THE JUNK HEAP OF HUMAN LIFE

In the great army of men at the wheels and machines of American industry, sixty-three men "fall by the wayside" every day—killed by accidents that might have been prevented. In a year's time the toll of men maimed in this country, the world's greatest industrial producer, amounts to the alarming total of 105,000. Imagine a city of 22,995 population, wiped out to the last man by a sudden catastrophe. That city is wiped out every year in mishaps mostly due to carelessness, accidents that a little thought or education could have prevented. Secretary of Labor James J. Davis, making his annual report for 1927, will say: "No other industrial nation produces so many goods as we do, and in no other country are so many men killed and maimed in industry. We have been so busy speeding up this industrial machine of ours that we have turned our backs on the price we have been paying for this in terms of American workers killed or maimed every day in the course of their occupation. Whatever its mechanical wonders, the nation cannot continue to be proud of its industry and prosperity while the machinery that produces it kills so many men. If industry will bend itself to the conservation of life with the same energy it has applied to perfecting its mechanical equipment the result in safer conditions will be assured." Sixty-three men a day killed; 288 men a day maimed. That is the human junk heap of our national industry.

Four carloads of turkeys going to eastern markets from this county is evidence that this industry is a profitable one and that the Douglas birds are finally becoming so well advertised that a demand has been created for the output in foreign markets. Keeping the quality to the highest standard—marketing nothing but the finest grown fowls—will, in a very brief period, place this section of the state at the top of all turkey growing centers.

EXTREME PENALTY ASKED FOR PAIR

MAYS LANDING, N. J., Dec. 7.—The testimony given in the Lillendahl murder trial warrants a verdict of murder in the first degree against the widow of the victim and her elderly admirer, Prosecutor Hinkle asserted in his summation to the jury today.

Hinkle said he fully expected such a verdict with a penalty of either death or life imprisonment. He then began reviewing the testimony of state witnesses.

"If Willis Beach did commit this murder," he said, "Margaret Lillendahl, who was there, knew it and her story of the negroes in false. If one of them is guilty the other is guilty and we believe the state has made its case."

"That is all," he said.

He had been speaking less than five minutes. Edison Hodges then began his summation for Beach.

Hodges asked what the motive could possibly have been for Beach to have committed the crime with

which he is charged.

"The only motives could have been money or love," he said. "And the state has established neither of these."

"No money is involved and love is a far fetched notion in this case. He has a family. All the members of this family have come to his support here. Does that indicate that Beach was planning to cast off his wife for another woman?"

CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE AT BOOTHS TO START THURS.

The 1927 health campaign will open Thursday when the sale of the Christmas seals in booths in the business district of Roseburg will start. Mrs. Elmer R. West is in charge of the sale in Roseburg and has selected nine other matrons to assist her in operating the booths, which will be open during the afternoons, beginning Thursday, for the remainder of the week. 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ROSEBURG WILL INVITE FRUIT GROWERS' MEET

Next Convention of State Society May Be Held Here—Vital Problems Will Be Discussed.

Douglas county is to be well represented at the Oregon State Horticultural society convention to be held in Hood River, December 13, 14 and 15. R. A. Busenbark, president of the county society, Wm. Voorhees, vice-president, J. C. Leedy, secretary-treasurer, and C. E. Moyer, one of the most active members, will all probably be present and it is possible that others of the county fruit growers will attend the meeting.

Many problems are now harassing the fruit growers of the state, due to changing conditions and a great part of the three-day program will be filled with discussions pertaining to leading issues of the industry. Production, marketing and even manufacturing, as related to the fruit industry, having imported places on the program, which has recently been announced by Clayton L. Lang, secretary of the state society and extension specialist at the state college. Consideration of the problem of spray residue, which broke over the fruit world with disastrous suddenness a year ago is to be one of the most important topics. Many national specialists are scheduled for lectures or discussions.

Roseburg is extending an invitation to the state society to hold its 1928 meeting in this city. A formal invitation has already been extended through the secretary and the local delegation will press its invitation on the convention floor at the Hood River meeting.

