WHIPPET TRAVELS 468 MILES WHILE WATCH TICKS 511

The stamina and speed of the Whippet and its ability to conquer a blinding sleet and snow storm was demonstrated this week when a Collegiate roadster traveled 468 miles in 511 minutes, around the lower rim of the state of Michigan.

This average of speed of \$54.95 miles an hour was made under the official check of the Western Union, not only at the start and finishing points but at five different points along the route.

With Sam Ross at the wheel of the Whippet Collegiate Roadster and Chet Kilmeyer acting as relief driver, the Whippet sped from Detroit at 8 a. m. and returned to the starting point after the 468 miles, at 4:31 p. m. Newspapermen were on hand both at the start and finish to check the remarkable performance of the Whippet.

From the very start the Whippet encountered a blizzard as it swept across the lower rim of Michigan. The roads became ice-covered in a short time but despite this driving hazard the Whippet continued on its way mile after mile through the blinding storm.

As the Whippet roared into the city limits of Flint and northward to Saginaw the fury of the storm increased but the high speed of the Whippet was maintained by the drivers. However, as they entered the city limits all traffic laws were strictly obeyed.

The route then carried the Whippet westward to Howard City and then south through Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, Sturgis, Coldwater, Ann Arbor and Detroit. Many sharp turns were encountered during the long drive but the drivers declared that they were able to make these turns at high speed because of the roadability of the car and the added safety of four-wheel brake equipment.

This is the same care and the same drivers who last week circled the lower peninsula of Michigan, a distance of 920 miles in 118 minutes at an average speed of 47.25 miles an hour. This run also was driven in a rain storm and north of Cheboygan was further handicapped by badly cut up ice covered highways. The last 36 miles of the run was made in rain and a heavy fog which cut the average speed at least five miles an hour.

This new Whippet achievement is another that is now added to the scores of power, speed, stamina and economy marks made by the Whippet in the past year which has won for this car the reputation for performance that would do credit to a six cylinder car selling in a higher priced field.

PONTIAC DEALER TAKES AIRPLANE TO HASTEN DEAL

The automobile industry now is using its aerial offspring, the airplane, in setting the pace for modern business.

One motor manufacturing company and a motor fuel company already possess planes in which their executives are carried rapidly to points where their services are needed.

But a brand new angle in the growing association between land motoring and "air motoring" developed recently when two automobile sales executives flew from Milwaukee to the Oakland Motor Car company factory at Pontiac, Mich., in order to conduct an urgently needed drive-away of Oakland and Pontiac Sixes.

The two men, K. D. Moore, general sales manager of Holabson-Thompson, Inc., Milwaukee, and his assistant, W. H. Hope, needed immediately a large number of cars to fill the orders of waiting customers. They chartered a commercial plane and took to the air at 5 a. m. Four later they were in Pontiac where they took charge of the drive-away back to Milwaukee.

TRIPLEX GLASS IS USED IN THE NEW FORD AUTOMOBILES

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—Most radically different of all the innovations in the new Ford car, and saved till the last to be announced, is the fact that triplex glass will be used as standard equipment in the windshields of all Ford models. This is the clear-vision, non-shattering glass which in the past year has been gaining rapidly in general use, but Ford is the first American manufacturer to make it standard in his cars. Not to be distinguished by eye from ordinary plate glass, it does not shatter under impact and thereby eliminates two-thirds of the danger of motoring, according to the manufacturer. Sixty five per cent of all injuries in auto accidents are caused by broken glass according to insurance figures.

Mr. Ford gives as his reason for making this innovation his belief that the safety of the motoring public is of primary consequence. Other features of his new cars, hitherto announced, bear out his efforts in this direction.

Triplex, originally a British product, made its appearance here last year. It is seen in sixteen cars in the current Commodore, Salon, Amory L. Haskell, president of the Triplex Safety Glass company of North America, stated last night about this new and enormous order.

"To meet Ford demands we have tripled our factory in Hoboken and increased our production 250 per cent in the past twelve days. We brought new grinding machinery from California by airplane. Within the month, our production will have increased 800 per cent more, and soon after New Year's we shall be equipping 1,000 cars a day."

In construction, this glass consists of two outside layers of plate glass with a middle, binding layer of pyroxalin plastic. The three laminations are welded together under heat, pressure and chemical treatment. The Underwriters Laboratories passed on the glass recently.

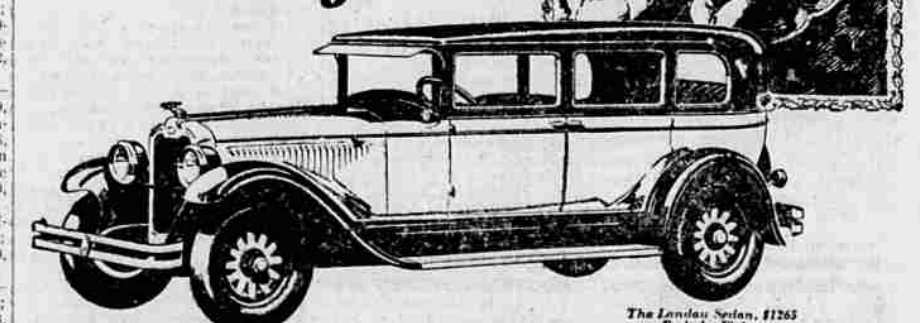
