PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 10.-A plan by the federal government to sell a block in the heart of Port-land now occupied by the old post-offlee for \$1,750,000 struck a snag today when county officials discov-ered that the block had been deed-ed to the city in \$352 for multic

ered that the block had been deed-ed to the city in 1852 for public purposes. The block was sold by the city to the government in 1887 for \$20. 000 for erection of the post office. District Attorney Stanley Myers said the government was morally, if not legally bound to re-sell the block back to the city for the pur-chase price plus reasonable inter-est if the present building is aban-doned.
