precedence over tax reduction and other subjects of legislation in the coming session of congress was expressed by United States Senator C. C. Dill, Democrat, of this city, upon his departure last night for Washington.

"Farm relief looms as the dominant question in congress," Senator Dill said in a newspaper interview.

"The so-called farm bloc, the congressmen, who are fighting for farm relief, will not be satisfied with any decoy measure intended to give temporary relief. They want something that will go to the root of the question, something that will remove the farm surplus as a reason for cutting the price of the entire crop below the cost of production."

"The McNary-Haugen bill will not necessarily pass, but whatever is passed must care for the surplus. The government could handle the surplus and if necessary take it out of the treasury. The government could well afford to do so."

HIGH SCHOOL TEAMS WILL PLAY SATURDAY

(Associated Press Leased Wire) MEDFORD, Ore., Nov. 18.—The football teams of the Medford and Corvallis high schools clash here tomorrow in one of the outstanding inter-sectional games of the season in this state. The Corvallis team is claimant to the Willamette Valley championship, with one defeat. The Medford team is undisputed southern Oregon champion, with recent victories over the University of Oregon Frosh, and the Chemawa Indians, and is a contender for state honor. They have not been defeated for five years.

The Corvallis line averages 174 and its backfield 164. Medford averages 189 pounds in the line and 161 in the backfield.

Through cooperation of the Medford Chamber of Commerce and the Mail-Tribune Virgin, broadcasting station KMED, the game Saturday beginning at 2:15, will be broadcast on 1200 kilocycles.

BIG EXPLOSION WRECKS PLANT; NO ONE KILLED

Farmers in the vicinity fled from their homes fearing a terrific blast when the fire should reach the storage house.

Through a telescope it appeared the top of the storage house had been blown away by the blast in the mixing room.

The extent of the damage in Jefferson, a mile away from the plant, had not been learned.

The explosion rocked buildings here and was felt as far away as Parsons, about 20 miles northeast of Jefferson, where houses shook and dishes were rattled.

COFFEYVILLE, Kansas, Nov. 18.—A huge explosion occurred at a nitrolycerin plant at Jefferson, 12 miles northwest of here shortly after noon today. Houses at Coffeyville were rocked.

Fire broke out immediately and virtually all buildings in the town were threatened, the Jefferson telephone operator informed. A Coffeyville operator before being forced to desert her post.

PARSONS, Kansas, Nov. 18.—Houses shook and dishes rattled here shortly after noon today, presumably as a result of an explosion at a nitrolycerin plant at Jefferson, about 20 miles from here. Many persons believed it was an earthquake. There was no damage.

COFFEYVILLE, Kansas, Nov. 18.—Fire followed by an explosion of 250 quarts of nitrolycerine which wrecked houses and buildings for miles around, destroyed the plant of the Independent Torpedo company near Jefferson, Kansas, 11 miles northeast of here, shortly after noon today. There were no casualties.

REMUS' DAUGHTER ARRIVES FOR TRIAL

CINCINNATI, Nov. 18.—Romulo Remus, daughter of George Remus by his first wife, who divorced him, came to court today to attend her father's trial for slaying his wife, the former Imogene Holmes of Evanston, Ill.

There was an endearing scene as she threw herself into her father's arms and embraced and kissed him.
