PROBE GANG WARFARE

CHICAGO, Nov. 30.—Carmen Ferrer's death, believed to have been due to gang rivalry, has brought the federal government into the investigation of Chicago's gangland warfare.

Ferrer, whose body was found early yesterday beside a road in Bensenville, was known as an amiable, energetic manufacturer. The United States district attorney's office, however, has revealed that Ferrer and six others were to have appeared for trial in federal court next Monday on charges of violating the prohibition law.

The government was prepared to present evidence showing Ferrer to be the head of a large band of moonshiners. The district attorney's office today advanced the theory that Ferrer was slain to prevent his giving evidence damaging to others involved in the manufacture of alcohol.

GLIDE GRANGE IS
OPPOSED TO COUNTY
FAIR PROPOSAL

Opposition to a central county fair and endorsement of the district fair plan is contained in a resolution adopted by Glide Grange. The grange at its last meeting discussed the matter very thoroughly, it being the prevailing sentiment that conditions tend to make a county fair unsuccessful and that the expense of constructing buildings and making other arrangements for a fair are not justified. It was the opinion, however, that community fairs are beneficial, and it was the belief that the county should have a fair board to supervise these community fairs and to arrange the county exhibit at the state fair. In view of these opinions the grange adopted the following resolution:

Whereas, the re-establishment of a county fair has been proposed,

Whereas, paved roads, rapid transportation and modern attractions may have greatly altered conditions tending to make a central county fair successful, and

Whereas, the agricultural sections of Douglas county are so situated as to make the accumulation in a central place of agricultural, horticultural and stock exhibits representative of all parts of the county very difficult, and

Whereas, experience has shown conclusively that adequate grounds and buildings are absolute essentials to successful fairs and these facilities are not within reach of the county at the present time, and

Whereas, it freely admitted that the primary aim of such fairs is the incentive to growers to produce better agricultural, horticultural and live stock products, advertising being a secondary consideration, therefore

Be It Resolved by Glide Grange, No. 422, in regular assembly, that we endorse the action of the Douglas County Pomona Grange in requesting the county court of Douglas county to appoint a county fair board, provided the request embodies a recommendation that the

fair funds be used to institute and maintain district fairs in various parts of the county under the direction of the county fair board;

That the county fair board be requested to appropriate sufficient funds from the moneys received from the state to properly care for the county exhibit at the state fair in 1928, and

That one copy of this resolution be sent to the fair committee of the Douglas County Pomona Grange, one copy to the county court of Douglas county, one copy to each subordinate grange of the county and one copy to the press.

CANNERIES WILL
FINISH SEASON RUN
IN TWO WEEKS

The Norton Cannaling company plants at Sutherlin and Roseburg will complete their season's run in about ten days or two weeks, according to an announcement made today by Frank Norton, owner and manager. The canneries have been operating continuously since October on apples and have just about finished with the fruit that they have purchased.

The season's pack will consist of approximately 40,000 cases of apples, 21,000 cases of pears, 10,000 cases of peaches, 6,000 cases of blackberries and several thousand cases of broccoli, berries and various fruits.

The two canneries have furnished employment to more than 280 people and the monthly payroll since October amounted to approximately \$14,000 per month. In addition to the money paid in wages the canneries have distributed large sums in the purchase of fruits from Douglas county growers.

LOS ANGELES.—Uncle Sam thinks \$1937 is due on Fatty Arbuckle's income tax for 1926 and so he is suing.

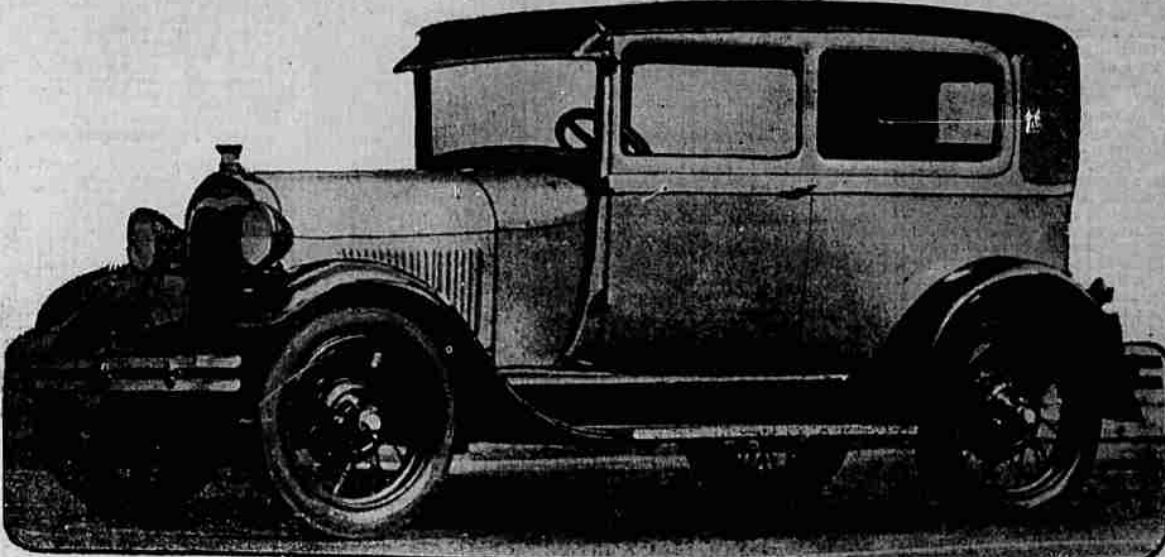
COPENHAGEN.—Cavalry is to be abolished. In its place the government purposes riding infantry, mounted on horses and bicycles.

