SEC'TY TREASURY GIVES REPORT

what their dependence upon the federal reserve system, due mainly to the imports and a decline in requirements for currency.

Although internal revenue collections showed an increase of only \$21,774,865 during the last fiscal year over the previous year, Secretary Mellon declared that a "closer analysis of the collections shows more definitely that tax changes were responsible for the failure of such receipts to increase." Receipts from internal revenue totaled \$2,869,414,342 while income from customs and other miscellaneous sources amounted to \$1,259,950,099, or an increase of \$134,863,786 over the previous year.

The \$3,493,584,519 total expenditures of the government for the last fiscal year, the report said, represented a decrease of \$124,000,000 over the preceding year while receipts totaled \$4,129,394,441, which left a surplus of \$535,809,922. Of this margin \$611,764,538 was applied to retirement of the public debt which was \$285,000,000 more than was applied to the debt in the previous year. This left a total debt at the close of the fiscal year last June 30 of \$18,510,174,266.10 after normal retirements of \$519,563,844.78 had been effected.

In an analysis of the distribution of expenditures, the report showed that payments to the public debt in the last fiscal year absorbed 51.1 per cent of the total, military functions 31.8 per cent and ordinary civil functions 17.1. Emphasizing that the cost of past wars occupies an important place in government finance, the Secretary estimated that the World War cost the United States \$35,119,622,144. Reiterating his recommendation for tax legislation as outlined to the House Ways and Means Committee, in which he urged limitation of reduction to \$225,000,000, Secretary Mellon further urged Congress to remove the surtax

from government securities so that corporations and individual investors would be on a parity with government securities would be placed on a more even footing with tax-exempt state and municipal issues. He again requested Congress to pass the alien property bill and the amendment to the farm loan act which were introduced at the last session.

THURON IN PORTLAND
Sociability in Roseburg is at the zero stage these days and because he has a good record of attendance for the past four years, John M. Thron, banker came to Portland to be present at a Kiwanis meeting, registering at the Hotel Portland. "Roseburg is in quarantine," explained Mr. Thron, "and there is an infantile paralysis scare which has affected the town. There is only one case of the disease, but the authorities are taking every precaution to guard against it spreading. All the theatres are closed, the churches are closed, there are no lodge meetings, no meeting of civic clubs, such as the Kiwanis; the schools are closed. In brief, gatherings of all sorts are strictly forbidden. Children under 21 years of age are not permitted to leave their own premises, but there is no regulation on adults, who can run around all they want to, with the exception that there must be no gatherings of any character. The single case is a boy who is a member of our high school football team. He went with the team to Ashland and played there. The presumption is that he contracted the disease there, but, of course, that is merely conjecture. None of the other boys on the football team were affected. The county has been taking precautions against the disease for weeks, maintaining a quarantine guard at Canyonville and Drain, but here the case popped up despite these preventive measures and has demoralized the community." And so Mr. Thron traveled 400 miles, the distance from Roseburg to Portland and return, to report at the Kiwanis meeting—Morning Oregonian.

DETECTIVE SAYS DAY ORDERED HIM TO SHADOW JURORS

(Associated Press Local Wire)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Testifying for the government, Charles G. Ruddy, a Burns detective, declared in the District of Columbia supreme court today that Henry Mason Day, an associate of Harry F. Sinclair personally ordered an investigation as to whether there was a murder on the home of one of the Fall-Sinclair oil trial jurors.

The juror in question was John P. Kern, Ruddy said the operative he assigned to the task was unable to obtain the information requested.

Ruddy was the first of the witnesses called in the district attorney's efforts to show that Sinclair, William J. Burns and others were guilty of contempt of court in having the trial jury placed under surveillance.

Telling the court he was under orders from Day, the witness described in detail his own activities and those of the men under him, all operatives of the Burns Agency.

The witness said that after October 24 Day decided only certain jurors needed shadowing, but he could not recall which they were.
