### HICKMAN LIVED DR JEKYLL AND MR. HYDE LIFE

return. But the officers, having identified Hickman as the hunted "Fox" returned to his apartment yesterday.

There they found the very necktie which Hickman had worn while his picture was taken for police identification last summer at the time of his arrest on forgery charges. It was that arrest which resulted in his discharge from the bank of which Parker is an officer and which is believed to have provided the vengeance motive which drove Hickman to the fiendish crime of which he is accused.

On this second, more minute search, the officers found stains which they ordered analyzed to determine whether they might have been caused by the playing of little Marian in that apartment. They also found a shirt bearing the initials H. B. G. The name H. B. Gerber had been found linked in the neckband of a piece of a shirt used to tie the bundle that was a part of the slain school girl's body.

Articles found there had come

from Kansas City, the former home of Hickman. A crudely made pair of mittens was discovered. They were made of black oil cloth and the thread with which they had been stitched was said by the officers to be the same as that with which little Marian's eyelids had been pierced. The mittens, according to the officers, might have been used to prevent the small victim from making any resistance. The other side of the dual character presented by the police investigators was presented by the boy's Sunday school teacher and the woman at whose boarding house he lived for some time.

"The Hickman boy seemed a gentleman," said Perry Peek, his Sunday school teacher. "He had occasional fits of melancholia though."

"He was such a neat, quiet, orderly boy," declared Mrs. M. C. Driskell, the manager of the boarding house in Albanbra, a suburb where Hickman lived for four months.

**Attended Sunday School**

"He went to church and Sunday school. He never stayed out late at night. He was always carefully groomed, extremely polite, used good grammar and otherwise was a model boy."

"That's the youth—if the police

are right, Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde come to life with vengeance, far outstripping the fictitious character—that is the object of what is declared to be the greatest manhunt in the history of southern California.

**Jakowsky Released**

Milton Jakowsky who had been arrested as a suspect in the case was released last night.

Police detectives said that only Jakowsky's morbid curiosity had given him any connection with the case. His arrest was caused by the report of neighbors of the Parkers that Jakowsky, a friend of the informants, had spent much of his time since the kidnaping of the child, peering at the Parker house from behind the neighbor's windows. Suspicion that he might be involved in the case was based on the belief that the kidnaper had kept a close check on the activities in the Parker home.

and the other man, live at the Bellevue Arms Apartments, where Hickman is said by police to have carried out his diabolical kidnaping and slaying plot. They were returning to their rooms at about 6 o'clock Saturday evening—two hours before a masked man, riding in a Chrysler automobile brought back the torn and lifeless body of little Marian and sold it to her distracted father for \$1500—and when the woman remarked to her husband: "Why, that's young Donald Evans, isn't it?"

Her husband answered in the affirmative and the wife amusedly remarked that it seemed that Hickman and his friend were going on a party as they were carrying several packages described as heavily wrapped and about the length of a wine bottle.

They also were carrying a suit case.

**Had a Companion**

The unidentified companion of Hickman held open the door of the automobile while Hickman placed the bundles inside. No more was seen by the man and his wife as they thought nothing of the matter and continued on into the apartment.

After hearing the story of the couple, Chief of Detectives Herman Cline immediately ordered officers to continue their investigation on the theory that Hickman was aided by at least one other person in his revolting crime.

Last night a janitor in the apartment house told the officers of having seen Hickman, then known as Evans, carrying bundles on Friday night. Although this first was interpreted to mean that the child might have been killed the day previous to the collection of the ransom, the finding of the other witnesses caused police to attach less importance to the janitor's story.

**Whereabout's a Mystery**

While the maze of clues connecting Hickman with the crime seemed to be strengthened almost hourly, by new uncovering of evidence against him, the whereabouts of the young fugitive apparently were as much of a mystery as ever.

One suspect, captured about 2 a. m. today between Beverly Hills and Santa Monica, was detained until the county identification bureau opened when his fingerprints were compared with those of Hickman. He was allowed to go when it was shown that he was not the man.

Although they had failed in the premier object—that of running down Hickman—police today at least had determined by photograph identification and finger prints that the object of their search had used the innocent looking Bellevue Arms Apartment house for his headquarters.

**Was the Same Voice**

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21.—The same voice which last Saturday over the telephone made arrangements for the ransom of Marian Parker by her father, Perry M. Parker, was declared today by him to have been the voice of William Edward Hickman, accused slayer of the child, and a discharged employee of the bank of which Parker is an official.

Parker reached this decision in recalling incidents of the employment and discharge of Hickman, identified by finger prints as Marian's slayer.

In reviewing these incidents, Parker strengthened the police theory that revenge was the root of the fiendish plot and that the

child's slayer was striking at Parker through his small daughter.

"At the time of the telephone conversations and while I was talking with the man after following his instructions and handing him the ransom money, I did not connect the voice and demeanor with any employe or former employe of the bank," Parker said.

