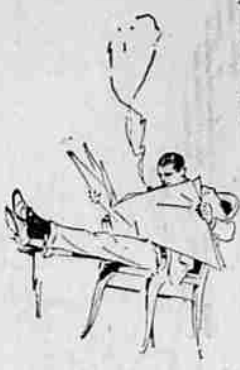

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 29.—The right of the city of Portland to in- spect milk producing establish- ments even though located out- side the city, and its right to re- gulate the sale in the city are upheld by the state supreme court today.

An opinion by the court ap- peals the ruling of Judge George Ros- man of the lower court for Mult- nomah county in the cases of Paul Korth, appellant, against the city and J. Georgeron, appellant, against the city.

The two cases are alike in es- sential details and one opinion cov- ers both.

The plaintiffs challenged the right of the city to inspect their places of business, outside the city, under an ordinance which prohib- its the sale of milk except that produced in places built in accord with the city ordinance and gives the city the right of inspection.

The city enforces this against the outside concerns by refusing to al- low them to sell in the city if they do not submit to inspection, and this is upheld by the opinion.

The plaintiffs, under the so-called peddlers statute, contested the right of the city to regulate them.

This statute provides that cities shall not exact a license for the peddling of products of the soil.

The court holds that it doesn't ap- ply to milk because milk is not peddled but is delivered as other merchandise.

STATE SUPREME COURT DECISIONS

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 29.—The
plot of land containing more than three
acres and owned by the Mary hospital at
Eugene is located in exempt from
taxation, but an adjoining tract of
2.6 acres, which is owned by but
not occupied by the hospital, is
taxable. This is the ruling of the
supreme court today in affirming
Judge Skidmore of the lower
court for Lane county in the case
of the hospital against County As-
sessor Keeney, appellant in the
case.

The opinion was written by Jus- tice Brown.

TO DEVELOP POWER

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—The
city of Eugene, Oregon, filed applica-
tion with the Federal Power
commission today for a preliminary
permit to proceed with installation
of a series of three hydro-electric
power developments on the Mc-
Kenzie River in Lane county, Ore-
gon.

The project provides for con-
struction of three power plants,
one of which is to be used solely
as a peak load plant, a series of
three canals, two diversion dams,
a storage dam and two reservoirs.
No estimate of the ultimate power
capacity of the project was sub-
mitted with the application. The
city of Eugene already operates
one power plant on the McKenzie
River.

LARGE CROWD AT TRAVEL LECTURE

A crowded house last night
greeted Dr. William Wallace
Youngson, who spoke at the M. E.
Church on the subject "The Plead-
ing University." Dr. Youngson,
who was a member of this famous
party that made the world cruise,
presented an illustrated lecture,
using more than 200 slides procured
on his trip. Late yesterday af-
ternoon Dr. Youngson spoke at the
high schools.

GAS PUMP ROBBED

COOLIDGE WILL RECEIVE G. O. P. COMMITTEE THIS WEEK

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Presi-
dent Coolidge will receive the
members of the Republican national
committee during their meeting
here to select the convention city
next week and will make an in-
formal address to them in the east
room of the White House.

The announcement of the presi-
dent's intention to say a few words
was not coupled with any indica-
tion as to whether they would have
a political significance or throw
any light on Mr. Coolidge's own
political future.

It was said the president had
absolutely no choice in the matter
of selecting a convention city.

He understands that a number
of cities well equipped to conduct
the convention have placed their
bids with the committee and it was
said at the White House that any
selection would be entirely satis-
fying to the president.

William M. Butler, chairman of
the committee, has arrived in
Washington, as
