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MARKERS IN MOUNTAINS HELP GEOLOGY STUDENTS

ARDMORE, Okla.—Signs explaining rock formations in the Arbuckle mountains will greet geology students who use the range as an outdoor laboratory this winter. Geologists, working under auspices of the Lions club, have placed markers in the mountains for

the guidance of students and visitors. The signs describe the origin, type, age and thickness of the formations. At the highest peak a large sign shows a cross section of the mountains. Hundreds of students come to the Arbuckles every year to carry on research work in geology. The mountains are valuable as a "laboratory" because of the great variety of rocks and the wealth of fossils.

KNOWS HIS OATS

CHICAGO, Nov. 30.—Herman Trelle of Wembley, Alberta, one of the largest Canadian exhibitors of grain at the International Livestock show is North America's oats king. He also won that title last year.

Displaying the heaviest oats ever exhibited at the Chicago exposition, Trelle defeated L. E. Peterson, Victor, Mont., who was awarded the reserve championship. Last year Trelle also won over Peterson who achieved the oats kingship in 1924 and 1925.

Trelle's oats weighed 49.6 pounds to the bushel and averaged 123 bushels to the acre.

MANY NOW IN PEN

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 30.—With the arrival from Portland of a quintet of young bandits sentenced to long terms in the penitentiary and the "dressing in" of several others from various parts of the state, the population of the state prison reached the record mark of 624 this morning, 14 more than have ever before been confined within the walls of the institution, Henry W. Meyers, superintendent, announced this morning.

Taking note of the large number of young men sentenced to long terms being received at the prison, Mr. Meyers says that special precautions are being taken to guard against attempted breaks, and that every known or suspected trouble maker is being kept under close watch.

Mr. Meyers also announced that reports have come to him that petitions for pardon for the De Autremont boys, train robbers, are being prepared or are already being circulated, but confirmation of the reports are lacking here.

SURVEY FOR BRIDGE

LONGVIEW, Wash., Nov. 30.—A crew of five surveyors under the direction of Dan Walsh, engineer, today began staking a center line and base lines on both sides of the Columbia river here for the projected Longview-Rainier interstate bridge. The beginning of the survey was taken as a conclusive indication that Wesley Vandercok, Longview, and W. D. Comer, Seattle, the bridge's promoters, are ready to proceed with the \$5,000,000 structure under a permit recently approved by a cabinet committee in Washington. D. C. after a prolonged controversy between southwest Washington and northwest Oregon and Portland.

The lines being run will be used for triangulation to locate the piers. The crew is also making a profile and setting bench marks preparatory to making soundings and driving test piling for piers. Joseph B. Strauss, Chicago bridge engineer, is enroute here to personally locate the piers, Vandercok said today.

OFFICIALS INDICTED

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 30.—One hundred and sixty officials of thirty-two Pittsburgh election boards were indicted by the grand jury today to charges of irregularities at the September primary. The indictments followed one of the most sweeping election fraud prosecutions in the history of Allegheny county.

FOUND DEAD IN HOME

AUBURN, Cal., Nov. 30.—George D. Wheeler, contract or-carpenter, formerly of Sacramento today was found dead in the bath room of his home near Newcastle following the discovery by several children of the bloody body of his wife, Mollie Wheeler, in this front yard of their home. The wife is in a hospital here with a chance to recover. The officers are investigating to determine whether Wheeler attacked his wife with a hatchet and killed himself. Mrs. Wheeler is a member of some of the best known families of Placer county.

VICE-PRES. OF N. P. R. R. DIES

SEATTLE, Nov. 30.—George Thomas Reid, 56, vice president of the western council of the Northern Pacific, died suddenly at his apartment here today. Death was said to have been due to heart failure. He had not been ill and was at his desk until 5 p. m. yesterday.

Reid was invited to attend a dinner of railroad executives here last night but declined because of pains in his chest. During the night the pains grew worse and a physician was called. Reid died at 4 a. m.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been made. He was born in Etna, Indiana, April 2, 1871, coming west in the nineties, first being employed by a commercial telegraph company in Tacoma.

