NATIONAL WOOL GROWERS FORM MARKET COUNCIL

Thirty wool pools representing probably sixty per cent of all wool marketed cooperatively in the United States, are represented by the National Wool Marketing Council, which completed its organization in Chicago on December 2nd, according to a wire just received from R. A. Ward, General Manager of the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers of Portland, Oregon, who was active in the formation of the Council and who has been elected to its Board of Directors.

The object of the Council is to bring these various wool cooperatives together to coordinate their general activities, and to work together for the advancement of the interests of all wool growers who are members of the pools represented.

"The organization of the National Wool Council is of the most vital importance to all wool growers of the western states," says Mr. Ward. "The two largest wool growers associations in the United States—the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers and the Ohio Wool Growers Association—are members of the Council, and the close cooperation between all of the wool pools, which will result from the formation of the Council, will mean a better marketing service to the grower members."

The plan for a National Wool Marketing Council was first conceived by a group of growers who attended the wool marketing conference held in Washington, D. C., under the auspices of the United States Department of Agriculture in February of this year. Their preliminary meeting at that time was followed by a second meeting held in Chicago on June 20th. Preliminary investigation work done by the growers following these two meetings resulted in the final formation of the Council as outlined above.

Directors of the newly formed Council are: J. B. Wilson, Secretary, Wyoming Wool Growers Association; McKinley, Wyoming; H. J. Hooper, See-Manager, Utah Wool Marketing Association, Salt Lake City; H. B. Palmer, President, Ohio Wool Growers Association, Columbus, Ohio; Mr. Moody of New York, and R. A. Ward, General Manager, Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers, Portland, Oregon.

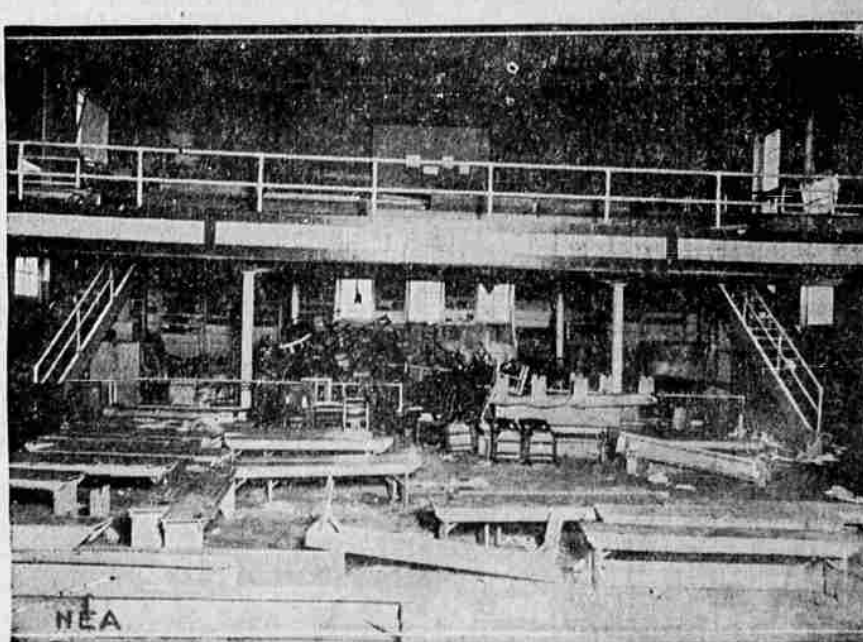
