

"Our trip shall be purely scientific. The flag of the United States has never been connected with any major Antarctic exploration, and that is another reason."

MINERS ARE GREETED BY MACHINE GUNS TODAY

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 16.—The menacing muzzles of machine guns trained from behind barricades greeted striking coal miners when they appeared today at the Columbine mine of the Rocky Mountain Fuel company. The mine is the only one in northern Colorado that has operated since the I. W. W. strike was called more than a month ago and the strikers have been holding daily demonstrations there.

Mine officials gave warning yesterday that mine guards would shoot the first picket that appeared on the property today and the strikers headed the warning and contented themselves with meeting near the edge of the property. Approximately 200 strikers were in the party and unlike former days, they did not take women or children with them.

Four national guard airplanes circled low over the strikers and ten state law enforcement officers, Weld county deputy sheriffs and mine guards were stationed inside the property. At both entrances to the mine barricades of sand bags and barbed wire faced the strikers.

The situation in the southern fields was quiet and most mines reported an increased working force.

PROGRAM OF SELF HELP IS FARM NEED

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., Nov. 15.—The greatest and most permanent benefits to the farmer will come from a program of self help, Secretary of Agriculture Jardine believes. At the same time, he said in an

address read today before the Nebraska Farmers' Elevator association by R. W. Dunlap, assistant secretary of agriculture, there is no doubt a need for constructive legislation to assist the development of cooperative marketing.

"One need at the present time is for a system of credit which will enable cooperative associations to acquire adequate plants and facilities and which will permit them to obtain the necessary loans at reasonable rates of interest and under long time terms of repayment," he continued.

"I am hopeful that congress will give attention to legislation of this kind at the coming session."

"Cooperative marketing cannot be handed down to the producers by the government or even by friendly organizations. It must come from the farmer and must express their needs and serve their interests."

Secretary Jardine said he looked with favor on the wheat pools of the country because, in spite of the difficulties they encountered, they appeared to be pointing the way to a goal of centralization. He made it clear, however, that although the department believes in the possibility in centralized selling, it was not on record as approving any particular organization for cooperative centralization.

National Guard Notes

FRANCHISE OF NEGRO DRAWING FIRE IN SOUTH

Virginian Can See No Parallel Between Two Laws.

ENFORCEMENT URGED

Senator Glass Is Not Criticizing Those Who Seek Repeal of the 18th Amendment.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—The position of the south on negro suffrage as contrasted with its attitude toward prohibition is again in dispute on Capitol Hill.

Senator Glass, Democrat, Virginia, sees no inconsistency in southern attitude toward the 14th and 15th amendments, giving negroes citizenship and the right of voting, and in their position toward enforcement of the eighteenth amendment. Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, would have all enforced alike. Their views were expressed in letters made public last night.

Replying to an editorial in the New York World, the Virginian declared it was "stupid" to draw an analogy between the south's views on the two subjects. The 14th and 15th amendments, he said, were born "in the passions of the war and constituted an attempt to destroy white civilization in nearly one third of the country and to erect on its ruins an Ethiopian state, ignorant, profligate, corrupt." He termed its adoption as "unpardonable crime" and expressed doubt as to whether it had ever been constitutionally ratified.

On the other hand, he asserted, the prohibition amendment "had been duly ratified by 46 of the 48 states and had been in force for its enforcement provided."

Senator Glass disclaimed any intention of criticizing those who seek to repeal the 18th amendment, condemning only those who, he said, mock the law and applaud its violation.

Ham H. Stayton, president of the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment, who called his attention to the World's editorial which charged Senator Glass with inconsistency in opposing the sending of federal agents to Kentucky to supervise elections there and approving their assignment to enforcement of the prohibition law.

The Virginian declared there was no parallel between the two cases since one was provided for by law and the other was not. Writing to Senator Edge, Republican, New Jersey, Senator Borah declared he would lend his support to any effort to have the Republican national convention pledge itself to enforcement not only of the prohibition law, as he had previously recommended, but of the negro suffrage amendments as well.