COOLIDGE GIVES BUDGET MESSAGE

for the next year will be increased \$48,000,000. This includes provision for prosecution of work on all projects authorized by congress with the exception of three submarine and twelve destroyers authorized in 1916 for which Mr. Coolidge said no funds are desired now. Under this program two submarines and eight destroyers would be under construction next year and two of the cruisers would be practically completed in 1929. Funds also are recommended for modernization of the battleships Oklahoma and Nevada and for the lighter-than-air ship already authorized by congress.

For army housing, a total of \$13,281,000 is recommended for expenditure during this and next year, about half of it being included in the supplemental estimate. The army estimates contemplate a regular army of 118,750 enlisted men, slightly larger than the present, with 12,000 officers, the same as now.

Recommended appropriations for the navy and navy services would give the Navy 696 of the 1,000 planes provided by the five-year program and the army an estimated number of 1800 air planes authorized for it at the end of five years. Also, funds would be available during the next year to complete more than 10,000 miles of light railways as contemplated in the Department of Commerce aviation program.

The president in his message accompanying the budget called for a curtailment of federal aid to state projects, a policy which he regards as hurtful rather than helpful to states.

"As shown in the maternity and infancy act," he said, "when the government engages in such an enterprise it is almost impossible to terminate its connection therewith. We should not only decide by refusal to countenance additional federal participation in state aid projects but should make careful study of all our activities of that character with a view to curtailing them."

For the first time since prohibition went into effect, a decrease rather than an increase in the funds for dry law enforcement is sought. A cut of \$591,265 in the prohibition Bureau's allotment for next year is the result, it was explained, of economies in administrative and in reorganization of the bureau, which resulted in the transfer of some employees to other agencies of the government.

The effect of transfers is felt by the customs service for which an additional \$1,000,000 was recommended, most of it for salaries of men transferred to patrol of the borders to prevent liquor smuggling.

For the Coast Guard the budget bureau recommended appropriations totalling \$765,000 less than the amount available this year, but made provision for establishing a Coast Guard station at Grand Marais, Mich., at a cost of \$54,770.

The budget estimate for the post office department, \$768,270,042, is \$10,600,000 more than the amount available for expenditure this year. An increase of \$2,000,000 in the

provisions for carrying air mail by private contractors and of \$150,000 for the carrying of foreign mail by air was recommended.

The Veterans' Bureau is allotted \$350,000,000, an increase of \$31,600,000, but the estimates include \$74,500,000 for paying casualty losses from the government life insurance fund and investment of premium accruing to it.

The Budget Bureau approved a \$142,753,229 program for the Agriculture Department, a net decrease of \$531,000; allotted the Shipping Board \$13,958,750, a reduction of \$3,601,250, and in addition to the \$390,190,059 total recommended for the Interior Department for use next year said that an appropriation of \$3,450,000 for the Coolidge Dam irrigation project should be included in the next deficiency bill.

Provision is made for carrying out the public buildings program at an expenditure rate of \$15,000,000 a year, and for the Panama Canal \$600,000 is provided for overhauling the Pacific locks, a like amount for continuing construction of permanent quarters and \$250,000 for beginning work on a dam across the Charles River, at Alhambra, Panama. This project, which is estimated to cost about \$12,000,000 and take five years to complete, is designed for storage of water for use in operation of the canal.

The budget shows a saving of \$50,000,000 in interest which will be paid next year on the public debt over this year. In this connection, Mr. Coolidge called attention to the refunding of the Second Liberty Loan, which he said had accounted for a considerable saving.

The isolation by which the girl has been effected, there should be no further exposure resulting from her case.

While the physicians, of course, greatly regret the new case, yet they feel that it does not detract from the encouraging outlook. Many contacts were formed with the Hartfield case, and it will be surprising, the physicians say, if several cases do not develop, but with all these new cases in isolation, there is a strong possibility that the situation will not reach epidemic stage, they say.

The other two cases in the county are both reported to be improving. The child at Oakland is expected to fully recover and Tom Hartfield in Roseburg was reported considerably improved today. Both of his legs were affected by the paralysis, but today he was able to move the left leg slightly, a very hopeful sign. While his recovery may take several weeks yet those in touch with the case are greatly encouraged by the progress made.