He studied law and after being admitted to the bar, associated himself with James Wickersham, later delegate in congress from Alaska. Reid continued in the law business with other attorneys after Wickersham was elected city attorney of Tacoma. Reid was a state senator from Pierce county in 1905 and 1907.

He served a year as deputy prosecutor in Pierce county and then became division counsel for the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway and had charge of the condemnation proceedings of that road which was constructing the North Bank system. He was married in 1898 to Neva E. Cornelius of Cornelius, Oregon, who survives. He also leaves one daughter, Susanna. A brother, W. C. Reid is counsel for the Santa Fe in New Mexico and his father is John M. Reid of Dexter, N. M.

PARALYSIS VICTIM.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 30.—Mario Galligan, 13, died yesterday of infantile paralysis at the Doernbecher hospital. Henry Smith, 9, was taken ill with the disease yesterday. Two cases were released from quarantine. It was reported to the city health office.

VICTIM OF ACCIDENT

PENDLETON, Ore., Nov. 30.—Oscar Kononen, 32, of this city, was found dead this morning in the north Yakum district, west and north of Pendleton, the victim of a car accident. His body was discovered beneath the wreckage of a light runabout. It is thought that a large rock hidden by some tumbleweeds caused the accident. The dead man was badly cut about the head and face and death was instantaneous. Kononen was a farmer in that vicinity and was in the habit of driving back and forth from Pendleton.

KIDNAPED BY BANDITS

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 30.—A Mexican, H. W. Thompson, manager of a mine at Copala, state of Guerrero, has been kidnaped by 20 bandits, dispatched from Mazatlan said today.

The bandits demanded 5,000 pesos (roughly \$2500) ransom. Thompson was captured and taken to the mountains after the bandits attacked his home and were refused money and arms. They threatened to kill him if the authorities were notified before the ransom was paid.

One of Thompson's employees notified headquarters at Mazatlan, state of Sinaloa. The employee was instructed to send a messenger to pay the ransom and obtain his employer's release. The military commander, General Leopoldo Rizo, ordered that the bandits be pursued immediately and that Thompson be rescued.

INTRODUCE MUCH EVIDENCE

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 30.—More than one thousand pieces of evidence had been introduced today in the trial of J. V. Burke, president of the defunct Bank of Kenton. The state has been trying to show Burke responsible for the failure of the bank through overdrafts to the United Meat company, of which he was vice president.

Joseph P. Bauer, assistant cashier, today testified that R. R. Thatcher, cashier of the bank, who already has pleaded guilty, first permitted overdrafts by the meat company, and that when Burke discovered this he ordered Thatcher not to permit the company to overdraft to any excessive amount.

Deputy District Attorney Mowry, in course of cross-examination today intimated that Thatcher might not testify at the trial as had been expected. He said he did not know where Thatcher could be found.

WILL NOT JOIN ST. PAUL

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 30.—The city of Portland will not officially join with St. Paul in protesting the proposed unification of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroads. This attitude was taken today by the city council in endorsing a message by Mayor George L. Baker to Mayor L. C. Hodgson of St. Paul. The message said:

"I regret that our viewpoints on the proposed merger do not coincide. My own view is that the proposed unification of the Great Northern, Northern Pacific and Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway systems will be beneficial to Portland and the Pacific northwest."

Mayor Hodgson recently asked Portland to join St. Paul in protesting against the merger.

spank their offspring. The fathers adjourned with their sons to the court corridors, and the union spanking was described as a success, there being only four dissenting votes.

YOUTHFUL AUTO THIEVES ARE HELD

John Webster, 15, and Woodrow Wilson, 14, the former of Sumner, Washington, and the latter of Elfr, Washington, were arrested here today and are being held for their parents or Washington authorities. The boys are alleged to have stolen the car belonging to the older boy's father. They were picked up at the quarantine station at the north border of the county.