The 20th annual Christmas seal sale started in Douglas county this week with a most encouraging outlook. The local chairman in the different communities had all plans for the carrying on of the work well in hand. Mrs. Max Kimmell, the local chairman for Riddle, at the close of the first day's sales reported to the county chairman that their quota of seals had all been sold and requested that \$10.00 worth of additional seals be forwarded to her. That is a splendid beginning for the Riddle community.

Mrs. H. C. Boyle, county chairman, and Mrs. B. R. West, city chairman, appeared before the Kiwanis Club at their weekly luncheon on Tuesday of this week. Mrs.

West requested the support of that organization in the city that the seal sale might be put over 100 per cent in Roseburg. Mrs. Boyle gave statistical data on what had been accomplished and what the committee hopes to do the present season. Mrs. Boyle states that an effort is being made to sell a sufficient amount of seals this year to give the County Health Unit 60 per cent of the total amount raised for use in the county.

Mrs. Edith S. Ackert, county school superintendent, has heartily endorsed the Christmas seal sale in letters to the state organization and Mrs. H. C. Boyle, the county chairman. In her endorsement sent to Mrs. Boyle she says in part, "It makes me quite happy to think that the time has again come, for us to buy the Christmas seals. They are delightfully pretty this year, and so Christmas. I hope that every teacher in the county will be able to report a big sale, and I do hope more than that, that each boy and girl in the county will both sell and use some on their own packages. It is a real pleasure for us to know that we can have a part and such a big one too, in something as big as the Junior Red Cross."

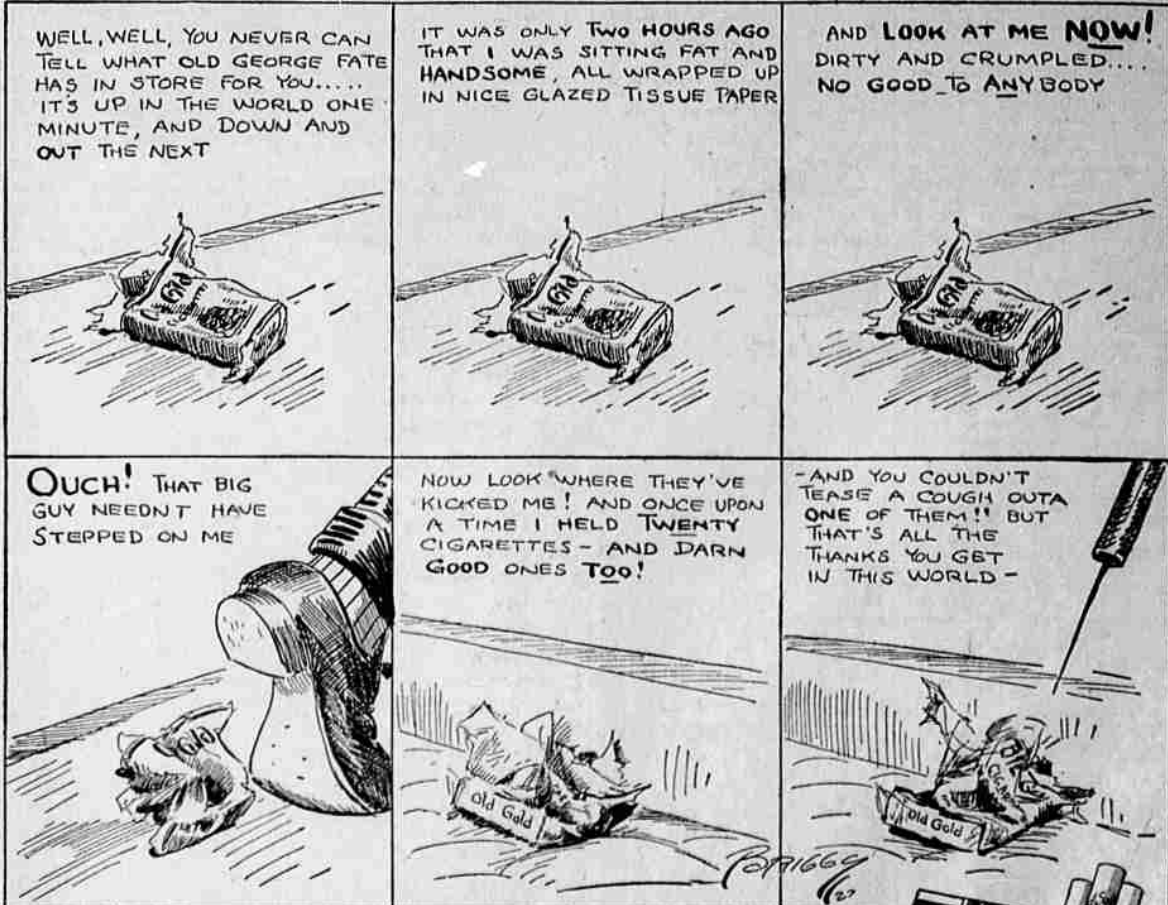
