MINING CASE IS STILL BEFORE THE CIRCUIT COURT

The circuit court continued to grind away today on the Cow Creek mining case, which was started yesterday. The case is long drawn out and technical, involving a great deal of the fine points of law, making it rather uninteresting from the spectator's standpoint. This morning the court granted a continuance in the case of the state of Oregon against Roy Stearns. Mr. Stearns was recently indicted for driving a car while intoxicated, but his physician certifies that he is too ill to appear in court this term and so the case is to be held over until next term.

As soon as the mining case is finished the court will take up the matter of Schiller B. Hermann against Elbert Hermann. This is a suit over an accounting, the amount involved being \$12,247. Attorney R. B. Compton will appear for the plaintiff and Attorney Albert Abraham for the defense. Fines of \$50 each were imposed today on H. S. French and V. S. French, who were recently convicted on a charge of operating a common carrier without the required state permit. The case was in the nature of a test and the minimum fine was imposed by the court.

A short recess was taken yesterday afternoon and the divorce of Bortha Mae DeVeney against Tracy DeVeney was heard. They were married in Jacksonville, January 27, 1925. The plaintiff, who was represented by Attorney W. C. Benson of Reedsport, alleged desertion and was granted a decree.

National Guard Notes

The greater part of the drill period Monday night at the armory was devoted by Company D to machine gun practice, with Lieut. A. M. Knudsen acting as instructor and Sergeant Dolan and Fletcher in charge of the two platoons. Instruction was given in handling machine guns and pointers on the various features of the military weapon were explained.

A game of basketball was enjoyed by the company following drill this week. Interest is also running high in volleyball and the company has organized a team, which will challenge any team in the city for games this season.

Last Friday night in a series of games played with the Copco volleyball team the company team came out victors in three out of five games. On the Copco team were E. Federal pay checks for members of Company D, 162nd Infantry, the local machine gun unit of the Oregon National Guard, arrived this week from the corps area. The checks were distributed Monday night following drill by Captain Lyle E. Marsters.

In an article appearing in the November Oregon Guardsman, the official publication of the Oregon National Guard published monthly, the idea of patriotism in connection with national guard is expounded. The article contains extracts from an editorial in the Astorian and states:

"The thing that actuates the young man to enlist in the national guard is patriotism. He may not recognize it as such and may be able to find a number of other reasons for enrolling, but it is the underlying motive. He is not, of course, stirred, as in time of war, but the spirit of patriotism that quickens the blood of all of us is there to urge him to enroll. He recognizes, of course, and that is the point, that he is associating himself with a lot of fine fellows, and that he will get some good training, but it is patriotism that underlies."

"There is in addition the patriotism for community, local pride if you would rather call it that. This makes its influence felt both with the men of the company and with the people of the community, who lend their support, moral and otherwise, to the national guard. A strong, well-trained, smart and snappy appearing company is a thing that people can and do take pride in. Let it be said that the moral support of the community for a national guard company goes far toward bringing about the qualities just mentioned. Such a company is an asset."

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 22.—Mrs. Ruth Brown Snyder and Henry Judd Gray lost their last fight for life today when the court of appeals denied their appeal from conviction of the murder of Albert Snyder, the woman's husband.

The chief ground on which the appeal was asked by both defendants was that their legal rights had been prejudiced by the fact that they were tried jointly instead of separately.

ONE OF OREGON'S OLDEST NATIVE SONS IS A DEATH VICTIM

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 22.—Joseph Daniel Lee, one of Oregon's oldest native sons, died here today. He served in the state legislature from Polk county, and 35 years later from Multnomah county. Under the administration of Governor Geer he was superintendent of the state penitentiary. In 1922 he was a primary candidate for governor.

TROJANS LEAVE FOR GAME WITH NOTRE DAME

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 22.—The high scoring football juggernaut of the University of Southern California, yet to be stopped, embarks tonight upon the greatest of its season's undertakings.

Saturday the Trojan gridiron machine, moulded by Howard Jones, from material that included only a veteran or two, will pit itself against Notre Dame in inter-sectional combat at Soldier Field, Chicago.

Thirty-three Trojan footballers, entraining at 5 o'clock for the midwest, will take with them a record that is marred only by a tie, that with Stanford by a score

of 13 to 13, and a scoring slate that is the highest on the coast.

The flashiest, most brilliant Trojan of them all will not be among the thirty-three making the trip. Don "Beau" Williams, superlative quarterback charger, will be held in a hospital here with a fractured vertebrae. But the loss of this important cog in Troy's offensive strength served only as a spur to the other warriors who emanated a grim, determined air of confidence, inspired by Williams' own words, "beat them, fellows, then come back and get me, and we'll beat Washington next week."
