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DEVELOPMENT OF GINNABAR AT COW CREEK PREDICTED

Capital is becoming greatly interested in Douglas County cinnabar prospects, according to R. W. Thomson, of Tillamook, who has been spending several days in Roseburg, engaged in legal matters in the Circuit Court. The increased price of mercury in making cinnabar property very valuable, and as some of the richest ore in the world is to be found in Douglas County mining interests are turning their attention to the various claims in which the preliminary development work has been carried on.

Recently one of the groups in the Cow Creek district, sold for \$100,000 and engineers representing interested parties have been

investigating other holdings, Mr. Thomson says. The Cow Creek district, Mr. Thomson says, is very rich in cinnabar and a definite vein has been traced by prospecting through the entire county, the ore showing particularly in the Cow Creek district, with tracings west of Scritie Creek, Rumburg, Oakland and Yoncalla. At several places along this vein development work has been started, and all tests show a particularly high grade of ore.

Investment and systematic development, it is expected, will soon result in commercial operation of several of these claims, and when this work is once started Douglas County will without question, be one of the heaviest mercury producing centers.
