An important business deal was completed today when the Farm Bureau Exchange purchased the farm implement agencies formerly conducted by Paul Amort, who is leaving Roseburg to accept a position as manager of the factory branch of the Bean Spray pump company at Portland.

The farm implement exchange, which has been gradually extending its lines is now taking over the complete implement business formerly handled by Mr. Amort and will sell John Deere implements and machinery, the Bean Spray pumps, and other lines. Mr. Amort has discontinued the Oldsmobile agency and has turned over his spare parts business to the Orchard company. The equipment purchased by the Farm Bureau Exchange is being moved to that company's building on Washington street.

Mr. Amort will have charge of the branch factory at Portland and will be the company's representative for all of Oregon. In the capacity he will be in Roseburg quite frequently, although his home will be in Portland in the future.

OLYMPIC RUNNER IS SERIOUSLY ILL

DECATUR, Ill., Dec. 12.—Loren Murchison, sprint flash of two Olympic games who has been near death in a Decatur hospital, since Wednesday suffering from cerebral spinal meningitis, was "holding his own, with slight improvement," the 1 a. m. bulletin on his condition said.

The report, contradicting those which had come from the sick room Sunday, was given out after physicians had completed laboratory tests of spinal fluid. The tests they said, while not auguring recovery, indicated some improvement.

Another 48 hours, the doctors believe, should tell whether Murchison will recover.

REMOVAL BOLTS CAUSES WRECK

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 12.—The Baltimore & Ohio railroad office announced here today that an investigation disclosed that removal of bolts from the ends of two rails caused the wreck of train No. 19, the Detroit Limited, enroute from Washington Saturday.

Thirty miles southeast of here last night, killing one trainman and injuring two others.

First intimation that the train had been deliberately wrecked, the railroad announced, came from a section foreman who reported removal of the bolts. Railroad officials declared they had no knowledge of who had tampered with the tracks, but said investigation confirmed the section foreman's report.

INVOLVE ANOTHER MAN IN MURDER

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Letters purporting to involve a second man in the murder of Albert Snyder, for which Mrs. Ruth Snyder and Henry Judd Gray are under sentence of death today, were in the possession of Edgar F. Hazelton, Mrs. Snyder's attorney.

Hazelton said he had known of the contents of the letters for two months and had investigated them. He refused to say what action, if any would be taken on them. The letters were written by David B. Chambers of New York City, whose interest in the case was not clear, Hazelton said.

Reporters who attempted to interview Chambers were sent word that he had been advised not to give out any information in the case.

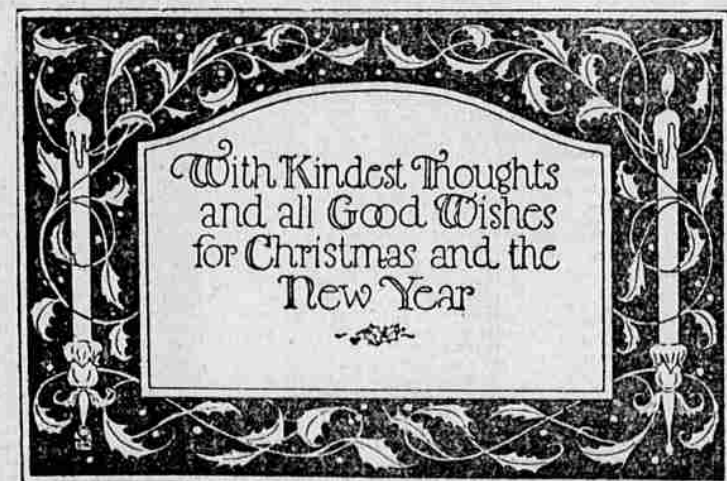


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The Twelve Citizen-Judges of Mrs. Lilliendahl and Beach