"After the search through the employe's records, the photographs and incidents which have been revealed through the work of the police, I recall the unusual manner in which Hickman talked with me about his discharge for forgery. (Hickman was discharged after pleading guilty to forgery charges.) I remember how he asked me for his position again after being granted probation—which probation I protested—and his replies to questions and the calm manner and voice I heard over the telephone, and lastly the coolness and nerve displayed Saturday when we met for the exchange. I am convinced that Hickman was at the other end of the telephone and that he took the \$1500."

**His Sweetheart Talks**

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21.—"Eddie was a queer sort of boy but he was always a gentleman."

This was said of William Edward Hickman, who is being sought for the kidnaping and murder of Marian Parker, by his one-time sweetheart, Miss Marie McEwan, 17, tonight. She told of her meeting and friendship with the youth, for whom now the greatest of manhunts is under way.

"I met Eddie through several of my friends," she said. "He apparently took a liking to me and I liked him. I don't know how he could have committed such a deed."

"Eddie is not like other boys of my acquaintance. I knew him for more than five months. Never once in that time did he ever ask me to go out—not even to a motion picture show."

"I was going to school at the time. I have not seen Eddie for about six months and I do not know why he terminated our friendship. We never had a quarrel. He just dropped out of my life as suddenly as he had entered it."

And the one-time sweetheart of Eddie said: "I liked Eddie better than any of my other friends, but now—well, he had better not come out here. I will assist the police in every way if I can be of any use to them."

**Suspect Is Questioned**

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Dec. 21. Deputy Sheriffs early today held for investigation a youth who gave his name as Sidney Farkas and who had been taken into custody between Santa Monica and Beverly Hills suburbs, on suspicion that he was William Edward Hickman, accused slayer of Marian Parker.

Although the officers said that the man arrested answered the general description of Hickman and his likeness to the hunted man was striking, a hurried check of the youth seemed to disprove that he was the man wanted.

The sheriff's office announced that Farkas was being held until the county identification bureau opened for the day when his fingerprints would be compared with those of Hickman.

Although officers did not believe it probable that Farkas would prove to be Hickman they said they were not satisfied with the rather vague reasons he gave for being at the place he was arrested. For that reason further investigation was ordered but no immediate move to identify him was made.

### CREW OF RUM SHIP IS ANGRY

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 21.—Thirteen Canadian seafaring men who sailed from Vancouver, B. C. 97 days ago on Joe Parente's rum running motorship Principe, christened Apollo, arrived here today aboard the Panama mail liner City of San Francisco from Manzanillo.

The Apollo lies in Manzanillo harbor, seized by British authorities for wages due the crew.

Weeks of drifting with crippled engines, near starvation and the suicide of the engineer, were described by First Mate Charles N. Coe, spokesman for the crew.

"We left Vancouver," he said, "We knew the Apollo was a rum ship but we were sailors out of jobs and were told she carried 180,000 feet of lumber for Glasgow. There may have been some liquor. I don't know."

"Engine trouble developed and Harold Grosman, chief engineer, killed himself with a bullet, in despair, over inability to make repairs. Then the boat developed a leak. We manned the hand pumps for four days and nights before we reached Mazatlan."

After temporary repairs, we set out again but the engines became hopelessly crippled and we drifted for weeks. Food and water ran

out. All we had was a slice of bread each meal, shark meat, a little pork and rainwater we caught in zalls about once a month when it rained. Once we caught a turtle and had soup.

"Finally we rigged up makeshift sails and made 200 miles toward land before we were picked up by the British ship Peterson and towed into Manzanillo."

"The men had burned Joe Parente in effigy. They blamed him for starving on repairs which would have saved all the trouble."

### U. of O. Boy Wins



Theodore Ruch

Theodore C. Ruch, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Ruch, of Eugene, has been named Rhodes scholar from Oregon. Following the competitive examination in Portland recently, Ruch graduated from the University of Oregon last year, and has since been doing graduate work in psychology at Stanford university. At the university he was made a member of Phi Beta Kappa, national scholastic society, and he was also prominent in many campus activities.

Ruch will enter Oxford university, England, next fall, and under terms of the scholarship will remain there for three years.

The three Rhodes scholars that preceded Ruch were also University of Oregon students, and previous to this many won this award from this institution. Alfons Korn, also of Eugene, and Clinton Howard, are now studying at Oxford, while Arthur Rombrough, classed in 1925, has recently returned to America.

Other Rhodes scholars from the university are Cecil Lyons, 1909; Carl N. Woolley, 1910; W. Bohler, 1912; P. T. Homan, 1913; Kerby Miller, 1920; and Tom Brockway, 1921.

Selection for Rhodes scholarship is regarded as the highest honor that can be won by college and university students. This year there were eight candidates for the award which was allotted to Ruch.

### RUM RUNNER IS STILL SOUGHT

SEATTLE, Dec. 21.—A telegraphic warrant for the arrest of Joe Parente, convicted rum runner who jumped bail in San Francisco and fled to British Columbia, was received by United States Marshal Edward D. Benn here today.

Benn said he would arrange for a deputy marshal to meet Parente at the border if he is deported from Canada. Parente was arrested in Vancouver yesterday and is expected to be deported as an undesirable alien. Hearing has been set for tomorrow on the deportation question.