He declined to express a view as to whether any violation of the amendments existed, but asserted that if such a violation was believed or charged, they should be included in any stand the party might take on this subject.

"It would be a magnificent thing," he said, "if this discussion of the eighteenth amendment leads to a more settled determination to uphold and maintain the constitution as a whole."

MANDELL IS WINNER

Exhibiting an improved defense and a dazzling offense, Mandell easily outpointed Jimmy "Spud" Myers, the Pocastello, Idaho, slugger in a ten round bout at the Coliseum last night. The title was not at stake.

MINING CASE IN COURT

The circuit court today heard the case of H. B. Ewbank and others against R. W. Thomson, et al., involving title to timber property in the Cow Creek district. One side alleges claim jumping and the other claims that notices were improperly posted. Attorney Abraham appears for the plaintiffs and Attorneys Rice and Long for the defendants.

Arrangements were completed this afternoon for a football game to be played next Saturday afternoon between the teams of the Roseburg and Medford junior high schools. It had been hoped to play this game on Thanksgiving, but the arrangements could not be made for a holiday game, so that a Saturday game was made necessary. This will be the only outside game for the junior high team this year if it is expected, and the school has been put to heavy expense in its athletic activities. It is hoped that the fans of the city give the team their full support. The junior high team is exceptionally fast and is heavier than the average team of that age and should put up a good contest with the Medford players.

DISORDERS CAUSE HOUSE OF COMMONS INTO ADJOURNMENT

LONDON, Nov. 16.—Renewed disorder late today caused a second adjournment of the House of Commons seven minutes after it had been called to order after a temporary suspension of the sitting earlier in the afternoon. The disorders accompanied debate on a labor motion for a vote of censure of the Baldwin government for neglect of the unemployment and coal problems, the labor members demanding that Premier Baldwin himself answer the charges of neglect presented by Ramsay MacDonald, the former premier and labor leader.

The tumult followed a lengthy address by MacDonald who introduced the motion of censure. When Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, president of the Board of Trade, rose to reply, the house would not hear him.

Shouts of "Baldwin" and "The prime minister" sounded through the house and the tumult was so loud that Cunliffe-Lister was unable to begin his speech. The speaker thereupon remarked that he was under the impression that the proponents of the censure motion wanted a reply but there were cries to this effect:

"Yes! But we want a responsible minister."

HARVARD HOPING TO STAGE UPSET

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—The rankiest of the season's underdogs—a Harvard eleven that has won only four of seven games—is working quietly on a surprise package in hope of turning mighty Yale and the entire eastern football world topsy-turvy.

Other Harvard teams as equally despaired of as the husky youngsters drilling calmly and confidently for the bulldog invasion of the Harvard Stadium Saturday, have proved that anything may happen in the annual meeting of these teams.

Two years ago another Yale squad, headed straight for stardom was held to a scoreless tie by a Harvard team that seemed touch-downs weaker. And in 1921 and 1922, moderate Harvard elevens developed enough power in the final week's drive to whip Yale aggregations that had bid for greatness all season.

Harvard probably will face the ace of Yale passers, Johnny Hoben, the youth who injured his elbow in tossing the aerials that smoothed Princeton in the final minutes of play. Hoben has almost recovered from the hurt and with John Garvel, plunging back, and Captain Webster, probably will answer the starting whistle. Garvey bruised his shoulder Saturday and Webster aggravated an old leg injury. Misfortune befell Tohlich almost on the eve of the annual Lafayette struggle when Daddio-

witz, fullback star, was called home to Scranton, Pa., thru death of a relative. Lafayette meanwhile found trouble in deciding on a starting lineup with eight first string backs fully recovered from injuries.

Coach Frank Cavanaugh worked hard to inject a punch into the Fordham attack for Georgetown, while New York University welcomes Frank Brante, line plunging ace, back to the drills for Allegheny.

Army and Navy looked ahead thru workouts against Ursinus and Loyola Saturday to their annual meeting in the Yankee Stadium November 26.

HORWEEN HAS A YEAR MAKE GOOD
