CORDON EXPECTS COUNTIES TO WIN GRANT LAND SUIT

District Attorney Guy Cordon returned last night from Salem where he has been spending the past two weeks assisting in the preparation of the land grant counties' brief in the land grant case. The state recently brought suit against the counties to collect a portion of the money paid by the government and in the lower court the counties won an unqualified victory, but the state has appealed to the supreme court and another hearing is to be held very soon. Attorney Cordon says that the counties will be able to make a much stronger showing before the supreme court than they did before the lower court as additional authority upholding the position assumed by the counties has been discovered. In the event the counties are able to win again in this next round the issue will be settled as the state will not be able to carry the case past that court, but if the decision should be an adverse one, the counties have the right to go on into the federal court. However, Mr. Cordon is quite positive that in view of the argument to be presented through the brief now prepared the supreme court's decision will be favorable to the counties. If this is the case Douglas county will be benefitted to the extent of approximately \$325,000.

MRS. LILLIENDAHL RESIGNED TO FATE

MAYS LANDING, N. J., Dec. 13.—Mrs. Margaret Thompson Lilliendaahl is "resigned to her fate" and will forego a Christmas party and dinner with her 8-year old son at the county jail here in order to start her ten-year prison sentence at the state penitentiary at Trenton. She had planned the yuletide observance with her boy, Alfred, under the ruling which allows a prisoner 20 days at the place of trial before being incarcerated in the state prison. Not until she is taken to Trenton, however, does the ten year jail term begin. A similar desire to "have it over with" was expressed by Willis Beach, who with the widow was sentenced to ten years in the slaying of the woman's husband, Dr. A. Lilliendaahl.
