WEED MAY SOLVE RIVER PROBLEM

RANDON, Dec. 8.—Furze, a hedge plant which is introduced into the Randon vicinity some 40 years ago from Ireland and which is commonly known here as "Irish Hedge," may save the U. S. government and southern Mississippi river states millions of dollars in keeping open the channel of the river which is now being continually filled in by drifting sand.

Furze has become a pest weed in this section and is rapidly spreading up and down the coast, a few plants having been found as far north as Charleston on Coos Bay and abundant growths appearing along the coast into Curry county.

H. H. Schott, forage crops investigator for the U. S. department of agriculture, was here yesterday accompanied by G. A. Klein of the Klein Seed company of Los Angeles.

From a dozen to 15 furze plants were secured and are being shipped to the agricultural commissioner of Louisiana where they will be planted on the sand islands in the lower Mississippi river.

It is hoped that the furze will thrive there for it is admirably adapted to preventing the shifting of sands. It will grow on sand where it is near enough to water level to allow the roots to penetrate to moisture.

The government and lower Mississippi states have been forced to expend large sums of money in continually dredging the lower river.

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YAMHILL BOY TO GET HIGH HONORS

YAMHILL, Ore., Dec. 7.—All this section of the country is looking forward to next Saturday as a gala occasion, when crowds are expected to gather here to pay honor to Alex. Crutcher, 18, who won two outstanding national prizes at the International Live-stock Exposition at Chicago, for work as a leader in agricultural club work.

The Moses cup trophy, which he captured at Chicago in competition with 600,000 other club workers, will be presented to him formally. He also received a cash prize from a Philadelphia farm journal.

In the morning a pilgrimage will be made to Crutcher's farm, near McMinnville, where motion pictures will be taken of him among his club workers and his livestock.

In the afternoon at McMinnville there will be a big gathering from all the country side, and Governor J. L. Patterson, Gov. Plummer, manager of the Pacific International Live-stock Exposition, H. C. Seymour, club leader of Oregon, President Kerr of Oregon State Agricultural College and others will speak. Governor Patterson assured Mr. Plummer that he would cancel another engagement to be at McMinnville Saturday.

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OREGON PLAYERS BEHIND McEWAN

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 8.—Football players on the Oregon campus are behind Captain John J. McEwan, head coach, stronger now than ever before, according to a statement issued by the Order of the "O," lettermen organization.

Frank Riles, veteran grid end and president of the order, issued the following statement today:

"The Order of the 'O' is behind Coach McEwan as a body. There is no reason for the Oregon team not to continue improving under McEwan's tutelage to the point where it can hold its own in conference competition. The organization respectfully calls the attention of interested alumni to the fact that Andy Smith, who gained undivided fame with his wonder teams at California, was practically unknown in his first two years there."

"When McEwan came here he said he would have a strong team in 1928. He knew when he first looked over the athletic situation at Oregon that would be necessary to build up a winning team. He has laid the foundation for the success that he promised for next year. It is logical to bring in a new man who must tear down the foundation and lay his own before even reaching the point at which the Oregon team now stands? The Order of the 'O' feels that the bringing of a new coach at this time will set Oregon athletic progress back at least two years."

"The team itself is back of McEwan to a man and is looking forward to next year with eagerness and confidence, both in a coach and in itself. The players feel that they are just getting the feel of McEwan's system and it would be a keen disappointment to them were they forced to begin another period of apprenticeship
