Her feet had been dampened when she emptied water from the machine, and her hand came in contact with the electric socket. She was the daughter of Dr. C. L. Armstrong, in charge of the veterans' hospital at American Lake, Wash.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 28.—Two men and a woman held up employees of the Swinsky Brothers jewelry store in downtown Cleveland today and escaped with gems valued by the firm at \$100,000. A woman entered the store and asked to be shown some diamonds and while a clerk placed two wallets of gems on the counter, two men entered and commanded employees to throw up their hands. The men then seized the gems and the trio escaped.

FRENCH PLANE FALLS; SIX FLIERS KILLED

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 28.—A dispatch to La Nacion from Tangier, Morocco, says that six French aviators were killed when their plane, one of a squadron of five, crashed in flames forty miles from the town of Denli. The dispatch says the plane fell three thousand meters wrapped in flames and that the fliers, a lieutenant, a sergeant, three non-commissioned officers and a radio operator, were charred. They were buried today. The planes left Fox yesterday morning.

AUTO ASSOCIATION SEEKING MEMBERS

ROSEBURG JUNIOR HIGH BEATEN IN MEDFORD GAME

In a fast and exciting game of football at Medford Saturday afternoon, the Roseburg junior high school was defeated by Medford junior high 12 to 0. The Roseburg boys, playing their second game of the year and their first away from home were easy victims in the first five minutes of play, but after getting used to the wet sawdust field were able to give a good account of themselves and during the last half kept Medford entirely on the defensive.

Roseburg received the first kick-off and failed to gain on two plays. The Medford safety took the punt in the center of the field and with a beautiful broken field run secured the first touchdown. The kick for goal failed. Roseburg again received and attempted a pass on the third play. The pass was intercepted and run back for the second touchdown, making the score 12 to 0.

After this play the Roseburg team staided and from that time on Medford was unable to gain and the teams played a very even contest. In the last half Roseburg took the ball into Medford territory and remained in that part of the field until the closing whistle. Several times the Roseburg players got within striking distance of the Medford goal but failed to score.

The local team returned to Roseburg immediately after the game. This was their last contest of the season and they have turned in their suits. Most of the boys go on up to senior high, only four of the lettermen remaining. However, there are several good prospects coming up from the grades so that the junior high has promise of a strong team for next season. At a meeting held today Paul Babue, center, was selected captain of next year's team.

AGGIE FRESHMAN IS CUP WINNER

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 28.—Alex Cruickshank of McMinnville, Oregon, a freshman at Oregon State College, has been awarded the Moses Achievement Cup for best work in boys and girls clubs in the United States. This was reported by wire from the International Livestock Pacific Exposition. The award of the Moses trophy followed award of first prize in a \$1,000 contest last week by the Farm Journal of Philadelphia.

Cruickshank has been in club work for eight years and awards were made on the basis of his record in that time. He has been working under Harry C. Seymour, who is in charge of boys' and girls' club work in the state.

PLOT DISCOVERED

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 28.—The Examiner today quotes Warden Court Smith of Folsom prison as saying the ring leaders in the Thanksgiving Day uprising at the prison which resulted in the death of twelve men and the wounding of about 30 others had plotted to kidnap him and force him to drive them out of the penitentiary. The plans of the six ring leaders were said to have been revealed to Smith and District Attorney Neil R. McAllister by Atone Brown, one of the sextet. Their plan was to overpower the guards, rush the administration building, force Smith to call his automobile and drive them outside the prison, after which they expected to "dispose of" him in some way and continue on to freedom.

"Many factors have contributed to the pre-eminent position of America's workers, but underlying everything else has been the fact that the American wage earner has had more horse power at his elbow than the worker of any other industrial nation."
