PRESIDENTIAL PRIVACY

President Coolidge challenges the theory that "the president is a servant at the beck and call of every civic group, ledge or Board of Trade which wishes to 'dress up' its speakers' table at a Washington banquet." Recently the president walked out on a dinner party after his own speech was ended, without waiting for the rest of the program. He was quietly carrying out his theory. In the future he promises to cut down even more on presidential public engagements. In 1926 Mr. Coolidge addressed meetings arranged by the Daughters of the American Revolution, the National Press Club, the National Educational Association, the Pan-American Congress of Journalists, the Bishops of the Methodist church, the American Association of Advertising Agencies, the Trenton Historical Society, the John Ericsson Society, the American Red Cross, the National Geographic Society, the White House correspondents, the National Council of Boy Scouts, the Philadelphia Sesqui-centennial Committee, the Virginia Sesqui-centennial Committee, the Colorado Semi-centennial Committee and the International Oratorical Contest Finals—a total of sixteen "performances." During 1927 Mr. Coolidge has spoken at meetings arranged by seven organizations: The United Press, the American Medical Association, the National Editorial Association, the Pan-American Commercial Conference, the National Geographic Society, the First International Congress of Soil Science and the Women Vice Chairmen of the Republican National Committee. That's cutting the schedule down by half, so far. The president is demonstrating that he likes a little privacy. And none has a better right than he.

That was a most commendable piece of work on the part of those citizens who were instrumental in building a substantial foot bridge across Deer Creek to accommodate the public, eliminating a long distance of travel by way of Fowler street, where a crude foot pass had been built to use during the construction of the two new bridges. The newly-constructed bridge for pedestrians is substantial in every particular and wide enough to adequately accommodate traffic. It will certainly be appreciated by the thousands of people who will have the privilege of using the bridge until work on the larger structures is complete, which will probably be several months.

LONE FLIER IS FORCED BACK BY AIR POCKET

Even for normal flying it was a strain on the ship but in the inverted position the strain was tripled. So, while we were flying there inverted, the center section bracing wires snapped.

"I managed to right the ship at the critical moment although while we were inverted I lost all my charts, food and signal flares."

"I dumped my gasoline then with the bracing wires gone so as to relieve the load."

"I only dumped my main tanks, keeping enough in the wings to fly me back to the coast—I hoped."

"I made a rough guess and steered for the mainland and finally after sighting the shore about sixty miles north of where I finally landed, I found a landing place in a creek bed at San Simeon. I honestly never expected to make the mainland; I was simply flying against hope, in desperation, that's all."

Captain Giles landed at San Simeon at 3:20 yesterday afternoon. During the approximately eight hours he was in the air he reported sighting no ships, being at most times unable to see the water below because of the fog. The last report of Captain Giles after he left San Francisco was from the Farallone Islands, a few miles from the Golden Gate.

Three days ago when Giles made his first hop off from San Francisco he was forced back when he ran into heavy fog 30 miles at sea. Giles last night planned to return to San Francisco today, later more definite plans for his next ocean flight attempt will be made.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 23.—Major E. H. Bowie, weather bureau forecaster, said today the violent weather conditions Captain Frederick A. Giles, British airman, said he encountered 180 miles out over the Pacific yesterday while trying to fly from San Francisco to Hawaii were "simply impossible" and "it is not reasonable to think they could have existed."

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Calif., Nov. 23.—Captain Frederick A. Giles, British flier who made an emergency landing here yesterday after taking off at San Francisco for a flight to Honolulu, declared here today that the storm which he encountered at sea put his plane into a tailspin and threw him from the cockpit of the machine.

"I managed to grasp the gasoline feed line overhead, and as the plane fell I worked my way back into my seat, straightening the plane as it fell," he related.

"When the spin started I was about six hundred miles out and about four thousand feet above the water. When the plane had been righted it was only a short distance above the sea. Had I been flying a monoplane it never would have stood the buff, as the terrific force of the storm made the plane creek and groan."

Giles landed here with barely two gallons of gasoline, explaining that he had dumped 340 gallons at sea after running out of the tail spin in order to lighten the strain on the wings.

The flier left for San Francisco by automobile today declaring he planned to arrange for repairs to the plane and attempt another hop in the near future.

faction were reported making hasty preparations to leave town. An attempt to make peace by Joe Aiello while in a police cell yesterday was cordially refused by members of Capone gang in adjoining cells.

