While shopping this year has been considerably affected by the quarantine, the merchants report that the volume is now back to normal, although the cash receipts are not up to the normal mark. Shoppers are showing a tendency to buy comparatively inexpensive presents rather than the more costly gifts, and at the same time useful gifts are the rule rather than the luxuries or purely ornamental type of presents.

## SOUTH CHINA GRASPING FOR SOVIET THROAT

official, Vice Consul Hassis, is definitely known to have perished before a Chinese firing squad at Canton.

From the entire Yangtze Valley and to the south of it, all Russians officially connected with the Soviet are being hustled out and Soviet commercial places closed down.

At Canton, this was accompanied by revolting bloodshed. Soviet representatives in Hankow were given barely 48 hours to leave after being rounded up early last Friday morning and marched bound through the streets, some of them still in their night clothes. Tomorrow has been set as the limit of departure from Shanghai.

The absence of anti-foreign feeling, except against the Soviet, is noteworthy. During the events of last week not a single foreign casualty, except Russians, was reported from the whole Nationalist area. Some non-Russians were arrested in the Hankow roundup, but they were later released with apologies.

During the communist coup at Canton it was necessary to bring approximately 120 Americans, British and Germans in from the outlying areas for protection by foreign sailors. The Japanese landed marines to protect the Japanese hospital. No one was hurt, however.

The latest official foreign reports enabled one to make a fairly accurate estimate of the costs of Canton's orgy.

At least six thousand persons believed to have perished. The communists, who seized the city December 11, killed four thousand, while the anti-reds in recapturing the city two days later, killed two thousand.

The Soviet consul general and his family were taken prisoners together with about 20 other Russians. Their eventual fate is uncertain. All have been paraded bearing placards calling upon the populace to wreak their pleasure upon them. Several of them were slashed with knives and spat upon.

The Chinese anti-Reds assert that documents seized at the Soviet consulate prove that the Russians were instigated from Moscow to launch the reign of terror on December 11. They claim the documents were seized as the Soviet representatives were attempting to burn them.

The material damage at Canton is generally estimated at twenty million dollars, Mexican.

When other losses due to the looting of both Reds and anti-Reds is added to this, the total will probably be doubled.

The end is not yet in sight. The militarists who are in control at present are unagreed among themselves. The entire group has been denounced by the Nanking Nationalist regime, which has ordered a punitive expedition against Canton. Further fighting is probable and the population is still panicky.
