GOV'T WINS A VICTORY IN CASE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The government won a victory over counsel for Harry F. Sinclair and his associates today when Justice Frederick L. Siddons ruled the defense could not cross-examine Frank J. O'Reilly, a Burns detective, regarding conversations he had with the parents of Edward J. Kidwell, Jr., a juror in the Fall-Sinclair oil trial.

O'Reilly is a government witness in the contempt cases against Sinclair, William J. Burns and others growing out of the shadowing of the oil jury. He had testified that he visited the home of the juror's parents, and the Senior Kidwell's barber shop and talked with them, but on direct examination he was cautioned by James J. O'Leary, assistant district attorney, that he must not describe the conversations.

Charles A. Douglas, counsel for the Burns officials, asked O'Reilly to tell of the conversations yesterday, but the government objected on the ground that this feature had not been gone into on direct examination.

The defense contended the reason the government did not ask O'Reilly about the conversation was fear that his testimony would show they were only casual and of no importance in the case.

APPOINTED AS BISHOP

ROME, Dec. 15.—The Rev. Edward Kelly of Baker, Oregon, has been appointed bishop of Boise by Pope Pius.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 16.
—The Rev. Edward Kelly appointed as bishop of Boise, Idaho, is chancellor of the diocese of Baker City, Oregon, and secretary to Bishop Joseph McGrath of Baker. He has been at Baker for five or six years and is a comparatively young man. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. James L. Kelly, and three brothers, reside at The Dalles, Oregon. A sister, Mrs. D. J. Curran, resides in Portland. Rev. Kelly succeeds the late Bishop Daniel M. Gorman who died last June. The diocese of Boise includes the entire state of Idaho.

Fir Tree Swallowed by Stronger Kindred
A correspondent of the Scientific American Magazine tells of a fir tree that swallowed another, that was brought into the sawmill at Springfield, Ore.

Not long ago a butt fir log nearly four feet in diameter was brought into the sawmill of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company, Springfield, Ore. During the process of sawing it was discovered that here was a tree that had evidently swallowed another one. Counting the growth rings, the larger outside tree was estimated to be 215 years old and the little inner one, 15 inches in diameter, 110 years old, at the time of cutting.

When and how the swallowing process took place is a matter of conjecture, but no doubt the two trees originally stood closely side by side, and in the course of growing came to press against one another to such an extent that they gradually became one. When the two trees first touched, both were young, the larger not much over 50 years old and the smaller around 35. The larger and more powerful slowly engulfed the smaller until it died from want of sun and air, after a struggle of many years' duration. Then the larger tree, evidently satisfied with its victory, kept on growing until the woodmen's axes laid it low about 75 years later.

Many Forest Products
We are accustomed to think of things made of wood as our only forest products. There are others. Two, for example, are things that we eat, or used to eat. A generation ago it was a fall pastime to go chestnutting. Those days are nearly gone, because the chestnut blight has swept away most of the chestnut trees. Black walnuts used to be a common nut. Today they are a luxury and not always easy to obtain.

Edible Oil Supply
Although the potential production of edible oils throughout the world for 1925 was apparently larger than in the preceding year, there are indications that a balance may be struck between increases in world cottonseed oil production and a decrease in other edible oils, including that from sunflower seed. There was a heavier world consumption of these products during the last year. Prices, however, declined.