When released, Aiello, once a cheese merchant, begged for a police escort to accompany him home. This refused, he took a cab and slumped down out of sight as he carried him away.

Later, when it was learned that four Aiello lieutenants had been forced to die at the hands of rival gunmen, Chief Hughes ordered their residence under guard. Joe Aiello, released under bond, was to appear today on a charge of conspiracy to slay Capone.

Mayor Thompson, asked to comment upon gang activities, replied: "Law and order will prevail. The people of Chicago in Michael Hughes, have the greatest chief of police in America. No gangs will run this city."

Capone was in court yesterday but charges of disorderly conduct against him were dismissed. The charges had been preferred when he refused to violate his code by identifying men arrested in the alleged conspiracy against him.

Commenting on the killing of Frank Herbert, gunman, by police yesterday, Chief of Detectives O'Connor said: "That's great news. This is the first skirmish in the battle with the gunmen. The police came out successfully. I am going to commend the squad."

XMAS SEAL SALE WILL BE STARTED LAST OF MONTH

The Seal Sale committee for Douglas county have been busy for several weeks making the preliminary arrangements for the annual sale of Christmas seals. This sale will commence the week following Thanksgiving and continue until the first of January.

Mrs. H. C. Boyle, the county chairman, advises that Health Groups are handling the seals in many places this year. Mrs. Boyle has been distributing seals to many of the rural schools, and reports that a great many of these schools are asking that more seals be left with them than were sold last year. In one of these rural schools a small boy was found who had sold 256 seals last year, and in one school this year nine pupils have asked for 400 seals to sell.

In handling the seal sale through the schools the "Health Cross," as the tubercular cross has been named by the children, is to be given to each pupil who sells twenty-five seals.

A large percentage of the money realized from the sale of these Christmas seals is retained within the county. This money is used where misfortune has worked its way into homes and made it impossible for the occupants to properly care for the animals which arise. Such instances as defective eyesight have been corrected by the proper treatment and the purchase of glasses, following which the child has gone happily on to the school work, thereafter being able to keep up the work of the class. Tombs which were diseased have been removed, and thus the general health of the child improved. With the proper handling of such cases the general health is so greatly improved that it is practically impossible for a tubercular condition to establish itself with that particular individual. Especially is this true where the directions of the health unit are followed out for any length of time.

It is hoped that the 1927 Christmas seal sale will be the most successful in the history of Douglas county, and that thousands of these "health seals" will be used in the "dressing up" of the December and Christmas mail.

DEYMER—Mrs. Eliza A. Deymer of Portland passed away at her home of her daughter, Mrs. Lena M. Morgan, in Looking Glass valley on November 19 at 3:35 p. m. Mrs. Deymer was born July 31, 1848, at Randolph, Ohio, where she lived with her parents until 1870, when she was united in marriage to John Deymer. In 1876 Mr. Deymer and family came west to Longmont, Colorado, where they remained until 1881 when they moved west, this time to Merced, Oregon, where Mr. Deymer purchased a large tract of land. Mrs. Deymer united with the M. E. Church when 5 years of age, while living in Lexington. She served as superintendent of the Sunday school a great many years and was active in all church societies. To know her was to love her.

She was laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery in Looking Glass. The sermon was preached by the Rev. T. E. Allen of the Looking Glass M. E. church who beautifully depicted the lives of those who are consecrated in early life. The casket was decorated with beautiful flowers which attested the love of those who knew her. She hath fought a good fight, she hath finished the course, she hath kept the faith and gone to her reward.

STEEL COMPANIES TO FORM A MERGER

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—The New York Herald Tribune says it has learned in important banking circles that a plan to form a merger of independent steel producing companies which will have units embracing the entire industry, is behind the sale of \$75,000,000 bonds by the Youngstown Sheet and Tube company.

With a probable ranking next in size to the United States Steel company it is planned to start this new steel giant with a capitalization sufficiently large to permit it

to compete with its most powerful rival, the new company says. Youngstown Sheet and Tube, the third largest steel company in the United States, will take the leadership in bringing about this combination and the financing, just promoted by Kuhn, Loeb and company, will be used in part to carry out its merger plan.

If present negotiations are completed two middle-western organizations, Inland Steel company and Corrigan McKelley Steel company, will be the first taken into the fold.

Other firms mentioned as probable merger units are Turnbull Steel, Central Alloy Steel, Jones and Laughlin and Otis Steel.
